Dr. Wyrick stated the Administrative Team was very pleased with the first Equity Meeting held in October. Dr. Wyrick stated the USD 506 District Site Council Meeting will be November 16 at 5:30 p.m. at LCHS Cafeteria. Dr. Wyrick announced LED Lighting was added to Harrison Gym this last week. Dr. Wyrick stated this makes all USD 506 gyms updated with the new LED Lighting and it looks amazing.

Shane Holtzman reported the LCHS Site Council meeting will be held November 16 in the LCHS Cafeteria, 4:00 p.m. Mr. Holtzman stated the LCHS Theatre Department Production of "The Theory of Relativity" will be held November 19-21 at Harrison Auditorium. Mr. Holtzman stated LCHS is very blessed to have students in the classroom and all Staff, Students and Parents are doing a great job. Mr. Holtzman stated LCHS currently has 34 Remote Learners, 19 Students in quarantine and 1 teacher in quarantine. Mr. Holtzman stated the 3 students that tested positive for COVID have all returned to the classroom. Mr. Holtzman reviewed the SEK League Basketball Attendance Guidelines with the Board. Mr. Holtzman stated the SEK League Guidelines will be reviewed with parents and students at the Winter Sports Parent Meeting on November 12. Mr. Holtzman reported new cameras have been installed in the LCHS Gyms for fans to be able to Live Stream basketball games.

Tiffany Flatt reported Altamont Grade currently has 17 students quarantined and 4 remote learners. Mrs. Flatt stated teachers and staff feel like there is more focus on teaching and learning this school year with no assemblies, class parties and other extras.

Donny Peak stated Meadow View Grade currently has 7 students quarantined and 9 remote learners.

Tim Traxson reported Edna Grade School currently has 1 remote learner and no students quarantined. Mr. Traxson stated the 506 Junior High Basketball Games will have limited fans this season. Mr. Traxson stated entrance to the basketball games will require a wristband for that certain game. Mr. Traxson stated the game format will be girls B & A games will be played first followed by a break. At the break all fans will leave and boys B & A team fans will enter. Mr. Traxson stated the USD 506 end of season tournament will be discussed at a later date. Mr. Traxson along with all the other Grade School

Administrators stated Little League will need to use the same USD 506 guidelines used for their league games if using school facilities.

Spence Allison reported Bartlett Grade School currently has 3 students quarantined, 1 teacher quarantined, 1 teacher tested positive with COVID and no remote learners.

Melissa Green reported Mound Valley Grade currently has 4 students quarantined, 1 staff member tested positive for COVID and no remote learners. Mrs. Green stated the Drive-Thru Chili/Soup Dinner went well Saturday evening. Mrs. Green stated the community really stepped up and supported the event.

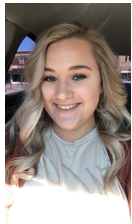

Transportation Corner for December of 2020 Parents

I just wanted to pass along some praise for our students and a few reminders that you can talk to your children about. Since the beginning of school, I have been able to fill in as a substitute driver for several of our drivers and I have also been able to do a few “ride-along” evaluations of some drivers. The following is what I have noticed that I would appreciate you knowing about and also passing along to your child.

#1. The majority of our students are doing an excellent job of wearing the masks while riding. Please remind them that it is impossible for us to social distance while on the bus so wearing the mask is essential in doing their part during this pandemic.

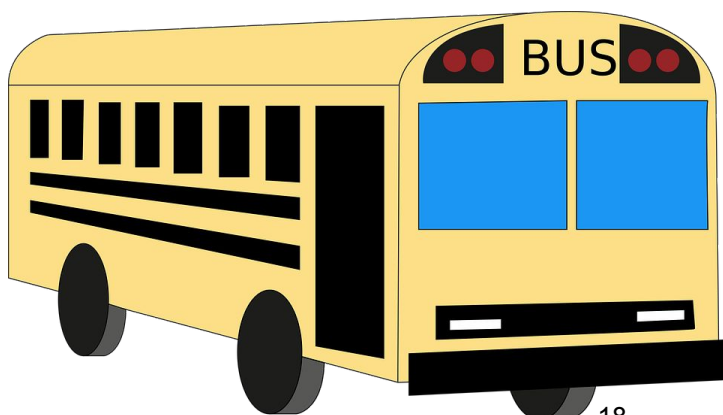
#2. The majority of our students follow our riding rules but we can always do a few things better.

#3. The majority of our students are pleasant and practice good manners. It means a lot to the drivers and to me when we get a “good morning” or “hope you have a good evening Mr. Bus Driver”. I would also note that our drivers do a great job of greeting and engaging the students as they enter or exit the bus. This may not seem like much but developing these “soft skills” such as how to appropriately engage with an adult go a long way in later life. With that said, a couple of things that our riders can do a better job of and help protect them as they ride include . . .

#1. If sitting next to the aisle the student needs to keep their body out of the aisle. Many students want to lean out to talk to someone across or at an angle or behind them. If the driver has to go hard on the brakes the student has a greater chance of being injured. Bus seats are designed using what is called “compartmentalization” but it is only effective if the rider stays fully in the compartment.

#2. The student sitting next to the aisle not only needs to keep their body out of the aisle but also their book bag. The greatest blind spot for the driver is that area directly behind the bus and being able to see out that back door glass is crucial. It is nice to know when we have a car in that spot and it decides to pass us.

On behalf of the transportation department we want to wish you a very Merry Christmas!

Since the beginning of school, I have been able to fill in as a substitute driver for several of our drivers and I have also been able to do a few "ride-along" evaluations of some drivers. The following is what I have noticed that I

would appreciate you knowing about and also passing along to your child.

#1. The majority of our students are doing an excellent job of wearing the masks while riding. Please remind them that it is impossible for us to social distance while on the bus so wearing the mask is essential in doing their part during this pandemic.

#2. The majority of our students follow our riding rules but we can always do a few things better.

#3. The majority of our students are pleasant and practice good manners. It means a lot to the drivers and to me when we get a "good morning" or "hope you have a good evening Mr. Bus Driver". I would also note that our drivers do a great job of greeting and engaging the students as they enter or exit the bus. This may not seem like much but developing these "soft skills" such as how to appropriately engage with an adult go a long way in later life. With that said, a couple of things that our riders can do a better job of and help protect them as they ride include:

#1. If sitting next to the aisle the student needs to keep their body out of the aisle. Many students want to lean out to talk to someone across or at an angle or behind them. If the driver has to go hard on the brakes the student has a greater chance of being injured. Bus seats are designed using what is called "compartmentalization" but it is only effective if the rider stays fully in the compartment.

#2. The student sitting next to the aisle not only needs to keep their body out of the aisle but also their book bag. The greatest blind spot for the driver is that area directly behind the bus and being able to see out that back door glass is crucial. It is nice to know when we have a car in that spot and it decides to pass us.

- **Health**

The single best way to prevent seasonal flu is to get vaccinated each year, but good health habits can also help stop the spread of germs and prevent the flu. Follow these everyday tips:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick. Keep your distance from others when you are sick, too. That means no work, school or running errands if you aren't feeling well.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. The flu is

spread by cough, sneezing, or unclean hands.

- Clean your hands. And do it often. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Don't touch your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread this way.

We have started a new project in the Precision Machining classes. The students are all building spring centers. These are used to hold taps straight when tapping holes using either a mill or lathe. We had one student, Dakota Payne, who has been selected to move forward to the second round in January. Lastly, students have been making contacts for letters of recommendation for upcoming scholarships after the first of the year.

Kylie Booth – English:

English I: Students have been reading short stories, diving into the fun world of fiction. They are currently writing their own creative stories based on "The Gift of the Magi" by O. Henry. This creative writing is really allowing the students to hone their figurative language and editing skills.

Pre-Composition: Students recently finished reading and reflecting on *Making the Most of Your Life: Eight Motivational Stories & Essays*. They also turned in their final

essay, which was a cause and effect essay that explored a relevant topic of their choice from today's society. Currently, they are working on their grammar and writing skills as they prepare for their upcoming final exam.

Composition I: Students have officially finished their work with *Frankenstein*. To wrap this novel up, students created and presented TED Talks about a topic that was relevant to both the real world and the ideas presented in the novel. Then we watched *Young Frankenstein*, a parody of the classic tale. Students had to write a compare and contrast essay that highlighted the differences between the novel and parody. Those differences had to relate to one of the following: themes, golem characteristics, motifs, or philosophical issues. Currently, they are working on their grammar and writing skills as they prepare for their upcoming final exam.

Floretta Haggard – Science:

The chemistry classes are learning the college prep method of writing up experiments. The students share their lab write ups with other members of the class. The labs are not conducted until the write ups have been approved. The write ups for two labs, Magnesium Magic and Fizz and Fizz, will be due this week. The labs will be performed next week. An evaluation sheet is completed for each student for each lab. This evaluation includes the write up and the conduction of the experiment. The lab is an essential part of the chemistry course. The lab is based upon the recommendation of college labs.

Broc Wolfe – Science:

Biology: Finishing up our Unit over Chemistry in Living things. This last lesson on it we are covering the importance and flexibility of Carbon. Also reviewing the four biomolecules (proteins, carbohydrates, lipids and nucleic acids) and their structures and qualities of each one.

Environmental Science: Enviro has been coving the Unit over populations especially human populations and how they are changing. We covered carrying capacity last week and will be doing a yeast population science lab to simulate carrying capacity this coming Friday 12/11/20.

Heather Wilson – Theatre:

Speech--

Our college speech students have recently completed the persuasive speaking unit, where they had to persuade the audience regarding their topic with a 5-7 minute speech, after analyzing the audience.

After Thanksgiving, they worked on extemporaneous speaking where they drew a topic and attempted to create a speech with very little time. Next up is a special occasion speech where they will choose a real life occasion (like a wedding, funeral, awards ceremony) and give the speech that is appropriate at that occasion. It's a very practical speech and helps them with real world soft skills.

2nd and 4th Hour Beginning Theatre--

These students are learning theatre vocabulary and creating improvisational skits to present those words. Also, they recently began reading the classic play, "Our Town" by Thornton Wilder as a class. They will analyze the play for theatre understanding, but it also presents the theme of living life to the fullest, and "appreciating life while you live it." Students will write thank yous to loved ones in their life.

6th hour Beginning Technical Theatre/Advanced Technical Theatre-- These students are learning about different famous musicals as a starter activity in class. Then we have been learning the basic unit of construction which is a flat. We have created practice flats out of cardboard and converted them to a 1"= 1' scale. We also have learned new painting techniques such as scumbling and stippling, and applied them to our practice flat. Soon we will be designing for the next production "Tarzan," after we get the script read and analyzed.

The LC Theatre Program and International Troup #6290: was recently awarded a superior rating in group musical from the performing of the song: "*Great Expectations*" that we entered into the KS/Texas/Oklahoma thespian festival in early November. This song that included 12 LCHS students and was awarded a bid to nationals to compete in the online festival in June. (Brooke Chavez Martinez, Paighton Hall, Kolby Kastler, Saige Smith, Jolee O'Brien, Anthony Pearson, Joseph Ramsey, Cadence Searles, Corbin Thomsen, Matthew Thompson, Abi Van Leeuwen, and Shelbi Wilson.) Dane DeTar also entered the song, "What Say You Meg" from the Last Ship and was also awarded a superior rating and will be able to attend nationals.

In addition, we competed in group design challenge and received excellent ratings, Lathe Smith competed in scenic design and received excellent ratings, Marlee Mikel participated in solo music theatre and received excellent ratings, and Brooke Chavez-Martinez competed in solo dance and received excellent ratings. We are proud of all these students! Brooke and Dane also both received over 30 callbacks from major colleges and universities from their college audition tapes that they sent out during festival. (Example University of Oklahoma, Hussian University of LA, and University of Texas, among many others)

The club and organization also just created care packages for college theatre alumni that graduated in 2020. Each year we give snacks and goodies and letters of support to those newly graduated. We hope it lifts their spirit and is a service project.

Ten new members of Troupe #6290 will be inducted in the formal induction ceremony on Wednesday, December 9 at 7:45 a.m. These participants had to be

involved in acting and technical roles in productions, equivalent to 100 hours of school theatre. We are proud of these new national ITS members. Now they are eligible for scholarships and awards.

IV Basketball-- The season is underway with 30 players and 3 managers. We are learning and growing as athletes and as young ladies. This sport is good for the team and its mental health as we are exercising and challenging our bodies and minds. We competed with a very solid Emporia team on Friday and battled the whole game.

Marty Warren – Electronics:

Fundamentals of Electronics- Students are learning OHM's law with Series, Parallel, and Series-Parallel circuits. The students are doing several labs using the meters to measure and calculate the necessary elements of the circuits.

Emerging Technologies- Students are covering different means of coupling amplifiers together to provide maximum amplification with minor distortion. They are currently building the Darlington-Pair amplifier which gives major gains in power, voltage, and current.

Digital Electronics- Students are learning different uses of building encoders and decoders to show how to change Decimal to Binary and back to Decimal. They are learning the different codes such as 8421, 7421, 6311, Bi-Quinary, 84-2-1, Gray, Hollerith, and Excess-3 codes.

Advanced Electronics- Students are working on individual projects such as meters, radios, televisions, heaters, weather forecaster, electric piano, and anything else that comes our way.

Lindsey Wilson – English:

In English III, we recently began our American Lit novel study over The Water Seeker, a historical fiction novel that takes place in the life and times of characters on the Oregon Trail. To set the stage for this novel, students were able to play the vintage 90's version of the Oregon Trail computer game, complete with many family members dying of dysentery or failed attempts of trying to ford the river. I was able to get a class set of these novels fully funded through a DonorsChoose campaign in October. We have been alternating between individual and group reading, as well as listening to the Audible audiobook version, which has an amazing narrator.

In Honors English II, we recently began reading Long Way Down by Jason Reynolds. Jason Reynolds is the 2020-21 National Ambassador for Young People's Literature. Students completed a pre-reading activity using a modified version of a "station activity". Instead of doing typical stations where students are moving from table to table, I created a hyperdoc with each station's activities listed so they could

Students have also been completing a digital workbook as we read. Here's a copy: [Long Way Down: Student Workbook](#) This format has been really great with regard to ease of use for students who are physically in the classroom and those students who are learning remotely. Through a "Wish List" campaign on Amazon.com, I was able to get enough copies of this novel donated so that we have a full class set of these as well. This is a fast-paced read that we will have finished before we leave for Christmas Break. The author narrates the story in the Audible audiobook version so we've been listening to him read portions, as well. This novel is written in free verse, which acts as a nice segway for us to move into our poetry unit when we come back from Christmas break.

Today, all classes were introduced to some extra credit opportunities through a new Choice Board platform. Students are able to choose 1 or 2 projects that they would like to complete for extra credit and then present their project via FlipGrid, which provides a space for class video presentations, as well as a space for students to provide feedback to each other. We have a lot of fun with FlipGrid!

Lisa Chapman – English:

Honors English 3 with Mrs. Chapman: We are in the middle of our study of John Howard Griffin's novel *Black Like Me*. My students and I have been engrossed in the paradox of the dreadful experiences wrapped up in the beauty of Griffin's writing of his 1959 social experiment. We are looking at the themes of appearance and identity (how a person moves through society noticed or unnoticed), unity and division (how our lack of dialogue with each other leaves us unable to understand), and fear and violence (how fear of the unknown or the misunderstood leads to the latter). We are learning a lot of new vocabulary and appreciating the beauty of skilled writing techniques at work inside of Griffin's words. As we finish the novel next week, I have teamed up with Mr. Reliford to discuss in the format of a focus group the experience of reading this important piece of literature.

English 2 with Mrs. Chapman: We are deep in the jungles of Vietnam with Tim O'Brien and the rest of Alpha Company as they fight this war and all of its

complexities in Tim O'Brien's novel *The Things They Carried*. We are looking at physical and emotional burdens, the fear of shame, the power of friendship, and how "stories [join] the past to the future." We are learning new vocabulary and military slang and looking at how O'Brien uses figurative language and stream of consciousness writing.

Kim McMunn – Health Careers:

Health II and IV are finishing their college classes. Medical Terminology had 28 students and all just took their finals. There are 6 that took CNA. Three already tested and received their certification and 3 more will be testing soon. We are starting CPR training. Mr. Leake and I have been working to get kids enrolled in LCC health related classes for spring since we still cannot do job shadowing. Students have the following options: CNA, Basic Nutrition, OSHA, Phlebotomy and Advanced Medical Terminology.

Health I and II have had many good speakers. (PSU nursing students did teaching on dental care, Mona Garrett about different cultures and health care, Chelsea Bradfield about being a nurse practitioner, Audra Cochran, our school nurse and Brandi Irish, recruiter from LCC to tell about all 5 health degrees offered at LCC.) Both classes continue to learn medical abbreviations and medical terminology.

Health II just finished giving their presentations about medical history. They have also learned about how different cultures look at health care differently. We have just started on medical math and how to use the metric system in health care. Health I has studied the skeletal system. Students read magazine articles related to current information for promoting healthy lifestyles and then presented info to the class. They have also learned about location and names of pulses as well as how to take their pulse. We have had discussions about changes in Health care in past 40 years and that they will continue to see changes as they go into the professions.

Teresa Leake – English:

My classes and I were honored and grateful to receive many wonderful classroom materials and alternate seating through Donors Choose this semester. Thank you to all our generous donors!

Freshman English classes are improving their writing skills and capturing their audiences by writing personal narrative stories. Personal narratives are stories about themselves where a lesson is learned as a result of the event. We anticipate reading them before Christmas break!

Why should your group open the Christmas present that is wrapped and sitting in our classroom? Senior English classes are collaborating as they write a persuasive speech to convince the teacher and class to choose them as the recipients of the gift. This is an enjoyable way to practice correct formatting of a persuasive paper.

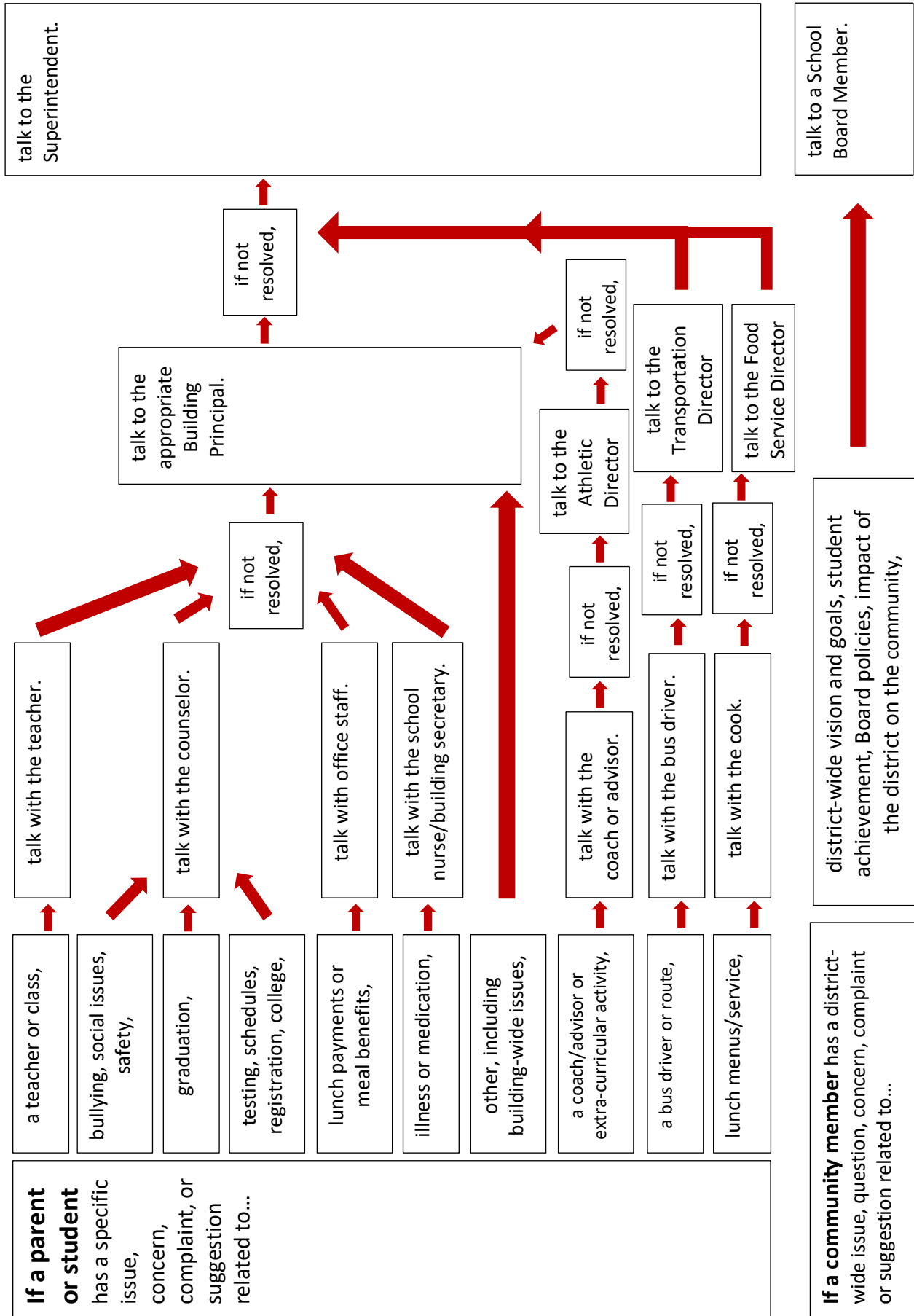
