Welcome back! That greeting has particular gravity for us all this year. I am pleased that we have taken a major step towards getting back to the kind of daily, in-person school that our students deserve. The friendships created, extracurricular and social experiences, and academic benefits of being in school will once again become positive aspects of our students' lives.

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Superintendent's Notebook

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The conclusion of our capital project this year will furnish our students with the physical space to learn, achieve and lead. Along with the new roofs across the district and new seating in our MS/HS Performing Arts Center that had been completed last year, our new middle school gymnasium is ready for use now. The high school STEAM wing will be ready for occupancy midyear.

Project C, or the new Rye Neck Middle School gymnasium, opened for business for our students on Sept. 1 after a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Aug. 25. This beautiful facility is a full gym, with locker rooms, attached to the "high school gym" through an adjoining shared lobby. In addition to the obvious use for middle school physical education classes and athletics, this will give Rye Neck Middle School a large venue for student activities without having to compete for time in the Performing Art Center. A less apparent but significant advantage is that the availability of 100% more gym space will loosen up the master schedule so that middle and high school physical education classes can be concurrent. We were also able to preserve most of the exterior basketball court space that was adjacent to the original structure.

The new Rye Neck High School STEAM wing (Project D) will be finished midyear. This gorgeous, eight-classroom addition is a two-floor structure that spans the gap between the end of the high school building and the dining hall. Each floor has a classroom for biology and each of the three physical sciences. The physics rooms will also serve as the engineering/robotics spaces. Broad hallways and moveable walls allow for classroom space to be extended. There is even a new enclosed outdoor courtyard that can accommodate a greenhouse. The STEAM wing was built with collaboration and inquiry in mind. With both purpose-built and flexible, chameleon-like spaces available, students will be able to work together and participate in an investigative style of learning.

Throughout the year, and certainly in the opening months, we will communicate often about developments with our COVID Operations Plan. We were happy to see a commitment on the part of the New York State Education Department to in-person instruction and yet also relieved that our health agencies, notably the CDC and the local departments of health, share our concern for student and staff safety. Arianna Williams – Rye Neck High School Monitor

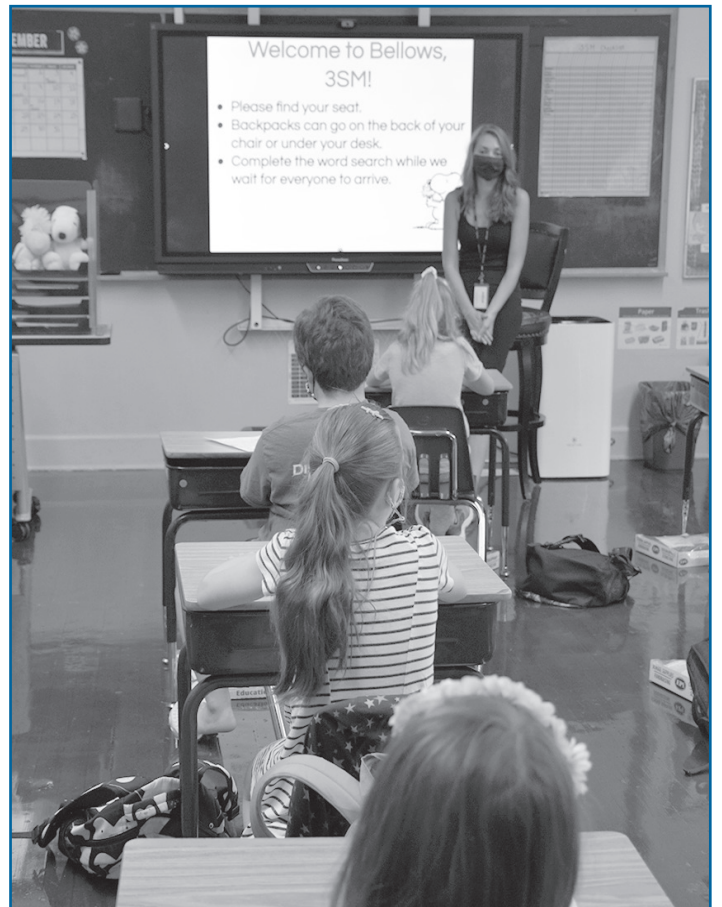
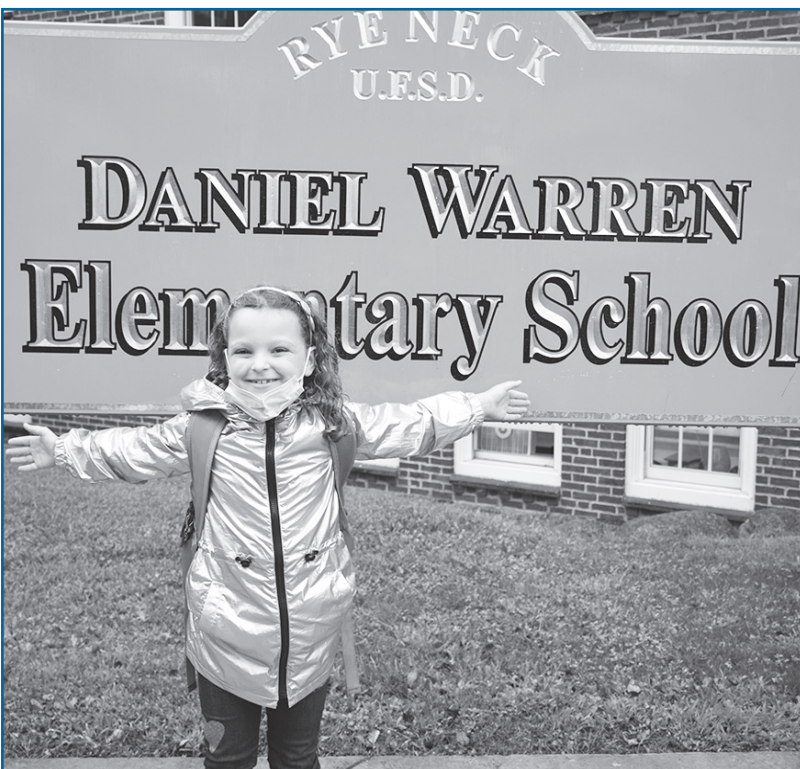
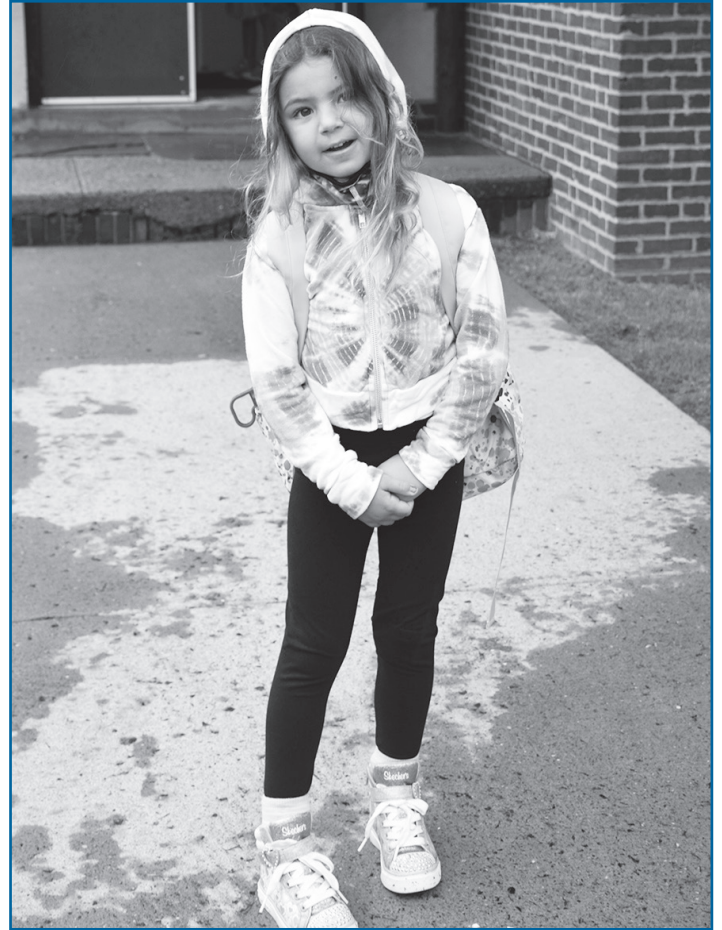

Tenure Candidates

The Rye Neck School District is committed to recruiting and retaining excellent teachers. There are several mechanisms in place to ensure that our professional staff meets this goal, including ongoing feedback from the superintendent, principals, department supervisors, directors and chairs.

Each of these professionals brings a unique and important perspective to the process and works individually with nontenured teachers to foster professional development and provide support. These professional relationships help staff members reflect on their practice, grow and make appropriate adjustments.

From a formal perspective, district administrators utilize a comprehensive evaluation process, frequently observing and evaluating each new staff member to offer suggestions, monitor progress and assess improvement. A four-year probationary period is required before new teachers/administrators receive tenure and a three-year period for teachers who have previously held tenure in another public school district in New York State.

Parents can provide valuable insights and should do so, first to the staff member directly, since this feedback would be most helpful to him/her. Once parents have spoken to the teacher, they may also wish to share their thoughts with the individual building principal or supervisor.
