UPCOMING VOTES

On Tuesday, March 8, 2022 we will be proposing the purchase of one large school bus and one four-wheel drive maintenance truck w/ plow. These will replace Bus #106, (2011 bus with 76,384 miles) and a Maintenance truck (2007 with 27,036 miles). Regular replacement of buses and school vehicles over the past few years has allowed the district to reduce its maintenance costs, thus creating significant savings for district taxpayers. **A Public Hearing will be on March 1, 2022 at 6 p.m. in the school library.**

On Tuesday, May 17, 2022 we will hold our annual school budget vote for the 2022-23 school year. Every year we review each line of our budget and assess the current needs of our district. Along with the school budget vote, community members will also have the opportunity to vote for school board members. There are two seats up for reelection this year. **If you are interested in serving on the school board, petitions will be available in the District Office from March 18 through April 18. If you have questions, please contact Pam Mennig at 315-495-4400.**

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MESSAGE FROM THE 7-12 PRINCIPAL

Hello Stockbridge Valley Families,

WHAT DOES THE NEW YEAR MEAN?

A fresh start, new beginnings, recommitting to goals? Here at Stockbridge Valley, we are focusing on an optimistic 2022. We hope for a year of positivity and normalcy. Events such as Prom, Senior Night, Honor Society Inductions, field trips, etc., are back and in full capacity, and I look forward to celebrating our students with you!

ACADEMIC POLICY

After a hiatus last year, due to COVID and remote learning, we have brought back our Academic Policy. For all students, our priority is their academics and overall well-being. With both of these in mind, we create the Academic Eligibility list. If a student fails one or more courses at the five-week mark or the end of the marking period, they are automatically placed on the list. Once a student is added to the list, they must get three blue passes a week stating they received extra help where it is needed. Any high school teacher can give students a blue pass.



As long as we see students are making a good effort, they will continue to be eligible for all clubs, activities, and sports. Mrs. Gleason and I meet with each student individually the first time they are on the list to go over the policy and check-in. Our goal is to see the list dwindle more and more each marking period. I update the list every five weeks when the teachers submit grades.

WHAT IF A STUDENT IS PASSING BEFORE FIVE WEEKS HAVE PASSED?

They are still required to get blue passes from their teacher stating they are passing but do not have to stay for extra help. We want to track all students for the full five weeks to ensure their grades do not slide back down below 65.

NATIONAL 4TH GRADERS DAY

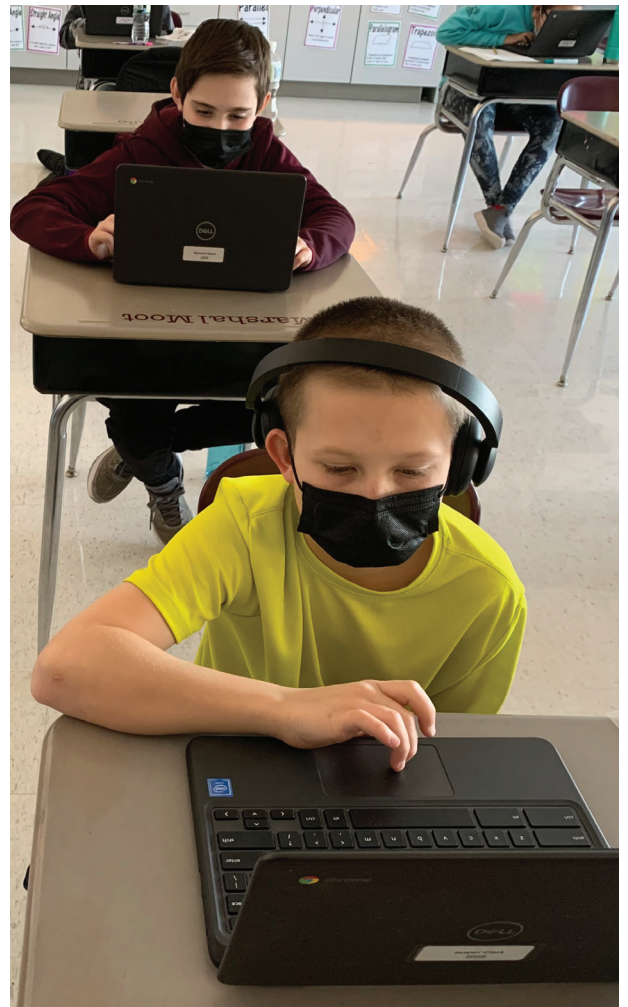
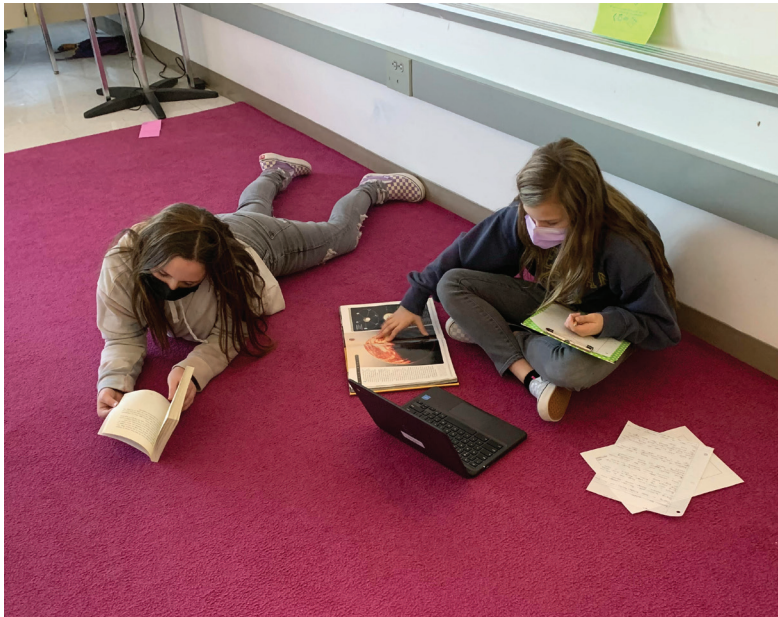

MESSAGE FROM CASSANDRA GLEASON K-12 COUNSELOR

Dealing with Quarantine after Exposure to COVID-19

Staying home and away from others after having close contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19 can be stressful, boring, frustrating, and scary for us and our children. It can also affect our mental health. However, it is necessary to do so to slow the spread of the virus within the community. The good news is, we have now learned some ways to better prepare for and cope with these disruptions.

Here are five tips for coping through a quarantine period:

1. **Develop a plan before you need it. If you haven't come up with a quarantine plan yet, now is the time. Plans allow us to feel a sense of control and ease our stress. Plan for seven to 10 days at home.**
 - If possible, for your family, keep two weeks worth of non-perishable food items in your pantry, and make sure that any prescriptions you take will last that long, too.
 - Keep a supply of gloves, antibacterial wipes, cleaning products, masks and tissues on hand.
 - Make sure that you have a thermometer and an over-the-counter fever reducer.
 - Discuss a support plan with local friends or family members, should one household need the other to drop supplies and groceries on the porch.
 - Help your kids come up with a plan for completing schoolwork. This may involve talking to their teachers and school staff.
 - You can also encourage your kids to get the phone numbers or contact information for their friends or their parents so that they can stay in touch if sent home.
2. **Talk to your doctor. Your physician can confirm the currently recommended length of time to quarantine and provide directions for you to follow should you become symptomatic.**
3. **Maintain your routine. When so much is out of our control, taking charge of our schedule can be helpful. Continuing your daily routine as much as possible can keep you grounded in a stressful time. This includes:**
 - Going to bed and getting up at the same time you normally do.
 - Working, studying and eating at the usual times.
 - Getting dressed and leaving your bedroom; if possible, do school and work outside of the bedroom so that you do not disrupt your sleep patterns.
 - Building in rest time for everyone for creative, relaxation, or physical activities.
 - Limiting the use of screens outside of work and school.
4. **Keep morale up. This situation is temporary, and children can learn a lot about dealing with these difficult times as you demonstrate your own skills. To help keep morale up:**
 - Keep in touch with family and friends via phone, email, or social media. Your kids will also benefit from keeping in touch with friends through technology.
 - Move your body regularly: exercise has been proven to reduce stress and depression.
 - Answer children's questions in a positive and age-appropriate manner.
 - Spend time outside as much as the weather allows.
 - Come up with special at-home family activities that you wouldn't normally be able to do...and do them! Have your kids help you come up with new ideas.

5. Maintain (or develop) healthy habits.

- In addition to exercising, make sure everyone is drinking enough water and eating healthy foods.
- Read instead of spending time on screens.
- Check-in with each other.
- Get as much sleep as you can.

A quarantine period allows us to take extra time for self-care, so take advantage; once you can be back out in the world, keep those habits going!

With planning, positivity and a little creativity, quarantine can be tolerable, and quite possibly better than you imagined!

JUNIORS

- Register for your SAT's in April or May. Get them done and out of the way now or give yourself time to retake them in case you need improvement.
- Visit colleges! This is a great opportunity to meet potential professors, admission counselors, and other students.
- Start looking into scholarships. The College Board has several that you can start completing. Visit collegeboard.org or check out the google classroom.
- Fill out your brag sheet to help create a resume. Some colleges/scholarships may ask for a resume or you'll need it to find a job post graduation.

SOPHOMORES

Your schedule next year is critical. Although you may start to meet many of the requirements for graduation, it's important to continue to challenge yourself. Take advantage of the trips to BOCES to explore CTE options to see if that is the right direction for you.

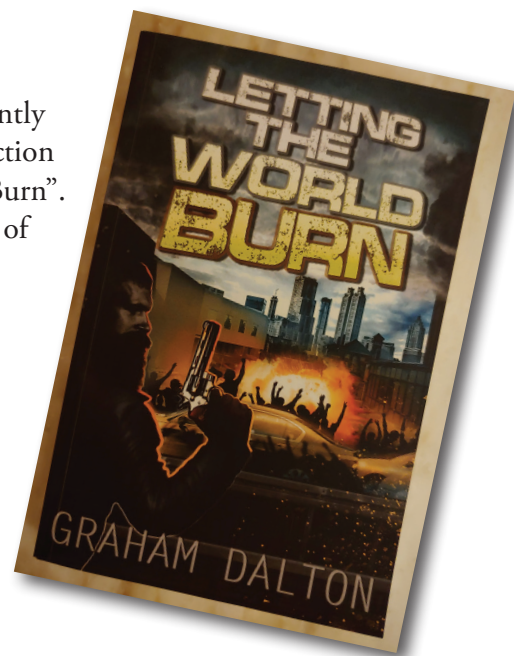

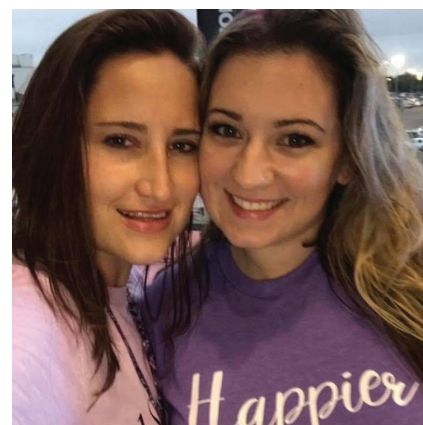
THERE ARE AUTHORS IN OUR MIDST!

REMINDER FROM THE HEALTH OFFICE

The Stockbridge Valley Central School district Health Services program supports your student's academic success by promoting health in the school setting. One way that we provide care for your student is by performing the health screenings as mandated by the State of New York.

During this school year, the following screenings will be required or completed at school:

Vision

- Distance and near acuity for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K or Kindergarten, Grades 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.
- Color perception screening for all newly entering students.

Hearing

- Hearing screening for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K or Kindergarten, Grades 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.

Scoliosis

- Scoliosis (spinal curvature) screening for all girls in grades 5 and 7, and boys in grade 9.

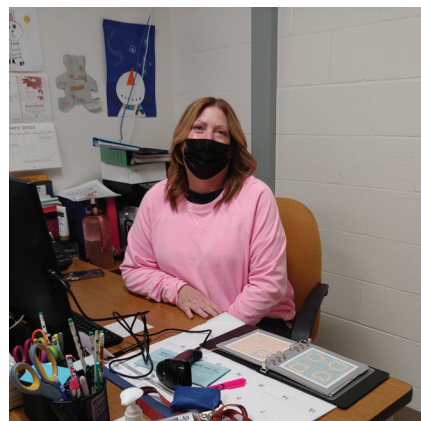
A letter will be sent home if there are any findings on the screening done at school that would cause concern or need medical follow-up. Please call the school's Health Office if you have any questions or concerns.

New York State law also requires a health examination for all students **entering the school district for the first time and when entering Pre-K or K, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 11th grade.**

If you have not yet sent in a copy of your child's health exam please do so as soon as possible. If we do not receive a copy of the exam, one will be done at the school.

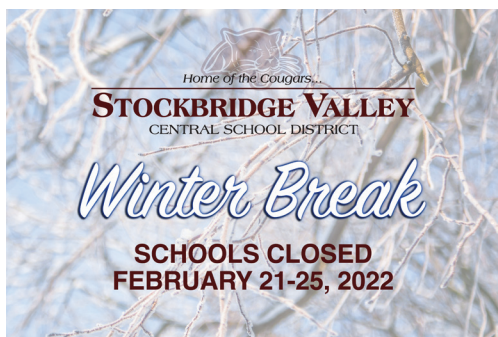
