#### Talk Sup Week 38 Review and Preview

June 10, 2024

Good morning Sayreville! I hope you had a relaxing and enjoyable weekend. Welcome to another edition of Talk Sup, my weekly newsletter. Please remember that our schools will be <u>closed</u> next Monday, June 17<sup>th</sup> in observance of Eid al-Adha and next Friday, June 21<sup>st</sup> in observance of Juneteenth.

With the temperatures predicted to rise to close to 90 degrees by the end of the week, please remember that if they are expected to be above 90 degrees on any given day, we will dismiss students early on those days because the conditions in our schools, particularly those with two or more floors, will be unsafe. We will do our best to give as much advanced notice as possible if we were to call for an early dismissal due to extreme heat.



As you probably already heard, yesterday afternoon, a rack of about 25 solar panels caught fire for unknown reasons. Thanks to the swift action of the

Sayreville Fire Department, the fire was extinguished very quickly and therefore it was limited to just the solar panels. Also, no water penetrated the building and there was no structural damage to the roof. Therefore, the school will operate on a regular school day schedule today. For the time being, solar energy



generation at the school has been shut down until the vendor that installed the system can determine the cause of the fire and confirm that the panels are safe.

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
