
subjects and teachers. Please talk with your child about their schedule and who their new teachers are.

# FFA STUDENTS RECEIVE NATIONAL GRANTS

\$1,000 Bayer SAE grant has been awarded to 10th grader, Tristan Ellerbruch and a \$1,000 Farm Credit SAE grant has been awarded to 9th grader, Madison Nolley.

SAE grants are designed to help FFA members create or expand Supervised

Agricultural Experience (SAE) projects, a requirement that all FFA members must complete. An SAE requires FFA members to create and operate an agriculture related business, work at an agriculture-related business or conduct an agricultural research experience. Upon completion, FFA members must submit a comprehensive report regarding their career development experience.

Tristan will be using his grant money to grow his SAE in bee keeping. Tristan currently has one bee hive in his father's apiary and with this grant will add 3 to 4 new hives and purchase items to market his honey. Madison will use her grant money to start a SAE where she will build planter boxes to grow dahlias and sell them at the local farmers market.

This year 23 different sponsors made 29 different types of SAE Grants available. A full list of sponsors

Tristan and Madison are members of the Stockbridge Valley FFA Chapter. Their applications were selected from among 5,968 applications nationwide.

The National FFA Organization is a school-based national youth leadership development organization of more than 760,000 student members as part of 8,700 local FFA chapters in all 50 states, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

art in this competition and for their engagement they will receive an aeroponic tower garden with a value of over \$1,200. The judging panel agreed that, "Sarah's work in pastels beautifully and accurately captured each agricultural commodity."

The challenge was to engage students in creating original art with the inspiration of the food and agriculture of New York State. Students were vying for the grand prize of having their art featured on an upcoming educational state map of food production, with

the artistic impressions serving as map icons. Over one hundred budding artists from every corner New York State created over 1,000 unique pieces of agricultural themed art, and we are very pleased to announce the winner as Sarah Hofmeister of Stockbridge Valley Central School in Madison County.

A jury of NYAITC and professional artists from the View Arts organization were tasked with identifying

young artists to display their works in the upcoming art exhibition "The Art of Agriculture", as well as select one top artist. The winning artist's work will become the digital icons for NYAITC's new digital commodity map resource to be released in Spring of 2021.

To be considered for the top honor, students had to create 26 unique art pieces from a list of 26 commodities, food, and natural resources produced in New York State.








# SVCS FIRST GRADERS HAVE BEEN HARD AT WORK!

**S - Specific** (What exactly will you do?)

M - Measurable (How will you know if you meet your goal?)

**A - Achievable** (What steps will you take to reach your goal?)

**R - Relevant** (What about your goal makes it important to you?)

**T - Timely** (When do you want to complete your goal?)

If your child needs any assistance in setting up and developing goals, please contact me at any time. I am more than happy to help!

Things will be picking up quickly in the counseling office with scheduling and course selections for next year. I will be meeting with students to discuss options and post-secondary plans. It's a particularly important time of year for Juniors as they have a lot to do to start preparing for their Senior year and postsecondary plans.

#### **IUNIORS**

It will get very busy for you from now until the beginning of your senior year. You will need to do several things to get yourselves ready for graduation. We will discuss these in your Junior meetings but here is a short checklist of things you need to begin doing:

- Register for your SAT's in April or May. Get them done and out of the way now or give yourself time to retake them in case you need improvement.
- Visit colleges! This is a great opportunity to meet potential professors, admission counselors, and other students.
- Start looking into scholarships. The College Board has several that you can start completing. Visit collegeboard.org or stop in and see me for details.
- Fill out your brag sheet to help create a resume. Some colleges/scholarships may ask for a resume or you'll need it to find a job post graduation.
- Keep an eye on your Google Classroom you have with me. I post a lot of information in there!

#### **SOPHOMORES**

Your schedule next year is critical. Although you may start to meet many of the requirements for graduation, it's important to continue to challenge yourself. Take advantage of the trips to BOCES to explore CTE options to see if that is the right direction for you.



#### 1 Information on SMS text messaging and Short Codes

SMS stands for Short Message Service and is commonly referred to as a "text message". Most cell phones support this type of text messaging. Our notification provider, SchoolMessenger, uses a true SMS protocol developed by the telecommunications industry specifically for mass text messaging, referred to as "short code" texting. This method is fast, cure and highly reliable because it is strictly regulated by the wireless carriers and only allows access to app If you've ever sent a text vote for a TV show to a number like 46999, you have used short code texting.

#### **REMINDER:**

New York State law requires a health examination for all students entering the school district for the first time and when entering Pre-K or K, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 11th grade.

If you have not yet sent in a copy of your child's health exam please do so as soon as possible. If we do not receive a copy of the exam, one will be done at the school.

Beginning on 1/31/21, schools cannot accept the health exam if it is not on the required form or the required health record equivalent.

We have attached a copy of the required form for your health care provider (HCP). Please share the attached form at your child's visit for a health exam with the health care provider (HCP). This is typically your doctor but may be a nurse practitioner or physician assistant.

If your child has to quarantine or isolate due to COVID-19 please be sure to send in a copy of their release orders from the Madison County Health Department.
