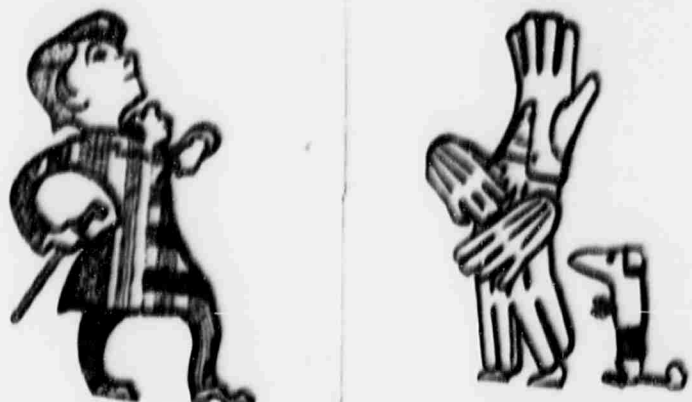

ACCUSED OF DOCTORING BOOKS.

Mr. Quinn alleges that McDonough has taken from \$5 to \$30 at various times, changing paid bills which came to him as cashier and doctoring his books. Mr. Quinn says that McDonough in this way has stolen about \$3,300 while in the employ of the company.
