WANTS SUBWAY BEFORE APPROACH. Abraham Abraham Urges Haste in Work on Manhattan Bridge.

Abraham Abraham touched a new point, and an important one, in an interview with a Standard Union reporter this morning. He insisted upon haste, but cautioned the authorities that the subway connecting with Bridge No. 3 should be completed before the approach. "Not another moment should be lost," Mr. Abraham said, "in the construction of the Manhattan Bridge and the Flatbush avenue extension, with its subway to the bridge. These two things every Brooklyn man should consider of vital importance to the welfare and future of his home borough. "The tremendous importance of Bridge No. 3 demands that it receive immediate, continual and sensible, business-like attention until it is completed. There should be haste, but every step should be under careful advisement, so that when the last rivet has been driven home in the completed bridge structure, the first cars will be systematically moving through the connecting Flatbush avenue extension subway, over the bridge and adequate approaches be finished on the Manhattan side. The Fulton street subway should be completed in the Flatbush avenue extension subway, over the bridge and adequate approaches be finished on the Manhattan side. "It will not be necessary to tear down the buildings on Fulton street that are now in the way of the bridge itself. It is known positively when the bridge itself will be completed. When that word is received, however, and that should be soon, let the approach be started at once. Let all work possible be done to push the subway and let all meet in completed state at a common time and no work be lost. It would be a mistake to finish the approach and then tear it down again to put in the subway connections to the bridge. "There is authority in the Bridge Department and Rapid Transit Commission to see that these things are done—done properly and done now. Let every Brooklyn man, every organization and newspaper support the city government their urgent need."

Borough President-elect Bird S. Coler said to-day that all civic bodies should work for the early completion of the new Manhattan Bridge, as it means improvement contemplated.
