
In 2023-2024, AGCS employed 126 teachers, 5 school counselors, 3 nurses and a school social worker, totaling 235 faculty members.
















# **Enrollment**

AGCS will build and extend the schools brand to ensure community awareness, participation, and to forge relationships with various stakeholders groups.



# Teaching and Learning

The K-12 Science Leadership Team has been hard at work learning about the new Pennsylvania science standards aptly known as STEELS (Science, Technology, Engineering, Environmental Literacy, and Sustainability), which help create the conditions for all students to be scientifically, technologically, environmentally, and engineering literate.

The Team has collaborated with administration and consultants from the CCIU to strengthen instructional practices that will align with the new standards. In June, our team will present our recommendations for new programming to the Board. Implementation of STEELS will begin in the Fall of 2024. In addition, the Science PSSA will shift from 4th to 5th grade.



# Safety & Security

Ensuring the safety and security of our school community is our utmost priority at AGCS. Our school diligently adheres to the safety requirements outlined in Act 44.


- We collaborate closely with the Avon Grove School District, sharing the expertise of our Safety and Security Coordinator, Chrissy Simpkins. Mrs. Simpkins consistently reviews and updates our policies and procedures to ensure they align with the latest safety standards and best practices.
- We conduct regular and required drills to prepare our students and staff for various emergency scenarios. These drills ensure everyone can respond quickly and effectively in an emergency.
- We coordinate and meet regularly with local emergency services, including the Pennsylvania State Police (PSP), the West Grove Fire Company, Southern Chester County EMS, and our local Townships representatives. These strong partnerships enhance our preparedness and ensure a swift, coordinated response if needed.
- Our commitment to safety extends to providing various training sessions for our staff.
   These trainings equip our team with the knowledge and skills to handle emergencies efficiently and confidently.
- This year, we launched *Navigate 360*, a comprehensive suite of integrated school safety solutions. This platform offers ongoing support and a range of tools that enhance our ability to communicate and maintain a secure school environment.

### AGCS/AGSD SAFETY & SECURITY COLLABORATION

In partnership with the Avon Grove School District, we created a video to provide information on how we are committed to ensuring a safe and secure learning environment for our students. In the video, you can expect to find an overview of the safety measures in place, including updated standard response protocols, safety guidelines, and concern reporting.

# **Construction Underway**

### New 7-12 Academic Building

The finance team worked with the US Department of Agriculture to complete the application and approval process required to secure funding for the new academic building. After a process of several years, the administrative and finance teams were thrilled to finally receive the official "Letter of Conditions" which approved AGCS for a USDA loan in the amount of \$84 M. This loan afforded AGCS the ability to construct our \$52 M academic building as well as refinance the existing building purchases and renovation debt into a one loan with a 3.625 % interest rate.

On February 29th, we celebrated another pivotal moment in our quest to build for the future of our AGCS students and community: our groundbreaking ceremony followed by groundbreaking on March 1.

Our "Digging Blue and Gold" Groundbreaking Ceremony was attended by over 100 staff, students, builders, architects, board members, community members, and well-wishers. We couldn't be more excited for what the future holds for the AGCS community!








# Fiscal Highlights







For our 2023-2024 fiscal year, our projected revenues, totaling \$36,933,371.00, increased by \$3,204,441.08 from the prior year. This is primarily due to increases in student enrollments, student retention, demographic shifts in the schools' student membership, increased tuition rates as well as remaining ESSER funding still available to serve all K-12 learners.

Projected expenditures for the academic year totaled \$35,691,327.00. An increase of \$2,210,120.51 from the prior year. This was primarily due to an increase in instructional and student resources and support services, staff retention and recruitment, instructional technology resources as well as facility capital improvements and campus security measures implemented for both sites.


