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

Technology Update District Issues Chromebooks to Students

When Rye Neck became a Google Reference District in 2017, our vision was to increase our use of technology to provide students with more access and equity across our schools. We saw G-Suite and Chromebooks as the means our teachers needed to break down the walls of their classrooms in innovative ways to support teaching and learning. Our experiences with remote learning this past spring proved just how formative our work has been to actualize that vision over the years.

We have used the time to integrate technology into our classrooms purposefully and thoughtfully. Because of this, our teachers and students were comfortable with Google Classroom and other G-Suite features when we transitioned to remote learning in March. Through the success of Google Classroom and the continuity of instruction it provides, we are excited to extend its use down to our youngest learners this year.

In the Google Reference application, we set a goal to move toward a 1:1 Chromebook program that would put a schoolissued device in the hands of every Rye Neck student. We are proud to announce that when we reopen on Sept. 8, we will have met that goal for our students in grades 3-12, while maintaining enough Chromebooks to support instruction for our K-2 students both in the classroom and at home as needed.

Our vision in 2017, and the approach we have taken to technology since, left us ahead of the curve when our buildings closed their doors in March. However, we know the success of our choices is because of our community's support. Learning to navigate online instruction, from Google Drive to Advanced Placement exams, required teacher creativity, student responsibility and parental flexibility.

As we look to reopen our doors for the first time in six months, we will rely on those partnerships, and we will use the lessons learned from this past spring to refine our use of technology to ensure engagement and achievement for every Rye Neck student.



Nicholas Saviano – Rye Neck Middle School/High School Teacher



Tenure Candidates

The Rye Neck School District is committed to recruiting and retaining excellent teachers. There are several mechanisms in place to ensure that our professional staff meets this goal, including ongoing feedback from the Superintendent, principals, department supervisors, directors and chairs.

Each of these professionals brings a unique and important perspective to the process and works individually with nontenured teachers to foster professional development and provide support. These professional relationships help staff members reflect on their practice, grow and make appropriate adjustments.

From a formal perspective, district administrators utilize a comprehensive evaluation process, frequently observing and evaluating each new staff member to offer suggestions, monitor progress and assess improvement. A four-year probationary period is required before new teachers/ administrators receive tenure and a three-year period for teachers who have previously held tenure in another public school district in New York State.

Parents can provide valuable insights and should do so, first to the staff member directly, since this feedback would be most helpful to him/her. Once parents have spoken to the teacher, they may also wish to share their thoughts with the individual building principal or supervisor.


