We have collected qualitative information internally (from our PACs) and will be distributing a survey to parents about what content they access online, how they access content (i.e., from our website or our app), and seek suggestions for making our online platforms a more useful, dynamic, and easy resource to navigate. A parent survey was sent out this month to collect this important information.

By far the best signs of our vitality are the foundational improvements we are making across our schools. On the structural side, you are aware of the impending conclusion to our capital project, which is the result of need, much forethought and conversation, and commitment by our community. The Middle School Gymnasium has already been valuable as a student event venue and a COVID-19 vaccine clinic for our youngest students, in addition to its use for physical education classes and after school sports. The Collaborative Science Center, or "STEAM Wing," is almost ready for occupancy.

Yet those structural additions are just one means to an end. They will help us along our path of curricular and professional development. In November, we presented a snapshot of our progress with our science curriculum. The transition to New York's "P-12 Science Learning Standards" has led to the introduction of Science 21 at the elementary level and a focus on the new Regents science assessments due in two years. All these things contribute to more collaborative and inquiry-based instruction that facilitate the shift toward Next Generation standards. Students will have a greater role in determining how they engage in learning.

Finally, our commitment to creating a learning environment that is welcoming and inclusive to all students, reflective of their personal experiences, and adaptable to all types of learners is critical for ensuring the longevity of the institutional vitality that will lead to greater success for all. Students need to be in a state of physical and mental comfort to be successful when learning. Of course, the parents, staff, and other adults that cooperate and partner with us to provide education for our students also need to understand that they have an interest in those same advantages, both for student instruction and their own personal mental health. Rye Neck's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee has begun the important work of comparing New York's DEI Framework with our school environment to set the stage for thoughtful and honest dialogue so that all of our students can learn, achieve, and lead.

#### HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE FALL SEASON


400 athletes in middle school and high school participated in our interscholastic athletic program at the Varsity, Junior Varsity, and modified levels.

- The 6th grade intramural program hosted 100 students across 6 sports offerings and will continue to run through the school year.


