SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear SVCS Families and Community,

We have had a very busy and productive start to our school year. As you can see in this issue, we have so much taking place in our schools. Providing students with a well-rounded education through rigorous instruction, a variety of extracurricular programs and athletic opportunities ensures our students will be well prepared when they graduate from Stockbridge Valley Central School District.

NEW PARTNERSHIPS:

We have forged a number of new partnerships this year. These include partnerships with the Manufacturer Association of Central New York (MACNY), SUNY Morrisville and Onondaga Community College (OCC). The MACNY partnership will allow Juniors and Seniors hands-on career exploration, networking and future apprenticeships. The partnership with SUNY Morrisville will provide SVCS students the opportunity to take a number of college courses on the SUNY Morrisville campus. Our partnership with OCC focuses on providing college credit bearing courses in Electromechanical Technologies. These new partnerships will provide our students with authentic learning opportunities in today's ever-changing job market.

UPCOMING VOTES: ON TUESDAY, MARCH 14, 2023

Stockbridge Valley CSD residents will have the opportunity to vote on two propositions.

PROPOSITION 1 - CAPITAL PROJECT AND PROPOSITION 2 - BUS REFERENDUM

improvements are essential to providing a safe, high-quality learning environment for our students. Our District and Board of Education are committed to continued and ongoing improvements that address all facets of our District. While we have completed a number of projects over the years, it is necessary to continually update and improve our facilities to meet the evolving needs of all learners. You will hear more about this in the coming weeks.

BUS REFERENDUM: This year we will be proposing the purchase of one 65 passenger school bus and one 28 passenger school bus. These will replace Bus #103, (2011 bus with 76,156 miles) and Bus #108 (removed from service and sold May 2022). Regular replacement of buses and school vehicles over the past few years has allowed the district to reduce its maintenance costs, thus creating significant savings for District taxpayers.

I would like to thank each of you for your commitment to our District and programs. Working together, we will continue to provide the best educational opportunities for our students. I look forward to your continued support. Collaboration as a community makes us stronger.


Paige Webb - Is in her 6th year as a KODA athlete - is a member of the U18 KODA Home team and has



It's a particularly important time of year for Juniors as they have a lot to do to start preparing for their Senior year and post-secondary plans.

JUNIORS

It will get very busy for you from now until the beginning of your senior year. You will need to do several things to get yourselves ready for graduation.

We will discuss these in your Junior meetings but here is a short checklist of things you need to begin doing:

- ✓ Register for your SAT's in April or May. Get them done and out of the way now or give yourself time to retake them in case you need improvement.
- ✓ Visit colleges! This is a great opportunity to meet potential professors, admission counselors, and other students.
- ✓ Start looking into scholarships. The College Board has several that you can start completing. Visit collegeboard.org or check out the google classroom.
- ✓ Fill out your brag sheet to help create a resume. Some colleges/scholarships may ask for a resume or you'll need it to find a job post graduation.

SOPHOMORES

Your schedule next year is critical. Although you may start to meet many of the requirements for graduation, it's important to continue to challenge yourself. Take advantage of the trips to BOCES to explore CTE options to see if that is the right direction for you.







WHEN TO KEEP A CHILD HOME WITH ILLNESS

It can be hard to know when to send children to school if they tell you that they do not feel well. Usually, the best place for them is in school, but there are some times when keeping them home to rest or call for an appointment with your health care provider is recommended.



Please keep your child home and/or contact your child's doctor for:

- Fever greater than 100.0° (taken by mouth)
- Vomiting and/or diarrhea within the last 24 hours
- Severe sore throat along with fever and feeling ill for more than 48 hours, or after exposure to Strep throat infection
- Honey-crusted sores around the nose or mouth or rash on other body parts
- Large amounts of mucous (liquid) from their nose, with face pain or headache
- Severe ear pain or fluid coming from the ear
- Severe headache, especially with fever



If your child has a fever, it is not a good idea to give them medicine like Tylenol or Advil and send them to school because as soon as the medicine wears off, the fever may return and you will be called to come and pick up your child.

Please keep children home for 24 hours after the fever ends or they have completed 24 hours of medication if prescribed by your health care provider.

If you find your child is frequently asking to stay home from school, if they are falling behind or appear anxious about school, or if there does not appear to be any physical symptoms, contact your school nurse and your health care provider to discuss your concerns.

Remind children to throw away used tissues, cover their mouths when they cough or sneeze, keep their hands away from their face, and to wash hands often with soap and warm water will help keep everyone healthier.

Attendance Matters

Missing just 2 days per month can impact academic success



Did You Know?

- Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track for graduation.
- Absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, or facing some other potentially serious difficulty.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, regular attendance is a predictor of graduation rates.
- Missing 10 percent (about 18 days) of the school year can drastically affect a student's academic success.
- Attendance is an important life skill that will help your child graduate from college and keep a job.

What Can You Do?

Make school attendance a priority.

Help your student maintain daily attendance routines.

Help your student stay engaged in school.

Know the school attendance policy

Encourage meaningful afterschool activities, including sports and clubs.

Communicate with the school.

Try not to schedule medical and dental appointments during the school day.



Chronic Absenteeism: 18 or more days. Lost classroom time is lost opportunities to learn. Missing just one day every two weeks adds up to 18 days in a year.



Warning: 10 to 17 days. Students who miss an average of 15 days a year will miss a whole year's worth of school before their senior year.



Good Attendance: 9 or fewer absences. Students with good attendance generally have higher grades and enjoy school more. Students benefit from attending school regularly and on time.
