Dear Rye Neck Community,

I am happy to report that as we embark on this holiday season, Rye Neck schools have made it through the first quarter of the year in generally good shape.



Like every other school district nationwide, we have faced enormous challenges as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Fortunately, we have an instructional plan in place that is flexible enough to allow us to pivot between our already existing in-person hybrid model to full remote instruction as circumstances change. Steadfast, our hardworking, excellent teachers and dedicated parent partners help to make these modifications as smooth as possible to maintain successful learning for all of our students.

In the midst of working hard to keep our schools open and our construction project progressing, our Board was also tasked with planning for a very important responsibility. At our Nov. 18 Board of Education meeting, Superintendent of Schools Dr. Barbara Ferraro announced her plan to retire from Rye Neck (and her long public education career) on June 30, 2021. Dr. Ferraro has worked in our district for nearly 30 years as a longtime high school principal and assistant superintendent before she began as superintendent in January of 2017.

I have had the privilege to work with generations of students from the time they entered elementary school through high school graduation and the distinct honor of celebrating with families all those major milestones in every student's life. Welcoming so many graduates back home to Rye Neck to raise their families is one of my greatest joys. Each time this occurs, it makes me feel like a parent filled with pride and admiration for the adults they've become.

Rye Neck is a truly special place. Thank you for making me a part of Rye Neck, and most importantly, thank you for your trust and partnership. In looking for a way to say goodbye, the words of Helen Keller came to mind: "The best and most beautiful things in the world cannot be seen or even touched. They must be felt with the heart." Rye Neck will forever hold that special place.

News From the School Counseling Department

What was it like to be back at school after nearly six months? The answer: great. After all the disruption, our students came back to school kinder, more generous, more considerate and more resilient than ever before. They wear their masks without complaint, comply with a multitude of new behaviors and often express appreciation for the relationships and opportunities that they missed so much. Seeing familiar faces (yes, covered in masks) and experiencing the energy and warmth of our school community was a relief and a joy for all of us. In the hallways, there were lots of hellos and knowing glances – we were back and going to make this work. Now, three months later, a reflection is in order.

To understand our young people's responses to the pandemic, social unrest and a big dose of family life, it is important to see their generation in context. Our high school students view boundaries differently from all previous generations - they are intelligent, action-oriented and compassionate - they inform themselves well and they expect to be inclusive and collaborative leaders. Animated by the examples of Greta Thunberg, age 17, and the Parkland teens, our students are laser focused on what is most important to their futures. This was evident throughout school closure as they spearheaded a staggering amount of community service, stood up for social justice, launched TEDxRyeNeckHigh #Climate online, gracefully accepted losses of sports seasons and made the best of online events. The lesson here is this: Do not underestimate the power of our children and take heart; they are able to face adversity with courage and meet the challenges ahead with flying colors.

Yes, it was not surprising that there were some fears about college applications among teens. Yet, as college application season took off, students looked to a future full of opportunities that they are primed to take. Freshman Seminar made it clear how much our newest high school students have grown since their virtual moving-up ceremony last spring. Our middle and elementary school students have demonstrated remarkable flexibility and aplomb as they navigated the responsibilities of learning at school and at home. What stands out the most is the love that they have shown us and the inspiration that provides. Parents and guardians, you have raised a group of young people to be proud of, and we are grateful to be part of your lives.

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An Update From the Board of Education

Since first learning of Dr. Ferraro's intention to retire last August, the Board of Education began planning for the transition in a careful and methodical manner. Our thoughtful discussions allowed us to distinctly define the professional attributes that we believe our next leader should possess. In early October, we evaluated potential regional and national search consultants, and later in the month conducted formal interviews with compelling finalists.

The Board selected Dr. Harold Coles from Southern Westchester BOCES (Board of Cooperative Educational Services) to lead our search. He brings to the table extensive advertising and recruitment experience as well as regional and national outreach which we believe will be critical in attaining a highly qualified and diverse pool of candidates. Dr. Coles will work in concert with Michael Conte, a longtime educational adviser and consultant who will assist with the identification, screening and interviewing of potential candidates.

An online survey has been distributed to families, and later this month, Dr. Coles will conduct stakeholder group meetings with teachers, students, clerical and custodial staff, administrators and the PTSA to learn more about the district's operational dynamics through its organizational structure. Recruitment materials will be distributed soon, and in the new year, the vetting process will begin. The plan is to complete candidate interviews with finalists by the end of March and select a new superintendent sometime in April, who will then begin to work in our schools by July 1, 2021.

In line with the likes of the year 2020, sizable changes are on the horizon, but one thing that will remain constant is our dedication to providing high-quality educational opportunities for all of our students.

On behalf of the Board of Education, I thank our community for its continuous support of our children and the Rye Neck school district. Warmest wishes to everyone for a healthy and joyful holiday season.
