





Five Syrians Who Signed Petition to McAdoo Arraigned on Libel Charge. Bishop Raphael Hawaweenie of the Syrian Greek Church of America was the complaining witness yesterday in the Tombs police couit, when N. N. Maloof, Joseph H. Macksoud, N. Hatem, Elias J. Macksoud and N. A. Markarzil, members of the Syrian colony in Manhattan, came before Magistrate Mayo on a charge of oriminal libel. He alleged that the defendants signed and circulated a petition addressed to Police Commissioner McAdoo, in which he was accused of having incited members of his Church to commit murder, if necessary, in defense of his authority.



The first witness called on behalf of the The first witness called on behalf of the prosecution by Assistant District Attorney Garvan was N. A. Shibley, a Syrian in the office of Charlos E. Le Barbier, counsel for the defendants. The prosecution tried to bring out that Shibley had sent for repre-sentatives from various newspapers to be present at a meeting held at Mr. Le Par-bier's office, and that the alleged libelous petition was handed to several of them. It was conceded by the defense after much wrangling that the petition had been signed by the defendants and delivered to a newspaper reporter for publication.

He testified that he was 44 years of age and was born and educated in Damascus. He received a college degree in Constantinople. He said that he was ordained as a preacher in 1886 and went to Russia, where he at-tended the theological school at Kieff. He was then abbot of a monastery and pro-fessor of Arabic at Kazan, and was appointed finally to take charge of the orthodox mission in America. He concluded his biography by saying that he had been con-secrated Bishop of Brooklyn, and that he had supervision over six churches and about 40,000 communicants. The Bishop denied having urged members of his Church to commit bloodshed or saying, as alleged, that if he were deposed from his pulpit every marriage solemnized by him would be declared void. The Bishop said that to his knowledge there was no vigilance committee in his Church sworn to protect his authority, and, backed by a fund of \$4,000, to protect any of its members who might he arrested in consequence of any act of violence upon its part. At the conclusion of the Bishon's testi-


Driver "Borrowed" E. S. Dundy's Auto -Dandy Ropes He'll Get the Limit.




