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### We Empower Students Through Education

##### Stanley Leone Jr

##### Cameras

Our first Smart Bond project is complete. The district bought all new cameras with the Smart Bond money and added several cameras to our system. The additional cameras are one piece of our effort to increase the safety of the school building. As a reminder, when entering the building during the day, please use the elementary tunnel and sign in at the Business Office. I appreciate all of you that have done this since the beginning of school. This helps us know who is in the building in case of an emergency.

##### Fire Safety

Speaking of safety, October is fire safety month! I would like to thank the Munnsville Volunteer Fire Department for all they do for the school and their continued partnership.

##### ELA and Math Assessments

Thank you for allowing your students to participate in the ELA and Math Assessments last spring. Our participation rate in the spring was 91%, just short of the state required 95. The tests will continue to be two days this year. Every question has been written by a group of teachers, and most questions are released to be used for professional development. The district reviews the data for program gaps so that we can continually improve our instructional practices to meet the needs of all of our students. I am thankful that we have the ability to do this again as we did in the past, as it is a tool that will bring us closer to our mission. Thank you for supporting our efforts.

##### November

As we move into November, I look forward to seeing so many of you at the play. "Grease" will be amazing. The students and faculty actors that are involved in the play are very excited.

I also look forward to honoring our Veterans again this year at our Veteran's Day Breakfast on November 8, 2018.

## Greetings from the Elementary Office!

We can't believe that an entire month of school is behind us. It seems like yesterday we were welcoming our smiling students back on the first day of school! Yet, parent-teacher conferences are just around the corner on November 9 and November 20. Don't forget to sign-up online to secure the conference spot of your choice! Here are some highlights of our month.

### Fire Safety

The Munnsville Volunteer Fire Department provided fire safety training for our students. Our students learned about setting up a safety plan and how to evacuate a house fire. They watched the firefighters put on their firefighting equipment so that if they had to be rescued they would know what the firefighters looked like. Lastly, students got the opportunity to see all the equipment in the fire truck and even spray the firehose! Thank you Munnsville Volunteer Fire Department!

### Character Education

Our elementary school counselor, Crystal Reynolds, has been visiting classrooms discussing our first character trait of the year, Courageousness. The first assembly is October 26. At this month's assembly, we will be awarding our courageous cougars and our first graders and fourth graders will be presenting our next cougar trait, Ambition.

### Intramurals

We have started our first session of intramurals. ### Student Pick-up, Drop-off and School Visits

If you are dropping off your child after 8:00 a.m. or visiting the school for any reason, please come to the elementary tunnel and sign in at the Business Office. The business office staff will contact the person you are here to see. If you are bringing your child to school late or picking them up early, staff will call either the elementary or high school office and you will meet your child in the appropriate office to sign them in and/or out.

If you are picking your child up at the regular dismissal time, you may sign them out in the cafeteria at the end of the school day.

## What's New in the Library?

I am pleased to say that we are continuing with our flexible schedule in the Library again this year. I am working closely with our classroom teachers throughout the school to introduce or reinforce information literacy skills within the context of the curriculum. Elementary students from Pre-K to 6th grade are coming to the Library at least once every 8 days for book checkout and mini-lessons that tie into their classroom curriculum and/or navigating the Library. High school students in 8th grade join me every other day to talk about banned

books and using evidence to persuade people of their argument. Stop into the Library some time and you could see students checking out new, interesting, and "Just Right" books; using our OPALS Library Catalog to unlock the answers in our BreakOut EDU games; listening to a story at the carpet; visiting with our dwarf hamsters Henry I and Henry II; hanging out in our comfy chairs; and so much more!

Students in grades 4 - 6 are invited to join the Elementary Library Club once a

month after school for a time to explore, build, and create in our Makerspace! Teams lined the halls with some awesome marble runs built out of pool noodles and duct tape in September. Between October and December (visit our Book Fair in November!), we will hold our first ever "Salt Dough House Bake Off!" Students will graph, engineer, bake, and construct a "gingerbread house" made out of salt dough.

November 13 - 20 and on Saturday, November 17 at the PTSO Bazaar to help support the Library Clubs and get some great reads for the Holidays!

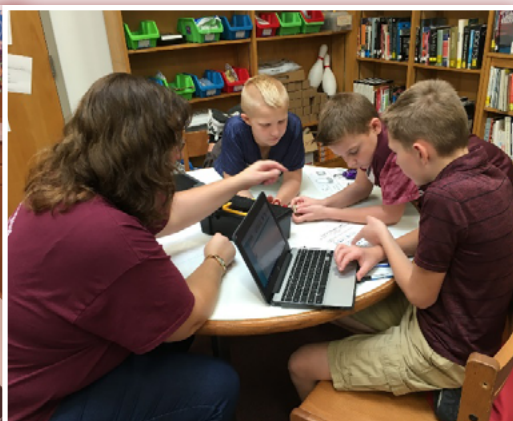

Stockbridge Valley FFA had a busy summer, from conferences and summer camp to many days spent at the State Fair. After kicking the summer off with 24 members attending a week at Camp Oswegatchie, the fun continued as Michael Wagner and Barbara Guinto both attended the Washington Leadership Conference in the Nation's capitol. Through workshops and other activities they learned how much of a difference they could make in their community. They were also given the opportunity to interact with FFA members from all over the United States, influencing the way they saw the issues at hand.

It doesn't end there! Austin Nolley attended the INTENSE conference where he was given the chance to explore agriculture colleges and career opportunities within New York state. Austin had the chance to visit and stay on campus at SUNY Cobleskill, Paul Smith College, Morrisville State College, Cornell University and SUNY Alfred, the five colleges

that offer agriculture degrees in N.Y. He learned about the college application process and what the responsibilities in many agriculture careers consist of.

To finish off the summer, FFA members spent twelve days at the Great New York State Fair doing a number of Career Development Events (CDE) competitions and other activities. Ethan Smith, Alex Smith, Gabe Smith, Austin Nolley and Myah LaFave all volunteered at Ag Career Day, helping inform the public about careers in the agriculture field and why those careers are so important. Gabe Smith, Alex Smith, Tanner Dager, Adriene Byron, Edward Demenezes and Michael Wagner all volunteered at Maple Day, handing out samples of maple products and talking to the public about the process of making maple syrup. Ethan Smith, Alex Smith, Gabe Smith, Rachel Mennig, Abby Smith, Myah LaFave and Rocco Pizzuto participated in the CNY Gladiola Show and NYS Gladiola Show. They also made and gave out corsages

made of gladiolas to the public as community service to the Gladiola Society. Michael Wagner, Austin Nolley and Adriene Byron attended the AIM conference, learning about all the opportunities FFA offers and ways their chapter can get involved. 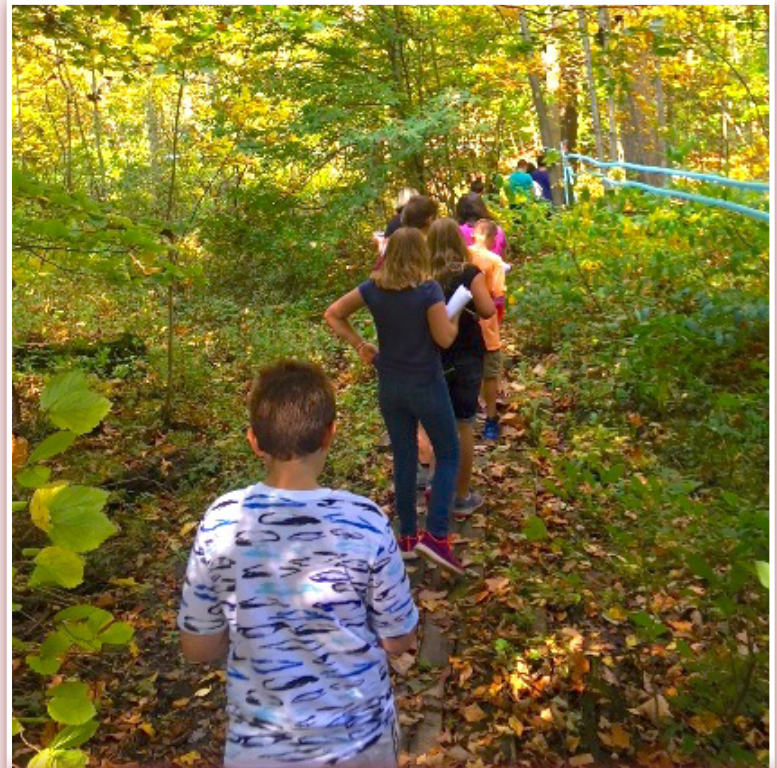

## From the Nurse's Office....

The district's School Health Services program supports your student's academic success by promoting health in the school setting. One way that we provide care for your student is by performing the health screenings as mandated by the State of New York.

During this school year, the following screenings will be required or completed at school:

### Vision

Distance and near acuity for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K or Kindergarten, Grades 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.

Color perception screening for all newly entering students.

### Hearing

Hearing screening for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K or Kindergarten, Grades 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.

### Scoliosis

Scoliosis (spinal curvature) screening for all girls in grades 5 and 7, and boys in grade 9.

Health Examinations are also required for all newly entering students and students in Pre-K or Kindergarten, and Grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11.

A letter will be sent home if there are any findings on the screening done at school that would cause concern or need medical follow-up. Please call the school's Health Office if you have any questions or concerns.
