As the year wound down and our students were preparing for Regents exams and graduation, we decided to do something fun by offering a Bring Your Tractor to School Day. On June 1, 2023, our students took the opportunity to drive their tractors to school for the day. Logan Brown, Gabe Smith, Edward DeMenezes, and Braden Renner, all brought Here at Stockbridge Valley, students have the opportunity to earn college credits either on campus as a dual enrollment course or off campus at the actual college site. The 2023 graduating class has earned a combined total of 435 college credits averaging around 21.75 credits per student! This is equivalent to over one semester of college and has little to no cost to the student. These credits come from Tompkins Cortland Community College, Mohawk Valley Community College, SUNY Morrisville, and Colgate University.





On May 24th, our Cougar Times Newspaper Club took a field trip to the WSTM3-CNY Central-CW6 News Studios in Syracuse. We were able to visit the control rooms where the engineers, news producers and directors put the daily news broadcasts together. The club then sat in a morning editorial meeting where the multi-media journalists discussed the status of current news stories they are covering with Sean Carroll, WSTM-CNY Central News Director and if needed, had new stories assigned to them. We were introduced to one of the videographers whose only job is to go out at night and film all the crime scenes, accidents and bad stuff that happens while we are sleeping. Dangerous, but important work!

We got to meet Connor Wight, Maggie DeRosiers, Morgan Scott and Brandon Roth who many of us see on the local news every day. Stories they were working on were lead poisoning in children, a meeting with Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer and the hot button issue right now in Syracuse is about their School Superintendent arbitrarily changing, without community input, the start time of school to a half hour earlier in the morning starting next year. Sean challenged our club to think about how a decision like that would affect our community and the students at SVCS.

Then we got to the best part of our tour – the actual studios. We got to sit behind the anchor desks and have fun with the green screen. We learned how teleprompters work and how the cameras have special hidden mirrors inside them to help the anchors read the news without looking away from the cameras. Other fun parts of our visit included tours of the outdoor Weather Deck, a close-up look at the Weather Authority One Jeep and the Orange Zone podcast studio.

At the end of our tour,

Amy Collins, Station Manager gifted the group with CNY Central t-shirts and pencils, thanking us for our interest in broadcast journalism. We learned a lot of cool and interesting things about how TV news is put together and all the jobs we could explore in the future if we wanted to work in broadcast television. We came back feeling inspired about some of the things we could "talk" about in the Cougar Times for 2023-2024 school year!

# REMINDER TO ALL PARENTS/GUARDIANS REGARDING THE UPCOMING 2023-2024 SCHOOL YEAR

If your child will be taking medicine at school, provider and parent permission forms are needed for both prescription and over the counter medications. New medication permission forms are required each school year.

# NEW YORK STATE LAW REQUIRES THAT:

- Parents or guardians must personally deliver all medication to the school health office (unless a self-carry order form is signed by <u>parent</u> and <u>physician</u>). All Controlled Medications must be brought in by an adult.
- All medication must remain in properly labeled pharmacy or original over the counter (OTC) containers.
- A new prescription/medication form signed by the medical provider is required at the beginning of every school year.
- The parent must sign the medication permission form.

We request that you ask your pharmacist to give you a second identically labeled container for any prescription medications your student will take at school. We also request that you bring small containers of any OTC medications that your student will take. This will allow the School Nurse to send these medications on field trips and comply with New York State laws pertaining to medication storage.

Medication forms may be obtained from the School Health Office, or your physician may use their own form if desired.

New York State law also requires a health examination for all students entering the school district for the first time and when entering Pre-K or K, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th , and 11th grade.

Students entering these grades must have a valid physical dated on or after September 7, 2022. Health certificates are required to be submitted within 30 days from the start of the new school year. In regards to vaccinations, New York State Law requires the following for school entrance in the fall:

# **KINDERGARTEN:**

 5- doses of Dtap (unless the 4th dose was on or after their 4th birthday), 4- doses of Polio (unless the 3rd dose was on or after their 4th birthday), 3- doses of Hepatitis B, 2- doses of MMR, and 2- doses of Varicella.

# **SIXTH GRADE:**

• 1-dose of Tdap by age 11

# **SEVENTH GRADE:**

• 1-dose of Menectra (meningococcal ACWY)

# **TWELFTH GRADE:**

• 2-doses of Menectra (meningococcal ACWY), unless the 1st one was received on or after their 16th birthday

# Appropriate certification of immunizations is required for students to attend school in the fall.

# 2023 - 2024 BMI SURVEY

As part of a required school health examination, a student is weighed, and his/her height is measured. These numbers are used to figure out the student's body mass index or 'BMI'. The BMI helps the doctor or nurse know if the student's weight is in a healthy range or is too high or too low. Recent changes to the New York State Education Law require that BMI and weight status group be included as part of the student's school health examination. A sample of school districts will be selected to take part in a survey by the New York State Department of Health. If our school is selected to be part of the survey, we will be reporting to New York State Department of Health information about our students' weight status groups. Only summary information is sent. No names and no information about individual students are sent. However, you may choose to have your child's information excluded from this survey report.

The information sent to the New York State Department of Health will help health officials develop programs that make it easier for children to be healthier.
