

## Unit 1: The Global Tapestry (1200-1450)

Unit Guide: Breakdown of unit objectives, themes, and historical reasoning processes (HRPs) required for building content knowledge prior to class. This is completed through assigned readings and videos. The notes from the unit guide assist on various assessments and assignments throughout the unit. A new unit guide is given at the start of each new unit.

How-To Utilize the Unit Guide with the Textbook/AMSCO readings (page 3):

1. Pre-Reading (2 min): Read the learning objectives before you read, considering what you already know and what you need to better understand.
2. Read/Address (30-60 min): Read the assigned textbook pages/AMSCO with the purpose of supporting the learning objective with historical evidence (DO NOT list facts.). Define historical terms (see last page of assigned chapter/s). Consider creating guided questions to assist in breaking down the objective.
3. Synthesis (5-10 min/next class day): Consider evidence that supports the “HRP,” and reread notes, annotating important facts, points of confusion, and/or connections to what you’ve read. Be sure to ask questions & check for clarification in class the next day.

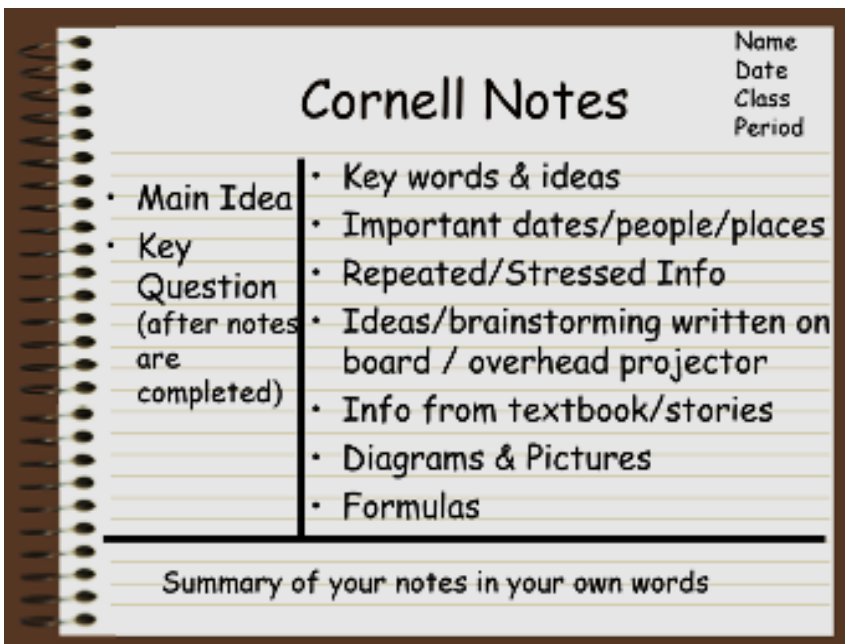
1. Read AMSCO’s “*Unit 1: The Global Tapestry – 1200-1450*” Reading (PDF attachment)
2. Based on the “how to instructions” above, complete notes by the week of Monday, September 9th (see the “how to” guide on page 2 & consider how you want to take notes throughout the year).

The notes are not collected, but you will use these notes on an assessment, worth 25 points, the week of 9/11. You will also utilize the notes on various assignments, quizzes, and assessments in class throughout the unit.

## How To: Organizing & Taking Notes

1. Utilize a notebook, binder, OR your personal device
2. Keep notes organized by unit
  - Notebook – new sheet folded/labeled with name of unit (see unit plan)
  - Binder – tabs/dividers for each unit or hole punch unit plan & start each unit with unit plan
  - Device – create History folder, then create separate folders for EACH unit (see unit plan)
3. Organize by objective/date

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1. Write/Type today's date & class/period in the top RIGHT corner
  2. Write/Type objective/learning goal across the top
    - Consider "Cornell Notes" structure (see visual below)
      - Utilize guiding questions (simpler questions, usually 5 W's but consider questions that would help build up to the objective)
      - Textbook/Readings/Secondary Source Documents:
        - Do you see bolded words/key terms? Define them
        - Are there smaller questions (look along margins) to answer that build up to the objective? - Answer those questions & consider how they relate to the objective
  4. Take notes to support the objective/learning goal
    - What information helps to address this? What don't I already know? (don't write information you already know/learned)
  5. Complete a summary AFTER you finish taking notes by doing one of the following:
    - Answer the objective/learning goal in a few sentences with historical evidence from your notes
- OR-
- Create question(s) that builds upon the objective to be answered later and/or the next day in class

\*HRP (Historical Reasoning Process) – how historical events and information are categorized. The 3 categories in AP are causation (cause and effect), comparison (similarities and differences), and CCOT (Continuities [what has remained constant/unchanged] and Changes).

\*Themes (SPICE-T): Historical events are categorized through the 6 AP themes: Social; Political; Interactions between humans and the environment; Cultural; Economic; and Technology.
