Dr. Wyrick reported a new storm siren will be installed at Meadow View Grade School and will be 90% funded by FEMA Grant. Dr. Wyrick stated the total amount of the siren will be approximately \$40,000 and total cost to USD 506 will be around \$4000. The siren will be in place by March 1, 2023 and will be a huge benefit to the entire county.

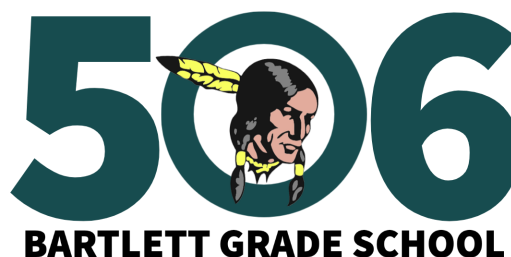
Support Your Child's Learning

Educational Leadership

- Student Council is sponsoring a food drive for the Mound Valley United Methodist Church. Students will bring food to school from Dec. 7-Dec. 15th. Student Council will deliver the food to the church. We love to help our community.
- We had our Site Council meeting on November 17 at 5:30 at the High School cafeteria. Jim Zaleski spoke to the group about Economic Development in Labette County and how it can benefit USD 506. Economic Realignment was discussed. Money was sent to Labette County programs such as food banks, child care, Labette Assistance, and many others. Moderate Income Grant was discussed. USD 506 is hoping to apply for a \$100,000 grant, with the help of a city, to build 3-5 moderate income houses in Bartlett. The application must be completed by February. The hope is that with the neighborhood revitalization, families will move into some of the smaller towns in USD 506 district and bring students to our schools. This will also help our economy by providing jobs for their parents. The houses projected to be built in Bartlett would be: 1200-1500 sq feet, 3-bedroom, 2 bathrooms, attached garage, \$160,000-\$170,000 target price.
- Student are in the process of taking the winter Fastbridge assessment. We will have team meetings to discuss their progress.
- I have been observing teachers during walk throughs and using the KEEP evaluation tool for formal observations.
- Junior High teachers have implemented their eMints project with the whole school. Our 8th grade students presented to all the students a video they created to help give ideas on how to be more active throughout the school day. Each week we have a one-to-three-minute activity called Morning Moves to encourage more movement. Students seem to enjoy Morning Moves!

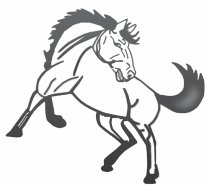

WHAT'S HAPPENING in Science?



Mrs. Waugh's 2nd and 6th hour Environmental classes will be testing on Unit 4 this week, "Population and Ecosystem Dynamics". They have been learning about factors that affect the carrying capacity of ecosystems at different levels, factors affecting biodiversity and populations in ecosystems, and evaluating interactions in ecosystems necessary to maintain stable conditions. (See attached pic of activity Tragedy of the Commons.

Mrs. Waugh's 1st, 3rd, 5th and 7th hour Biology classes just finished a unit on "Matter and Energy in Living Things". Learning experiences included how photosynthesis transforms light into stored chemical energy, the chemical process of cellular respiration, the cycling of matter and energy in aerobic and anaerobic conditions, and the cycling of matter and energy in various ecosystems. Classroom labs included Cellular Respiration and Exercise and Aerobic and Anaerobic Processes in Yeast. Students are also completing an Informational Biome Brochure. Classes are currently studying Unit 5 "Cells, Stability and Change". Finals for all Biology classes for Mrs. Waugh will be Thursday, December 15th.

Mrs. Phillips's classes have been filled with lots of discovery and the trepidation of upcoming finals. We're going to make it, but the students think maybe not. ☺

Honors Biology: We finished our unit on Cells and then into how cells import and export wastes and nutrients through Diffusion. Students did a lab on food coloring diffusing in agar, and osmotic solution effects on a potato. We're finishing up the very tough subject of photosynthesis and cellular respiration this week and then moving into review for the comprehensive final next week. Lots to do and so little time to get it done!

Zoology: Students have wrapped up information on Cnidarians (sponges, jellyfish, sea anemones, and flatworms). We were able to get out the dissecting microscopes for a closer look at natural sponges and their make-up. It's amazing what is housed inside these primitive animals! They will begin building a Zoo for their final project. It looks to be some great cross curricular work with some math concepts as well as science!

Environmental: Environmental just finished a unit on food webs, food chains, energy movement in an ecosystem and succession. They created "life" out of non living leaf material by adding water and sunlight. They were very excited to see little life swimming around in the microscope. We are starting the unit on Biomes and they will be responsible for researching a Biome and creating a diorama of the biome to present to the class as their final. Exciting things happening in Environmental!

Chemistry

Mr. Cochran's chemistry students have been working on stoichiometry and chemical reactions. This intense analytical analysis has challenged students to process complex equations.

Physics

Students in Mr. Cochran's physics class have been working on a deeper understanding of gravity. This is demonstrated in the upcoming December challenge problem where students have to explain the astrophysics that allows for the calculation for the mass of the Sun.

Earth/Space

Earth and Space students have been studying the solar system. One particularly memorable lesson involved the modeling of the celestial distances from the Sun to each planet. This project began at the northwest corner of the LCHS campus with the Sun the size of a basketball and the location of Neptune being at the football practice field!

Gearing up for finals has had everyone a little on edge, but classes are progressing along nicely in Coach Schaper's corner.

Physical Science is finishing up their unit on physics, focusing lately on Newton's three laws of motion. They recently did a lab demonstrating all three laws, utilizing the new lab room we have in the science wing.

Anatomy and physiology completed the unit on the skeletal system and has moved on to the muscular system. Labs for A&P have included putting together a disarticulated skeleton, and most recently a lab involving the effects of muscle fatigue fine motor skills and reaction time.

Chemistry has focused on bonding in the recent weeks. Particularly, ionic bonding. We are currently discussing the differences and similarities between ionic and covalent bonding. A hands on laboratory experiment is planned for this week which will show the differences in melting points and conductivity.

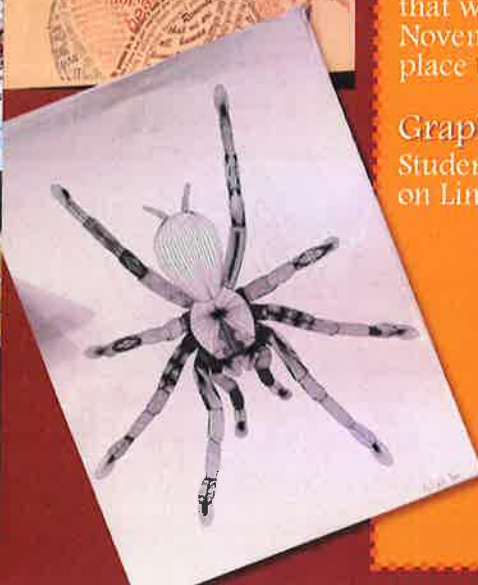

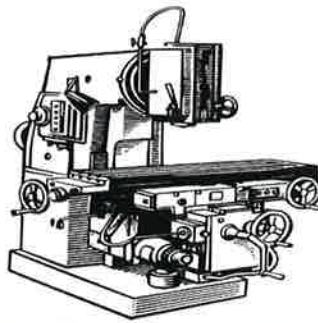
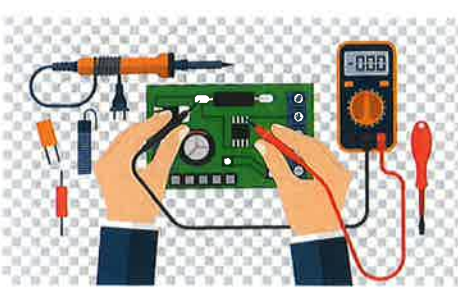
Foundations of Electronics: Doing lab experiments over series and parallel circuits.

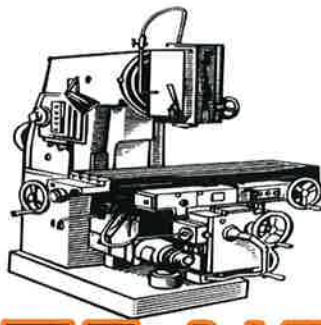
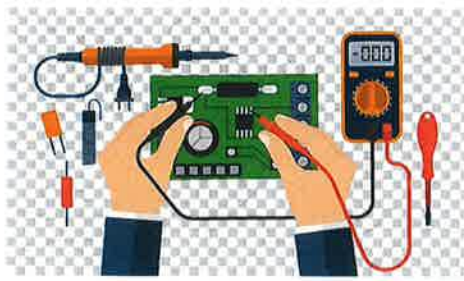

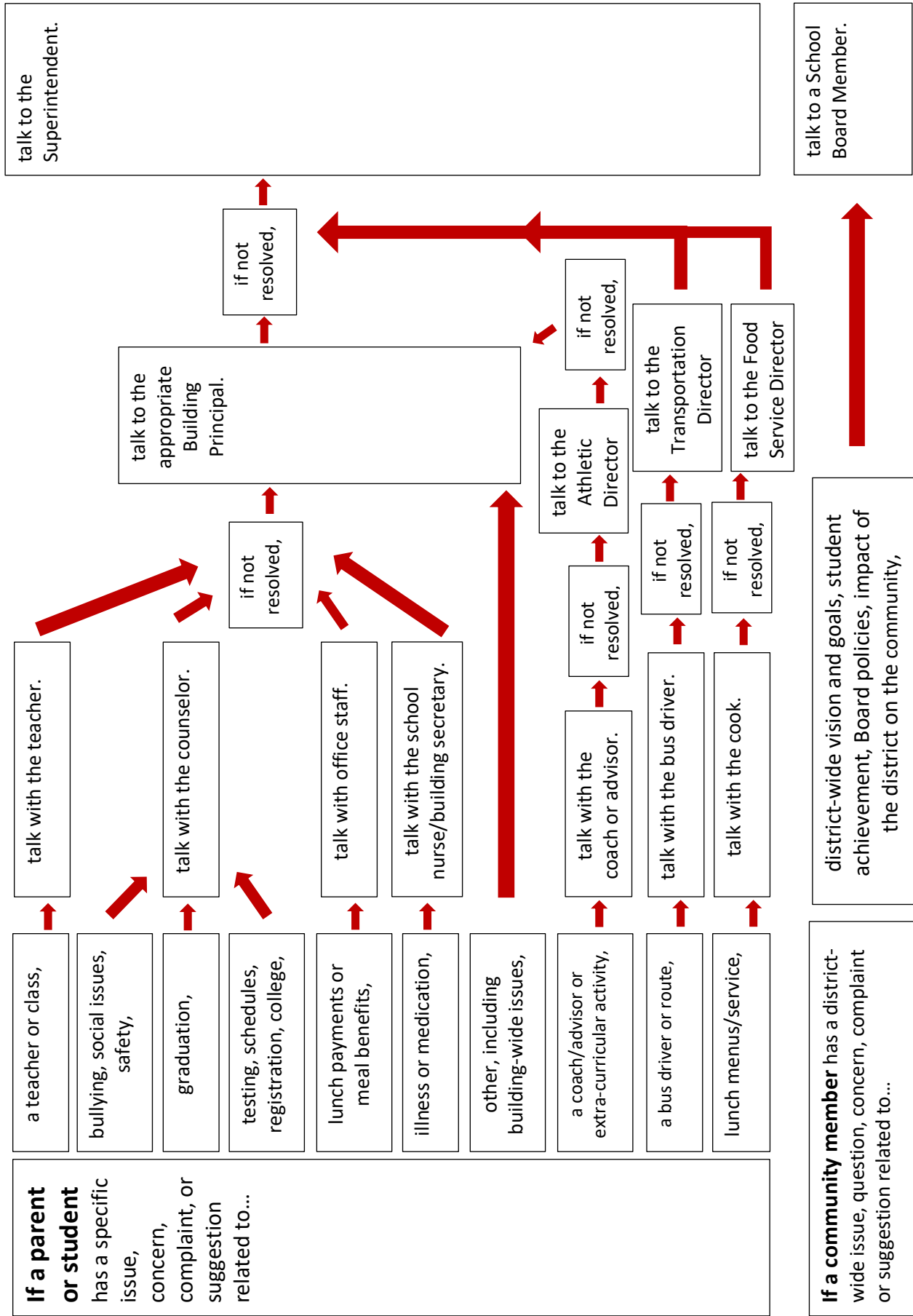
