

<p>How does the financial aid work if student changes their mind</p>	<p>There are different types of financial aid:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Free Application for Federal Student Aid or FAFSA—if a student has been awarded grants based on their financial need in FAFSA, that amount will remain and the application can be applied to any post-secondary school (think university, community college, cosmetology school, trade school, etc.) What is awarded may differ by school, but it can still be applied.</li> <li>2. Scholarship awarded by the college-In some cases, a student can defer their admissions which will preserve their scholarship. Each college will have their rules surrounding this how to defer and how long it can be done. Community colleges would prefer that a student applies when they plan to attend, and not to apply and then defer.</li> <li>3. Private scholarships that may be awarded to a student will follow a student to where they plan to attend, however, many of them may have parameters, such as must attend a 4 year university, etc. Each private scholarships will have their own rules so students would have to check with that entity to find out what happens if a scholarship is awarded, but the student changes their plans.</li> </ol>
<p>What is the process for transferring AP credits to community college?</p>	<p>Students would send their AP Scores from College Board to their community college and it will be reviewed for credit. Students would request this through their student AP account. They can login to their account here: <a href="https://apstudents.collegeboard.org/">https://apstudents.collegeboard.org/</a> If they don't remember their login info, they will have to contact College Board directly. <p>Should my student wait until they transfer to university or transfer AP directly to community college?</p>	<p>You would want to transfer your AP scores to community college and then again to the university they transfer to! Each college may offer different credits for the same score and a student might benefit different at each institution. You can use the College Board site to see how each college may award credit for</p>

<p>When should my student start to fill and submit the application for GCC?</p>	<p>Spring is perfect timing for seniors to register with Maricopa community colleges! If a student has taken dual enrollment credits at OC, they will already have a Maricopa Community College student ID and MEID. This makes it easy to apply to any of the other community colleges through their student center:  <a href="https://www.maricopa.edu/students">https://www.maricopa.edu/students</a>. Students are only able to enroll in classes at the locations to which they have been admitted, but can take classes across the entire district once they have completed the easy process of getting admitted at the various schools.</p> <p>If a student is new to the community colleges (and has not taken dual enrollment classes) you would start the registration process here:  <a href="https://www.maricopa.edu/become-student">https://www.maricopa.edu/become-student</a></p>
<p>We are potentially moving from Glendale, should my student register in Maricopa Community College and then specifically register to the Community College nearest to our new residence when we move?</p>	<p>You would want to apply to whichever college you plan to take classes with. Registration for classes opens in a few weeks and students will only be able to enroll in classes for the campus(es) they have been admitted. To have the best options for open classes, getting admitted to the locations the students wants to attend is best.</p>
<p>Presidential Scholarship through all Maricopa community colleges.</p>	<p>Any student that has a 3.25 unweighted GPA or higher, qualifies for four semesters of full time tuition through the Presidential Scholarship. Students awarded the Presidential Scholarship will automatically be part of the Honors program.
