A Note from Mrs. Flatt: We were able to hold our Grandparents Day Program this past Oct. and had a wonderful turn out. The students sang songs, gave their grandparents a tour of the building, enjoyed a muffin and juice and had their picture taken. It was nice to see so many grandparents. They mentioned also that they were happy to be back in the building.

Parent Teacher Conferences: Altamont Grade School is happy to report that during our fall conferences we had 96% of our families attend. Teachers reached out to the families of those that did not attend.

Professional Development: During month of Oct. teachers gathered together in their grade level teams to discuss their first common assessment scores. Conversations about what they thought went well with their common assessments, and what they would change for the 2nd common assessment. First grade stated that they will change the wording of their word problems on their common assessment to match the verbage they use in the classroom. This is powerful professional development that will improve classroom instruction and also the mastery of skills.

What's happening in the classrooms:

K - TSW count objects & write numbers 1-10. Students will form numbers with different materials and count misc. Items.

1 - TSW use doubles to add, TSW will make words with ch -

2 - TSW will be able to tell you the sequence of the story.

3 - TSW works on the model of the communicative property of multiplication and use it to find products.

4 - TSW is able to describe a character in a story, drawing on details in a text. They will refer to details in the text to make an inference.

5 - TSW wrote a paper about candy corn using the 4 types of author's purpose. (To entertain, to inform, to entertain, to persuade)

6 - TSW explores how early people lived in Mesopotamia and compared it to your way of life.

7 - TSW multiply and divide rational numbers

8 - TSW creates models of molecular structures of compounds in science class.

ENGLISHI

The four elected officials will then "sign off" on the multiple choice section of their final. This allows the students to participate and to feel some accomplishment within their education.

What's new in the HS Science Department?



HAPPY HALLOWEEN! We're off to see the Wizard! Science Department, with the help of our hallmate, DJ Walker, pulled off turning our East hallway into the Land of Oz. All were in character and had a great time with the students!







Mr. Schaper's Chemistry class is also staying busy, studying how electrons are arranged in atoms, as well as the arrangement of the periodic table. The chemistry students recently took part in the "flame-test lab," which left them feeling like real chemists! They thought it was pretty cool how different elements and compounds are used in fireworks to produce vibrant, and different colors!

Mr. Cochran's Earth and space science students began coursework studying the night sky. The hands-on learning for this unit involved a nighttime observation of the sky using a telescope. Students were able to view Jupiter and Saturn at the last home football game of the season with well over 100 participants! Mrs. Waugh's Environmental Science classes are getting ready to test on the unit "Human Impacts on the Environment". Topics in this unit have included, "Human Population Growth and the Environment", "Human Impacts on Biodiversity", and "Engineering Solutions to Environmental Impacts".

Physics: During the month of October the physics students have been investigating projectile motion. This included a laboratory experience where Nerf arrow were launched at an angle measured using a smartphone which allowed for a calculation to determine the initial velocity of the projectile.

Mrs. Phillips's Zoology classes just wrapped up the final frontloading of information, so they are ready to start learning about the Animal Kingdom. In October the students worked through Classification, Dichotomous keys, and. Phylogeny. Now that we know how animals are all the same, we're going to start learning about how they are SO different!

Mr. Schaper's Anatomy and Physiology has progressed from foundational topics and moved into studying body systems. Work on the Integumentary System (skin) has just finished up, and the classes are now beginning the skeletal system. The "paper tower lab" will be utilized early in this unit to study how the skeletal system is both strong, and light, simultaneously. The students are also looking forward to the planned dissections which will begin in a few weeks. Mrs. Waugh's 1st, 3rd, 5th, and 7th hour biology classes just finished taking Unit 2 test on "Chemistry in Living Systems". Students learned about chemical bonds and reactions and participated in a lab on the "Chemistry of Soap and Stains". The second part of the unit was on carbon-based molecules and their structure and function Students labs were completed on observing diffusion and osmosis.

Mr. Cochran's chemistry students have been studying chemical formulas and nomenclature. A laboratory experiment involving the reaction of polyvinyl alcohol and sodium tetraborate produced a memorable reaction and allowed students to sharpen their analytical skills.

Things are still moving along quite smoothly in Coach Schaper's classes. The new lab in Room 112 is still proving to be quite valuable. General Science has moved from basic chemistry to basic physics for the 2nd nine weeks, including a speed and velocity lab which was done outside on a beautiful morning.

Honors Biology has been working hard on Chemistry of the Cell and just finished testing for that unit. During the unit they did an acid/base lab to discover what household items fall at certain points on the pH scale. Some of the substances were a surprise! Pepsi that they drink everyday was VERY acidic, which made them think twice about drinking it!

Mrs. Phillips's Environmental Science Class has been studying Human Population and how it affects the world we live in. Sustainability has been at the forefront of our studies. Students looked at their ecological footprint and how they could reduce it. They have also been working through Tragedy of the Commons and protecting resources for each other.
