It's a particularly important time of year for Juniors as they have a lot to do to start preparing for their Senior year and post-secondary plans.

JUNIORS

It will get very busy for you from now until the beginning of your senior year. You will need to do several things to get yourselves ready for graduation. We will discuss these in your Junior meetings but here is a short checklist of things you need to begin doing:

- Register for your SAT's in April or May. Get them done and out of the way now or give yourself time to retake
 them in case you need improvement.
- Visit colleges! This is a g eat opportunity to meet potential professors, admission counselors, and other students.
- Start looking into scholarships. The College Boa d has several that you can start completing. Visit collegeboard. org or stop in and see me for details.
- Fill out your brag sheet to help create a resume. Some colleges/scholarships may ask for a resume or you'll need
 it to find a job post-graduation.

Sophomores

Your schedule next year is critical. Although you may start to meet many of the requirements for graduation, it's important to continue to challenge yourself. Take advantage of the trips to BOCES to explore CTE options to see if that is the right direction for you.

Attendance in School

Now more than ever attendance is critical for all students. Did you know that a student is considered chronically absent when they miss 10% of school days, excused or unexcused? At this point, a student would be considered chronically absent if they have missed around 8 days. Academic success, truancy, dropping out, delinquency, and substance abuse all directly correlates with student attendance.

If your child struggles with getting to school, there are several things that you can do to help:

Make school attendance a priority

- Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day, make that the expectation.
- Help your child maintain daily routines, such as finishing hom work and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and medical appointments during the school day.
- Don't let your child stay home unless they are truly sick. Complaints of headaches or stomach aches may be signs of anxiety.

Help your teen stay engaged

• Find out if your child feels engaged by his/her classes and feels safe from bullies and other threats. Make sure he/she is not missing class because of behavioral issues and school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, work with the school.

- Stay on top of academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors if necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- Encourage meaningful afterschool activities, including sports and clubs.

Communicate with the school

- Know our school's attendance policy incentives and penalties
- Talk to teachers if you notice sudden changes in behavior. These could be tied to something going on at school
- Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not piling up.
- Ask for help from school officials, afterschool ograms, other parents or community agencies if you're having trouble getting your child to school.

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EXTRA HELP FOR STUDENTS

In order to help students who are struggling academically in school, we have a policy in place that provides students additional help. Below is the extra help policy as stated in the student and parent handbook on page 33:

Extra Help

- **A.** Students who are failing any subject are required to receive extra help with the teacher 9th period (2:40-3:16) on Tuesday Thursda .
- **B.** If a student is unable to attend during the provided time periods, he/she must have a written excuse from his/her parent or guardian. The student is also equired to schedule a make-up time with the teacher. The teacher will verify in writing that the student attended the mutually agreed time.

If at any point your child is failing one or more subjects, they need to stay after school during the extra help period. If your child does not stay after then participation in any extra-curricular activities could be jeopardized. If you have questions pertaining to the classes they are failing, please contact their teacher first

PETERSON BROTHERS VISIT SVCS

The eterson Farm Brothers entertained and educated students and adults from Stockbridge Valley and surrounding communities about the importance of agriculture. Brothers Greg and Nathan made the trip to upstate New York from their farm in Kansas, while their youngest brother, Kendal, stayed home to help man the farm with their father. Ray and Barb Lighthall provided accommodations for the Peterson Brothers and their wives during their stay here.

The b others, along with their sister, Laura, grew up on their Kansas farm which has been in their family for fi e generations. The were always trying to convince their city friends about the importance of agriculture and that "farming was cool." In 2012, while in college, oldest brother Greg had the idea to reach people by entertaining them through social media. He convinced his younger brothers to help him make a music video. They pa odied the lyrics from "I'm Sexy and I know It" into "I'm Farming and I Grow It." The b others set the goal that after a few years the video would reach 50,000 views. They sent the video to friends who sha ed it with their friends. By the next morning, they had 20,000 views and the local newspapers were calling them for interviews. The foll wing day all three Kansas TV news stations were parked in their yard. On day four, Fox News called asking to fly them to ew York City for an interview. In two weeks, their video had over 5 million views in 200 countries.

The eterson Brothers have gone on to produce sixteen music videos to date. They pe formed several for the Stockbridge community including "Farmer Style" ("Gangnam Style Parody) in which they invited youth from the audience to accompany them on stage. After the show, the brothers invited everyone to join them for a meet and greet.

WHEN TO KEEP A CHILD HOME WITH ILLNESS

It can be hard to know when to send children to school if they tell you that they do not feel well. Usually, the best place for them is in school, but there are some times when keeping them home to rest or call for an appointment with your health care provider is recommended.

Please keep your child home and/or contact your child's doctor for:

- Fever greater than 100.4° (taken by mouth)
- Vomiting and/or diarrhea within the last 24 hours
- Severe sore throat along with fever and feeling ill for more than 48 hours, or after exposure to Strep throat infection
- Honey-crusted sores around the nose or mouth or rash on other body parts
- Large amounts of mucous (liquid) from their nose, with face pain or headache
- Severe ear pain or fluid coming from the ear
- Severe headache, especially with fever

If your child has a fever, it is not a good idea to give them medicine like Tylenol or Advil and send them to school because as soon as the medicine wears off, the fever may return and you will be called to come and pick up your child.

Please keep children home for 24 hours after the fever ends or they have completed 24 hours of medication if prescribed by your health care provider.

If you find your child is frequently asking to stay home from school, if they are falling behind or appear anxious about school, or if there does not appear to be any physical symptoms, contact your school nurse and your health care provider to discuss your concerns.

Remind children to throw away used tissues, cover their mouths when they cough or sneeze, keep their hands away from their face, and to wash hands often with soap and warm water will help keep everyone healthier.


