The Proposal Part 1



PA's Proposed Total Operating Budget

- \$ 121.5 billion for 2024-25
- \$ 3.02 billion in the Motor License Fund
- \$ 2.1 billion in the Lottery Fund
- \$48.9 billion in Federal funds
- \$ 22.6 billion special funds/augmenting fees
- \$ 48.3 billion in the General Fund



2024-25 Proposed Budget

\$48.3 billion General Fund budget proposal (12 percent increase from 2023-24)

 The budget proposal holds the line on taxes, and instead uses about \$3 billion in reserve cash to balance.

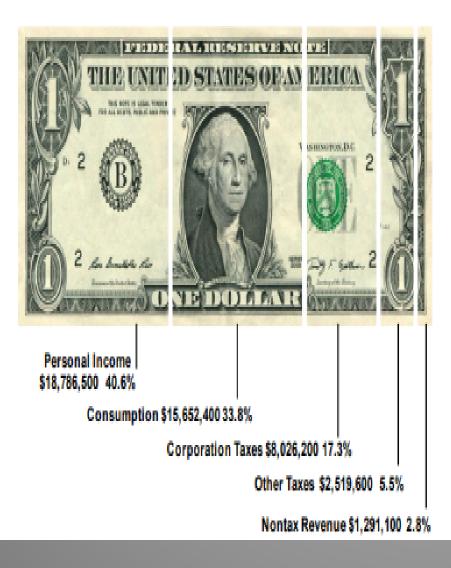

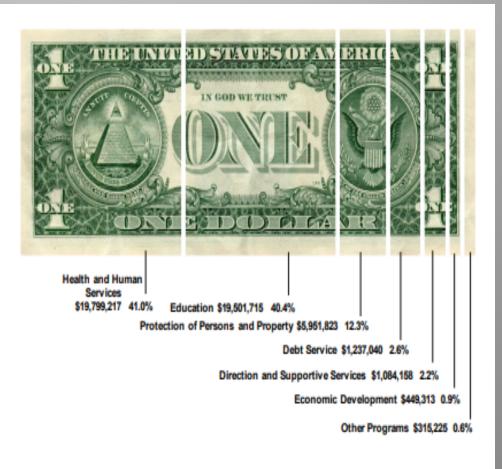

Education Projections: 2024-25

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The Appropriations

- **\$200 million** proposed increase for BEF formula
- \$871 million increase in new adequacy investment formula driven into the BEF base
- **\$50 million** proposed increase for SEF



The Appropriations

- \$50 million proposed for safety/security grants via PCCD for physical safety (and for coordinator training)
- **\$ 100 million** proposed for mental health grants via PCCD
- \$ 30 million proposed increase to Pre-K Counts
- **\$ 2.7 million** proposed increase to Head start
- **\$ 17 million** proposed increase for Early Intervention



The Appropriations

- **\$7 million** for dual enrollment projects
- State reimbursement to cover universal free breakfast
- **\$2.4 million** increase in CTE funding
- **\$ 10 million** to the Educator Talent Recruitment Account
- \$15 million proposed for student teacher stipend program
- \$ 5 million proposed for professional development of educators (\$2.7 million increase)



(New) Appropriations

- **\$300 million** for school environmental repair projects (\$1.5 billion over 5 years)
- Statewide cyber charter tuition rate (\$8,000 per student) returning \$262 million back to school districts
- \$3 million to provide free menstrual hygiene products in schools
- New higher education system: combining PASSHE and community colleges, 15% increase in funding (\$975 million)
- \$1,000 in tuition/fees per semester for families making the median income of \$70,000 or less going to new system school
- Increase PHEAA state grants by \$1,000 (max. award up from \$5,760 to \$6,750

Basic Education Funding Commission

The Basic Education Funding Commission (BEFC) released reports that include recommendations for improving the BEF formula and establishing a new school funding system in Pennsylvania.

Governor Shapiro and the General Assembly must agree to include these recommendations in the 2024-25 budget.



BEF Formula Recommendations: *Majority Report*

- Use three-year averages of ACS poverty, median household income, and number of households datasets to smooth the trend for changing factors.
- Safe harbor provision: Districts qualify for the concentrated poverty metric if they have a ≥ 30% acute poverty level in any of the previous three years.
- Resetting the base at the 2023/24 distribution level.
- Provide a \$200 million increase through the BEF formula each year.



Adequacy Recommendations: *Majority Report*

- "387, or 77%, districts have an adequacy gap because they spend below \$13,704 per weighted student, and the other 113 school districts are currently spending at or above the recommended adequacy target."
- In total, the statewide adequacy gap is \$5.1
 billion in state share, to be distributed over 7
 years (\$871 million per year).

Proposed BEF Formula Changes

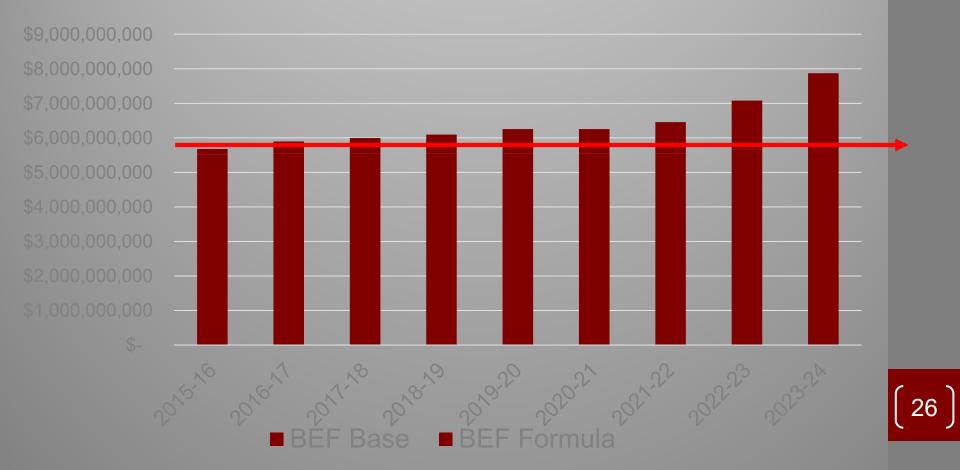
•Use **three-year averages** of ACS poverty, median household income, and number of households datasets to smooth the trend for changing factors.

Extend the qualification for concentrated poverty: Allow districts to qualify if they have a 30% or greater acute poverty level in any of the previous three years.
Provide at least a \$200 million increase through the BEF formula each year.

•Resetting the base at the 2023/24 distribution level.

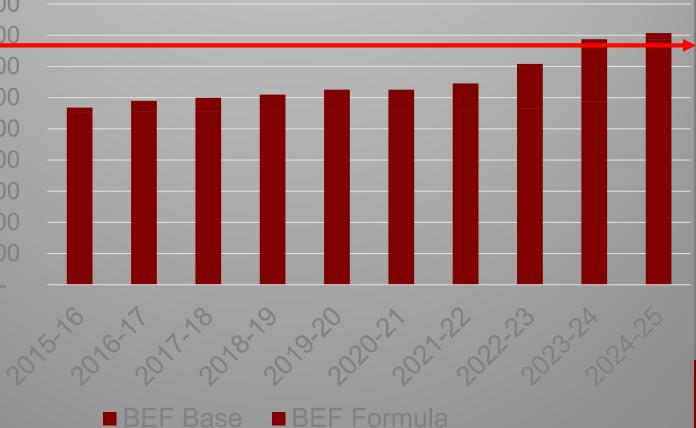

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Basic Education Funding

•From 2023-24 to 2024-25 proposed AS is:

280 districts lost share yr. over yr., to date.

•No matter what, EVERY district will see an increase from the \$200 million BEF SW portion.

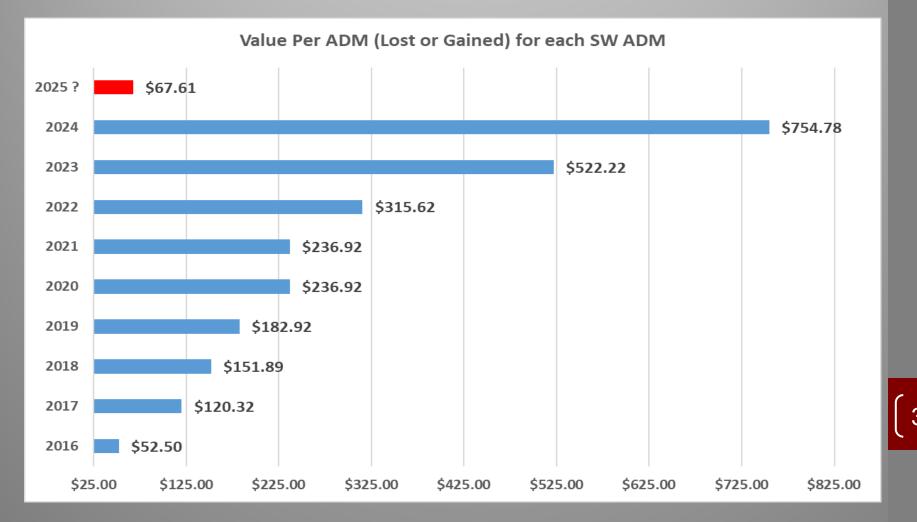


BEF Formula Review

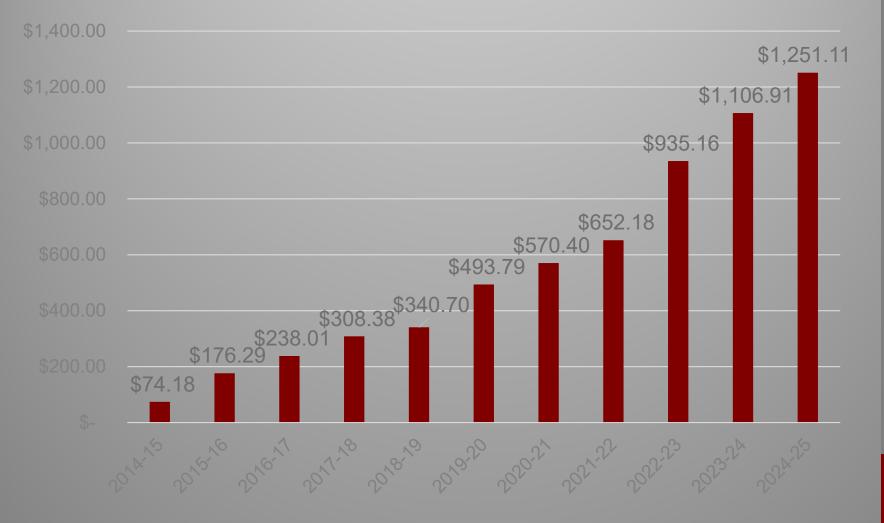

•2024-25 proposed add at \$46,750,000 to SW portion.•\$383.3 million running through the SEF formula.

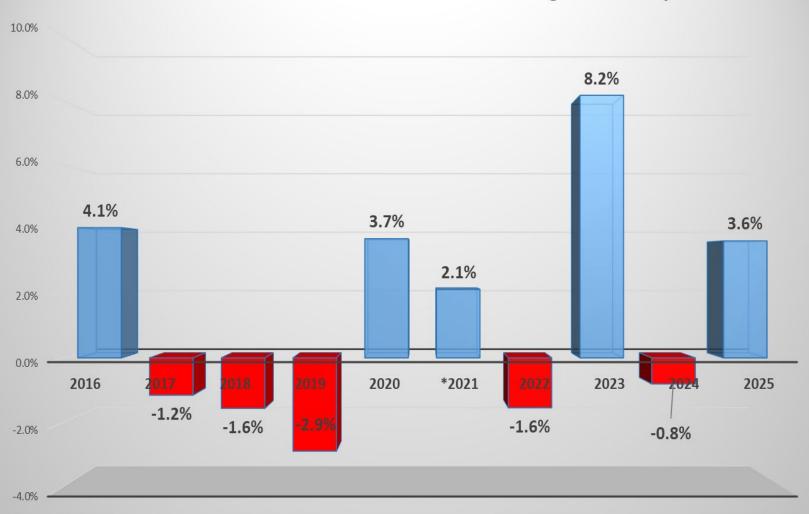

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Safety and Security

- **\$50 million** for school safety and security grants through the PCCD's School Safety and Security Fund.
- These grants came to be in the 2022-23 budget cycle.
- School entities can utilize funds to address physical security enhancements and provide resources for school safety and security coordinator training.



Safety and Security: Mental Health

- **\$100 million** for mental health grants through the PCCD's School Safety and Security Fund.
- These grants came to be in the 2023-24 budget cycle.
- These grants were funded through federal COVID-State Fiscal Recovery restricted account funds in 2023-24.
- School entities can utilize funds to provide mental health services to students and staff, with behavioral health baseline criteria limitations



Safety and Security: Targeted Grants

The Safe Schools Targeted Grants Program was moved from PDE to PCCD in the 2023-24 budget.

- **\$11 million** for school safety and security grants transferred to PCCD's School Safety and Security Fund.
- Awards previously weighted to nonpublic schools.

• School entities can utilize funds for programs that establish or enhance school security, including costs associated with the training and compensation of school security personnel.



School Construction

\$300 million for school environmental repairs program via PDE.

 School entities can utilize funds for projects that abate or remediate environmental hazards, including, but not limited to, the abatement or remediation of lead in water sources, asbestos and mold.

•This program differs from PlanCon, which is still placed under moratorium.

• No funding appropriated under this proposal for the public school facility grants (\$100 million last year).



School Construction Other Legislation...

HB 1408 (Rep. Schweyer, Lehigh)

- •Public School Facility Improvement Grant Program under the CFA.
- •A qualifying application must have costs related to the project of at least \$500,000.
- •25% local match is required, with a grant maximum of \$5,000,000.
- Removes the limitation on PlanCon project reimbursement exceeding 65% of overall structural costs
- •Changes building condition assessments by school entities from a voluntary report every 10 years to a mandatory report every five years.



School Construction Other Legislation...

HB 1032 (Rep. Fiedler, Philadelphia)

- •Establishes the Solar for Schools Grant Program in DCED to provide competitive grants to school entities for solar energy projects. I
- •DCED is required to provide technical assistance related to solar assessments to applicants who request it.
- •Grant awards are capped at 50% of the cost of the solar energy project.
