

Eligible students are invited to apply on BigFuture https://bigfuture.collegeboard.org/ during their sophomore or junior year and are awarded at the start of the next school year in time to share their achievements in high school as they plan for the future.

# SILK SCREENING IN STUDIO ART



Mrs. Maguire's Studio Art class is designed around art careers. Students learn that art is all around us, from the chairs we sit in, the clothes we wear, the cars we ride in, to the school we learn in. Artists create our world!

The first art career that the students learn about is Graphic Design. Graphic Design is the art of combining text and pictures in advertisements, magazines, books, t-shirts, etc. Students were able to create their own t-shirt design. Then, they used the silk screen process to print their shirt. Silk screening is a type of art that originated in Asia, where prints are created through a process where a stencil is used, and ink passes through a mesh material. # REMINDER FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE



The district's School Health Services program supports your student's academic success by promoting health in the school setting. One way we provide care for your student is by performing the health screenings as mandated by the State of New York.

During this school year, the following screenings will be required or completed at school:



#### **VISION**

- Distance and near acuity for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K or Kindergarten, Grades 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.
- Color perception screening for all newly entering students.



#### **HEARING**

- Hearing screening for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K or
- Kindergarten, Grades 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.



## **SCOLIOSIS**

 Scoliosis (spinal curvature) screening for all girls in grades 5 and 7, and boys in grade 9.

A letter will be sent home if there are any findings on the screening done at school that would cause concern or need medical follow-up. Please call the school's Health Office if you have any questions or concerns.

New York State law also requires a health examination for all students entering the school district for the first time and when entering Pre-K or K, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 11th grade.

If you have not yet sent in a copy of your child's health exam please do so as soon as possible. If we do not receive a copy of the exam, one will be done at the school.



# **GUIDANCE COUNSELOR OFFICE NEWS**

It has been a great start to the school year with several Admission Counselors from area colleges visiting and meeting with students. Through these meetings, students have the ability to learn what colleges have to offer such as various degree programs, campus life, athletics, and scholarships. These visits were followed up with a trip to Oneida High School for a college fair where many Junior and Senior students



**CLASS OF 2024** – Deadlines are quickly approaching and applications to colleges should have already begun. The following is a list of steps/checklist of things that need to be completed as you apply to college:

- 1. Financial Aid (FAFSA) the Free Application for Federal Student Aid is the entrance point for all federal and state financial aid. All students and their parents/guardians should complete this form ASAP when it opens in December of this year. https://fafsa.ed.gov/
- 2. Take the SAT or ACT. Every college will have different requirements although many of them are test optional, taking the SAT or ACT can help your chances to get into colleges. Please see the college website to see what exams will be required. It is recommended to take the exams by December in order to get your scores in time to apply. Deadline for the SAT in December is November 4. Please see Mrs. Gleason with any questions.
- 3. Talk to teachers/community members/employers for letters of recommendation. You will want about 2 to 3 letters. Be sure to ask for these letters prior to submitting your application and have them submitted directly to me.
- 4. Apply to your college of choice. If you need assistance applying, Mrs. Gleason is more than willing to assist you through the process. There are several different ways to do so:

- a. One popular option is the Common App. This application can be used to apply to over 700 different colleges. You can find the app at coapp. org.
- b. Interested in only SUNY schools? SUNY has their own app you can use to apply to. This can be found at suny.edu.
- c. If you are planning on starting off at a community college, apply directly to their website. Many community colleges will waive the fee if you do so.
- 5. Once you have applied, see Mrs. Gleason. She needs to know so that she can send in your transcripts, etc.
- 6. Periodically check the Senior Class Google Classroom for updated information regarding scholarships. Many deadlines for scholarships approach quickly so check regularly so that you don't miss out.

CLASS OF 2025 – Prior to your Senior year, it is recommended that you take your SAT exam. Colgate University offers a FREE SAT Preparation Course that begins in the end of January and meets once a week up until the SAT in May. Registration deadline for this course is December 1. This is a great opportunity to take advantage of and if you have any questions or for the information on how to register, please stop down to the guidance office or email SATPrep@colgate.edu




