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SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

It is a priority of the Board of Education and the district to present a budget that is both fiscally and instructionally sound. The district continues to assess efficiencies and address needs with fiscally sound decisions. The tax increase this year is 2.44%.

Highlights from the budget include:

(Note: For a property with a market value of \$80,000.00 the increase in taxes is approximately \$24.00 per year. These figures will vary slightly depending on the resident's township.)

The Expenditure Increase this year is 2.44%.

The Board of Education and I would like to thank the community for passing the bus referendum in March. The safety of your children is our primary concern. Purchasing a new bus and selling one of our older buses each year generates the maximum amount of transportation aid and keeps the cost of the bus as low as possible. The Board of Education and I also thank the PTSO, Stockbridge Valley Educational Foundation, the American Legion, the Ruritans, the Booster Club, and many community members for their continued support of our students. Tuesday, May 14 is the budget hearing and the Board of Education candidates will speak to the community. The Budget vote is May 21, 2019 from 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Thank you in advance for voting!

Mission:

Since I began at SVCS in 2015 the district has focused on putting students first by building culture, community, and curriculum.

The district has taken several steps to develop the culture and community in the school. Among these are branding our district as a Culture of Hope and living by these standards. The district is incorporating the Capturing Kids Hearts EXCEL process into our practice at SVCS. Currently staff and faculty are being trained, along with several other districts in our area, in the EXCEL model. This model incorporates specific and consistent methods when working with our students.

Our Culture of Hope incorporates the COUGAR traits developed by the student body, building partnerships with the community through the adoption of our new logo, enhanced website, and continual improvement of communication. Most important, our Culture of Hope makes the safety and wellness of our students, staff, and faculty the highest priority. Our first Smart Bond project was completed this year and added several more cameras. The district is planning to add other school safety features as well. Look for more details in future newsletters.

Student achievement remains a priority at SVCS. We have focused our efforts on curriculum development, professional development, dual credit offerings, and partnerships with business. Student achievement is measured through our 3-8 assessment results, regents results, dual credit offerings and our graduation rate.

The district has worked diligently to bring more dual credit classes to our school. We continue to increase these offerings and we are proud to say that we have students graduating with enough credits to enter SUNY and CUNY schools as sophomores.

All of these achievements cannot be completed without your help and support. I am very proud of Stockbridge Valley CSD and I thank you for all of your support.

Greetings from the Elementary Office!

Our Elementary School along with the entire district has begun to implement a positive framework geared towards developing and strengthening our culture of hope, called Capturing Kids' Hearts. This amazing program outlines a process staff can use to continue to build meaningful connections between staff and students, students and their peers, and between staff and their families. The goal is to capture kids' hearts in order to capture their minds. Research shows that when students feel more connected to their school and staff, they achieve higher academic success and are less likely to have attendance or behavioral issues. Students thrive when they feel cared for and are engaged. We are being intentional in engaging students and helping them feel connected from the moment they enter school. Every morning teachers greet their students at the door and let them know how excited they are to see them. Beginning the day positively has been shown to increase academic achievement and decrease behavioral concerns. We are excited to implement this framework further into our daily routine of building strong relationships and helping our children succeed!

We have some important dates coming up in the Elementary as our year enters the final few months.

While in Albany we also attended an event where students were given awards for their work over the past year in tobacco prevention. Kat Wojsiat from Munnsville was recognized as this year's New York State Central Region Youth Advocate of the Year, and Rachel Mennig, a Freshman at Stockbridge Valley, was acknowledged with an honorable mention.

In addition to our efforts in Albany, we also were busy in our local communities. On February 7th, I had the opportunity along with Tim Bernet, a fellow scout, to attend Assemblyman John Salka's Open House at his office in Oneida. While we were there we were able to meet with other elected officials including the Madison County Chairman of the Board John Becker, Sheriff Todd Hood and Town of Stockbridge Board member Roland Shea.

Earlier that day, Tim Bernet and I were also able to meet with the Stockbridge Valley Foods manager about her perspective and thoughts about tobacco sales, ads, and products in the store. We have seen an increase in the amount of products. displays, and ads, and we wanted to share our concerns and see what they might be able to do to help. Unfortunately, there is not a lot that they can do to reduce the ads and displays as that is done by the tobacco industry when a contract is signed with a store. So on February 21st, Reality Check members from Stockbridge Valley attended the public hearing regarding the possibility of a Dollar General coming to Stockbridge. We know that Dollar Generals sell tobacco and we did not want to see another store that sells tobacco in our town. We were able to share our concerns about tobacco marketing in stores, and we are hoping that our Town and our Village will be able to do something to protect us and future generations from tobac-

co marketing in our small community.

The United States Surgeon General took notice of our work in February and sent out five messag-

es on his Twitter sharing our message. We were pretty excited about that.


Truth Initiative • Inspiring Tobacco-free Lives

The rapid ascension of JUUL® - the new e-cigarette that is so popular with young people that it has accumulated a majority of the e-cigarette market share in just two years - has left a trail of questions and concerns. Here are six important facts to know about JUUL®.

1. One JUUL® pod contains 20 cigarettes worth of nicotine.

The amount of nicotine in one JUUL® cartridge is roughly equal to the amount of nicotine in a pack of cigarettes, or about 200 puffs, according to the product website. While less toxic than combustible cigarettes, e-cigarettes can make youth more likely to use cigarettes and still contain toxins and the addictive chemical nicotine, which is harmful to adolescent brain development.







2. Almost one-fifth of middle and high school students have seen JUUL® used in school.

JUUL® is easy to hide because it looks like a flash drive and can be charged in a USB port. It also does not produce a strong odor. These characteristics enable discreet use, especially in schools. Almost one-fifth of middle and high school students have seen JUUL® used in school, according to an April 2018 Truth Initiative® survey of more than 1,000 youth between 12 and 17 years old.

3. JUUL® comes in sweet and fruity flavors, which make it especially dangerous.

JUUL® comes in a variety of flavors, such as fruit medley, mango, cool cucumber and creme brulee. Flavors in tobacco products, including e-cigarettes, have been proven to appeal to young people. Flavored e-cigarettes are especially dangerous, not only because they attract youth, but because their young users are likely to be misinformed about the harmfulness of the products. Many youth e-cigarette users incorrectly believe they aren't consuming nicotine when they vape. The majority of youth e-cigarette users think they vaped only flavoring, not nicotine, the last time they used a product, according to an annual national survey of more than 40,000 students from the University of Michigan 2016 Monitoring the Future study.

4. Minors are getting JUUL® in stores, online and through friends.

By law, people under the age of 18 (or 21 in some areas) should not be able to purchase any tobacco products, including JUUL®. So, how are so many young people getting their hands on JUUL®? Truth Initiative surveyed a national sample

of more than 1,000 12- to 17-year-olds in April 2018 and found that nearly three quarters - 74 percent - of youth said that they obtained JUUL at a store or retail outlet. Just over half - 52 percent - reported that they received JUUL® from a social source, such as a friend or family member. Although the internet was not the most common way youth obtained JUUL® only 6 percent reported that they received the product through an online transaction - nearly all youth who tried to buy the product online were successful.

5. Copycat products are flooding the market.

Many companies are producing look-alike products to try to cash in on the profits of the top-selling e-cigarette. There are so many new devices that a social media account dedicated to e-cigarettes and vaping devices, Salt Porn, posted in May, "It feels like there is a new pod system released every day and we receive tons of them ... So many in fact that there is no way we can review them all." These products are not only putting a generation of youth at risk of nicotine addiction, but they appear to be breaking the law.

6. The FDA has taken some action, but more needs to be done.

In recent months, the Food and Drug Administration has taken some actions regarding JUUL®, including issuing warning letters to retailers for selling the product to minors. The FDA also asked the maker, JUUL® Labs, to turn over documents related to marketing, health effects and use among youth. While these actions are encouraging, problems with tobacco products like JUUL® won't be addressed until the FDA fully regulates e-cigarettes and establishes a strong premarket review process to prevent these kinds of products from being sold in the first place.

Truth Initiative and five other public health and medical groups called on the FDA to take action on JUUL® in April. The groups specified five actions, including removing certain JUUL® flavors, suspending internet sales and prohibiting branded merchandise.

Recently my family and I stopped for gas and snacks at a Circle K. On the window, I noticed two big tobacco signs. They were colorful and attention-grabbing. My sister saw them and asked what they were. I had to explain to my 7-year-old sister that JUUL is a vape and it is unhealthy.

She thought it was jewelry and not something that can damage your health. If the signs weren't there, she wouldn't have been exposed to tobacco. I also see these ads on the doors of SV foods in my home town and two big displays on the counter near the ice-cream and pizza (two of our favorite foods).

I hope to see that tobacco ads will be placed indoors and in adult only areas.
