

10%, or approximately 18 school days per year, their academic achievement has proven to decline and students begin to further fall behind each year. To help incentivize student attendance, we have created an attendance challenge. This challenge provides bagels or donuts to the grade level of students that have

the fewest unexcused absences. This past month, both eighth grade and ninth grade tied for the fewest absences. We ask that everyone keep up the hard work and that families help support our efforts by, as always, having their children attend school when they are not sick. Thank you for your continued effort and support with this initiative.

Five-week reports have gone home to all families. If your child is struggling in a given area, please have him/her discuss with the teacher ways to get help to learn the material and help improve their academic performance. SENIOR RECEIVES COMMENDATION IN THE 2023 NATIONAL MERIT® SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Principal, Lisa Hopkins of Stockbridge Valley Central School District announced on September 21 that Tristan Ellerbruch has been named Commended Student in the 2023 National Merit Scholarship Program. A Letter of Commendation from the school and National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC*), which conducts the program, was presented by the principal to this scholastically talented senior.

STUDENTS LEARN PRINTMAKING IN STUDIO ART

Students of the Studio Art classes have been learning the old technique of relief printmaking. Relief printing is a form of printmaking in which the image to be printed is raised from the surface. The most common processes used for relief printmaking is woodcut, linocut, and metal cut. Studio Art students are using soft linoleum to carve into. Their finished prints will have three different ink colors. In order to have the three colors show, students need to carve into the linoleum three different times. It is a long process, but the results look amazing! Here are some pictures of some students during this process. 
Student Pick-up and Drop-off Reminders - If you are dropping off your child after 8:15 a.m. or visiting the school for any reason, please come to the elementary tunnel and push the doorbell. While waiting, fill out one of the pink forms on the table between the two sets of doors. We will bring your child to you or come and get them to join us. Thank you for all that you have done to make our regular morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up go so smoothly this year. Please remain in your vehicles during the drop-off and pickup of your children to allow the lines to move quickly. If you must get out of your car, please remain in line until you are the first car in front and then exit your vehicle. By doing this, we can allow cars behind you that are already unloaded or loaded to leave the line. The numbers for regular parent pick-ups continue to allow us to load cars quickly while families remain in their vehicles.


6TH GRADERS STUDY STONE AGE

REMINDER FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE



The district's School Health Services program supports your student's academic success by promoting health in the school setting. One way we provide care for your student is by performing the health screenings as mandated by the State of New York.

During this school year, the following screenings will be required or completed at school:



VISION

- Distance and near acuity for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K or Kindergarten, Grades 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.
- Color perception screening for all newly entering students.



HEARING

- Hearing screening for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K or
- Kindergarten, Grades 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.



SCOLIOSIS

 Scoliosis (spinal curvature) screening for all girls in grades 5 and 7, and boys in grade 9.

A letter will be sent home if there are any findings on the screening done at school that would cause concern or need medical follow-up. Please call the school's Health Office if you have any questions or concerns.

New York State law also requires a health examination for all students entering the school district for the first time and when entering Pre-K or K, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 11th grade.

If you have not yet sent in a copy of your child's health exam please do so as soon as possible. If we do not receive a copy of the exam, one will be done at the school.

BOYS VARSITY SOCCER TEAM ARE THE 2022 CENTRAL COUNTIES LEAGUE (CCL) CHAMPIONS!

For the first time in school history, the boys will be raising a banner as they finished undefeated in the league. The merged team with Morrisville-Eaton features five seniors who have led the team statistically to this incredible feat. Seniors Ben Jantzi and Riley LaLonde are the leading goal scorers on the team with 16 and 15 goals, respectively. Morrisville-Eaton senior Evan Baker is second on

the team to Jantzi in assists with 11, and seniors Charlie Cross and Connor Clark have anchored the defense who have held 8 shut out games.

The team was able to clinch a share of the title when they defeated rival Madison under the lights at V.V.S. on October 8. The team won 2-1 with Jantzi scoring both goals for the Cougars. The team then sealed their banner year when they defeated McGraw on the road on October 11 3-0. Baker and LaLonde each had a goal, while junior Evan Enslow capped the scoring with a goal, as well.

The team led the league in several statistical categories as well. The Cougars finished with a league high 66 goals on the season and a league best 17 goals

against. Jantzi and LaLonde both finished second and third, respectively, in goals scored, and Janzti and Baker finished as the top two assists leaders in the league. The Cougar defense also led the way in fewest shots given up, and goalkeeper Braden Renner finished with a league high save percentage of .840 (with a minimum of at least 2 shots faced).





Not only has the team won the first league title in school history, but they have tied the school record for most wins in a season. Senior Captain Jantzi said, "A large chunk of us have focused on this goal since middle school. It feels amazing for us to achieve our goal." Jantzi had a team high 50 points on 16 goals and 18 assists this season, after missing the two previous years with leg injuries. Senior Charlie Cross said, "This is

something that has been in the making for a long time! The core of our team has been working hard year round for the last 5 years. It just feels even better that this year's seniors get to end it like this."

The Stockbridge Valley FFA Competed in many different Career Development Event (CDE) competitions at the New York State Fair. We competed in Poultry Identification, Tree Identification, Meats Evaluation, Wildlife Identification, Vegetable Crops/ Horticulture Identification, Dairy Foods and Environmental Science. Members also participated in the CNY and Empire Gladiola show as well as volunteering at the Milk Bar and making gladiola corsages at the State Fair.

The poultry team was made up of Tristan Ellerbruch, Rowan Cady, Alexis Mazzye, and Amanda Brown. We had one member place in the top ten, Tristan Ellerbruch who placed 1st in individual and the team took home the top honors in the state. The poultry team will advance to the National FFA Convention where they will represent New York in the national contest in late October.

In Tree Identification, we had three members place, Jade Nystrom placed 8th in junior and Alex Cullen placed 4th. We had one senior high member place which was Abby Smith who placed 10th. The teams were Alex Cullen Jade Nystrom for junior. Edward DeMenezes, Abby Smith, Dylan LaFave, and Marilyn Jones for senior.

In Meat Evaluation, Alex Cullen placed 1st and Jade Nystrom placed 3rd in junior. The junior team won 1st place which was Jade and Alex. In Wildlife Identification the chapter had three members place. Alex Cullen took 3rd and Jade Nystrom took 9th place in Juniors. One member placed in Seniors which was Abby Smith in 7th place.

Our chapter's Junior team took 3rd for wildlife. The environmental science senior team was Edward DeMenezes, Abby Smith, Dylan LaFave, and Marilyn Jones. In Vegetable Crop ID, those same three members placed: Abby Smith placed 6th, Jade Nystrom placed 10th and Alex Cullen placed 3rd in the Junior Vegetable Crop. The Jr. team was Alex Cullen, Jade Nystrom. Senior team was Abby Smith, Dylan LaFave, and Rebekah Cullen. We also had a team in Dairy Foods - Madison Nolley, Marilyn Jones, and Alexis Mazzye.




