Review of Norms: presented on agenda

Purpose of the School Leadership Team and the nomination of a chairperson for the SLT. Will help facilitate meeting as well as send emails and inquiries regarding needs or concerns. Dr. Patterson expressed that this will be a colleague facilitator.

Nominations: Michelle Taylor, Shauna Kelly, Elizabeth Willover. Ballots passed out and votes completed. Mrs. Loria took the ballots and Shelley Gualtieri counted the votes. Michelle Taylor: SLT facilitator chairperson.

Reviewed the four goals of the SLT and proposals.

Reading: 65% of students met growth

K, 2 and 3 over 80%.

Proposal: Continue the same performance goal as 2019-2020. By June 2020 at least 80% of students will meet or exceed expected growth in reading and math, as measured by mClass reading assessments and EOG results.

Proposal approved unanimously.

Proposal: During the 2019-2020 school year we will obtain laptops for all students in first grade, providing 1:1 devices for students in grades 1-5.

Members took allotted time to talk and discuss important ideas for the Goal of :Clyde Erwin Elementary has up-to-date, effective, and efficient systems to serve its students.

Discussion took place concerning the need and efficacy for all k-1 students to have a 1:1 device.

Revision of Proposal:

During the 2019-2020 school year we will obtain devices for all classes in K-1 to have 12 per class.

Proposal: During the 2019-2020 school year our Positive Office Referrals will outweigh office referrals for think sheets or ISS/OSS.

Proposal approved unanimously.

Proposal: By June 2020 our composite EOG percentage will increase by at least 3%as measured by EOG GLP Composite.

Proposal approved unanimously.

Review of subgroups and growth. Discussed TSI designation. Black, Hispanic and students with disabilities remain a concern with growth percentage and TSI designation.

September 17th and 18th are required professional development days to address differentiation for subgroups.

Requesting designated full time ESL teacher as number of ELL has grown over 50%.

Other goals: Increase training in IB and parental knowledge of the IB magnet program.

Salarled staff positions: Michelle Taylor Title One Coach : Clyde Erwin pays for 1/2 of Mrs. Taylor's position.

Title One funds down 40,000. The funding available will purchase American Reading Company materials for K-2 or K-1 (depending on affordability), IB training and PD.

Prioritized needs to consider:

High Poverty

Attendance and chronic absenteeism

Low performing status for three years.

TSI designation

Review and discussion of funding, budget and expenditures.

The SLT approved moving forward with the proposed Title One Plan.

Discussion of Planning for teachers. Some teachers have requested a switch on team planning. Must be a schoolwide decision and not by grade-level. Team planning must be decided either Monday or Friday. Discussion by Willover regarding TIPS. She proposed TIPS take place on Monday. The individual representatives liked Mrs. Willovers idea and wanted to make the change.

TIPS and Coaches/PD on Monday, Data teams on Tuesday and Wednesday, Thursday team planning, Friday is individual planning.
