USD 506 maintenance directors, Brent and Kenyon, have been working to secure bids to replace fifteen HVAC registers located on the high school campus. The registers to be replaced were installed in 1958.

I will ask the board to approve the purchase of 15 HVAC registers and to utilize ESSER II funds to help offset the cost of the purchase. Replacing the registers will allow for better ventilation and air filtration. The current registers don't have proper filtration mechanics. The new units will come with variable speed fans and 2-inch filters. We will ask KSDE and the ESSER committee to allow the district to use ESSER II money to purchase the registers. We received one bid from Charles D Jones Company. (A)




Psychology- Students have been learning about mental health disorders and their signs and symptoms. Students learned how you can help someone who might be experiencing a sign or symptom until professional help is available.



We are sending two seniors to CCC for the machining program next year. I'm hoping to spark more interest over the next few years and increase this number.

Floretta Haggard – Science:

The semester is ending with the seven gas laws. They are: Boyle's, Charles', Guy-Lussac', Combined, Dalton's, Ideal, and Graham's. The students are working diligently on the laws. They are given the equations and the answers to assist them in obtaining the correct answers. The students work in pairs. A review is given regarding the change in temperature because only Kelvin is used in gas law problems. With so many activities, students are coming in at 7:30 to get caught up.

Shawna Terrell – Vocal Music:

In the Choral Dept., we have had MANY wonderful things happening. We had seven students take solos to the state music festival, all receiving ratings of 2 or 3. Those students were Alyssa Barragar, Shelby DuVall, Connor Gegg, Marlee Mikel, Sophiah Reynolds, Grace Whittle, and Arrea Yancey. We had two women's ensembles receive ratings of 2 at the state festival. One small ensemble received a rating of 1. Choraleers, who participated in the state large group music festival, was judged by three judges. ALL THREE JUDGES gave us ratings of 1. STRAIGHT 1s at state! I couldn't be prouder of our students. Matthew Thompson, senior, signed with Pittsburg State University to major in Music Education. He received two different scholarships from PSU, totally in excess of \$2000 for next year. Currently, the choral students in all three choir classes are preparing to sing at Baccalaureate and Graduation. We are excited to finally get to stand on risers and perform this year!

Marty Warren - Electronics:

Foundations of Electronics- Students are finishing up with resonance frequencies in Capacitive and Inductive circuits, and also building passive low-pass, high pass, bandstop, and bandpass frequency circuits!

Emerging Technologies- Students are closing with Integrated circuits, electronic control circuits, and switching regulated power supplies.

Digital Electronics- Students will be completing Ram and Rom technologies.

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Teresa Leake – English:

Senior English: ELA Novel Units - Senior students just completed the novel *The Call of the Wild* by Jack London. They participated in an escape room designed to help them review the novel. Some of the topics covered included characters, a timeline of events, historical facts, and life in the Yukon.

Honors freshmen just finished an engaging novel, *I Am Malala* by Malala Yousafzai. The novel hooked my students on reading. They engaged in literature circles that participated in critical thinking and discussion activities. Malala was a young girl shot by the Taliban for standing up for education in her country of Pakistan. She survived and went on to be a Nobel Peace Prize recipient.

Freshmen classes are reading a novel of their choice allowing for individual interests and reading levels. Sharing their novels with the class through creative activities is enticing the class to want to read more. Some of these students are on their second novel in three weeks.

We also did a Fine Arts Signing Day-- on May 4 with four kids signing scholarship offers-- including the media, parents, friends and family. So excited for Dane DeTar who is attending University of Nebraska on an acting scholarship (D1), Hayden Pool who is attending Kansas University on a band scholarship (D1), Matthew Thompson who is attending Pitt State on a Choir Scholarship, and Sydney Neidigh who has signed at Coffeyville Community College for Color Guard.

Mrs. Chapman's English II classes: We are reading the novel *Night* by Elie Wiesel. Together, we are experiencing the beauty and the horror of Wiesel's words as he shares his experiences as a citizen of Sighet, Transylvania, and a prisoner of the Nazis in concentration camps in the 1940s. This novel helps my students develop an awareness of the evils that humans will perpetuate on other humans and the amazing mental, emotional, and physical strength that humans possess in times of strife. We look at the themes of the loss of innocence, man's inhumanity, relationships between fathers and sons, the struggle with guilt and inaction, living in delusion or denial, the importance of one's identity, and the power of words as truths or lies. We enhance our study with documentaries and poetry from survivors of the Holocaust. Students also have the opportunity to experience some time in what has been labeled "the box" by my former students. "The box" was built for me some years ago by Mr. Omarkhail and his students and is a replica of a standing cell from Block 11 in Auschwitz. After the kids have the experience in the box, they write a reflection about the feeling of confinement and control. They are always excited to get to go into the box, but when they come out, they say it was not what they expected. In the end, I hope they are more aware of our world and humanity because of this novel.

It has been a fantastic year in room 117. My kids have proven resilient in the face of a pandemic and have followed me on all of my whimsical journeys as we studied language arts. I am proud of them all.

Brianna Volmer – Physical Education:

In physical education classes we are wrapping up our school year with our football unit. We are finally at a point where we are comfortable with team sports in PE so we are catching back up! Students in English III and Honors English II will be wrapping up their book clubs next week, which we began in early April. Students had the option to choose from six high-interest contemporary novels provided or select a different title of their choice for independent/small-group novel study. Students then read, listened to audiobooks, met for group discussion, and worked through multiple enrichment activities alongside their reading. Our theme for this unit is Perspective & Bias. We discussed the importance of being able to acknowledge the value of different perspectives and how we can disagree respectfully. Students talked about how we can recognize the truth in someone else's experience without diminishing the truth in our own. We also talked about how bias can present itself in many different forms and many times it can be unintentional. Students explore how bias can factor into an author's writing. Throughout this unit, I have encouraged students to disagree whenever possible! I have pushed them to step outside of their comfort zone a bit and share their thoughts, even if they don't align with all other members in their groups. I have monitored and guided them to practice being respectful of each other's views and mindful of the way in which they share their own. Their conversations and discussions have been completely organic and student-led, with

only a few written prompts from me and the suggestion to practice sharing different views as often as possible here, in the safety of our school, so that when they leave Labette County High School, they will have the skills to navigate the world beyond. And I must say... the future is looking very bright!

These students have blown me away with their engagement with the text, their critical thinking skills, and their ability to discuss challenging topics in a mature and respectful way.

Great things are happening in my science classroom.

Chemistry is currently finalizing their Acids and Bases unit by building volcanoes and exploring which acids and bases work best for a reaction in the volcano. They are currently building the papier mache models and will set off their volcanoes later next week. For their final project, each student is researching a Chemist and they are writing the obituary for the chemist and constructing a headstone for presentation on the final day of class.

Anatomy and Physiology is finishing up a digestive system unit, and will be spending more time dissecting the cats in order to explore the digestive system more completely. As they finish the cat and the digestive system, they will then take the knowledge they have gained about a system in the body and build a theme park as their final project. These theme parks get very creative and interesting!

Honors Biology is finishing a unit on comparative anatomy and are starting the dissection of a fetal pig. They will explore the systems and organs of the pig and compare them to our human systems. English I: The freshmen students finished To Kill A Mockingbird with a thematic essay. They are now working through a poetry unit. We have looked at several acclaimed poets, such as Walt Whitman, Emily Dickinson, Edgar Allan Poe, and Maya Angelou. They have compared traditional poems to modern-day songs in terms of rhyme scheme, tone, and theme. Next, they will be working through poetry stations


