Form I English Summer Reading

The purpose of summer reading is to continue to build students' reading stamina, fluency, and literacy. We also want you to enjoy this phase of your reading life by meeting some great new books! To support these goals, all rising Form I students will read and annotate *Drums*, *Girls* + *Dangerous Pie*, complete a reading log for that text, and then read one other book from the short list below (no reading required log for the second book).

Please read the following instructions carefully:

- Read *Drums, Girls + Dangerous Pie* by Jordan Sonnenblick
- Complete a reading log for *Drums*, *Girls* + *Dangerous Pie* (directions below).
- Read *one other book* from the following list:
 - o **Everything Sad is Untrue** by Daniel Nayeri
 - Ghost by Jason Reynolds
 - o <u>Red Kayak</u> by Priscilla Cummings
 - o Schooled by Gordon Korman
 - o <u>Unbroken</u> by Laura Hillenbrand (young adult version)

Directions for Reading Log:

- Annotate *Drums, Girls + Dangerous Pie* using the Notice & Note reading signposts you worked with this past year
 - Contrasts and Contradictions: Sharp differences between what we expect characters to do, and what they actually do
 - Aha Moments: Realizations that shift characters' actions or understanding
 - o Tough Questions: Questions characters raise that reveal their inner struggles
 - Words of the Wiser: Advice or insights wiser characters offer about life
 - Again and Again: Events, images, or particular words that recur throughout a text or an essential portion of it
 - Memory Moments: Recollections by a character that interrupt the forward progress of the story
- Write **five** journal entries for *Drums*, *Girls* + *Dangerous Pie*. Journal entries should be equally spaced throughout the book: Chapters 1-4, 5-8, 9-12, 13-16, 17-21.
- For each chapter group, copy out at least two particularly interesting quotations/passages from in your journal.
- Record the page numbers.
- Explain the significance of the passages (Things to consider in your response: Why is the passage important? What does the passage show about the characters, setting, conflict, plot and theme? Can you make any text-to-text, text-to-self, text-to-world connections? Did you learn anything new from the passage?).
- Please do not summarize the passage.
- Print a copy of the reading log and bring it to class on the first day of school with your copy of *Drums*, *Girls* + *Dangerous Pie*. (Reading Logs may be hand-written using a pen if you do not have access to a computer and a Google Doc.)
