

News from the High School Office

Greetings from the High School Office. Happy New Year to all. I hope everyone enjoyed the holidays and are finding 2018 a happy and healthy one. The 7-12 side of Stockbridge Valley has been quite busy since our last newsletter. Our fall sports season ended and our musical, "Mary Poppins", was a rousing success. The winter sports season has begun and we have several teams enjoying some real success.

Our new schedule has been fantastic for our students and I have had all kinds of opportunities to see great instruction and learning taking place. I've had the privilege of being a food judge for student chefs, re-learn geometry and algebra, engage in discussion about great works of literature, interpret paintings, and observe science experiments. We are now at the halfway point of the school year and students are settled in nicely. I expect to continue to see all kinds of great teaching and learning as the year progresses.

Our "Be a Cougar" program has been very successful and we have had both teachers and students be nominated for their acts of courage, optimism and unity. In the coming months we will highlight how being a Cougar also means being generous, ambitious, responsible and resilient. I am so proud of our students in their efforts to build these characteristics and be the best young women and young men they can be.

As winter weather has already hit us hard, I encourage students to prepare for the cold weather. Finally, we have now had two 5 week progress reports sent home as well as Marking Period 1 grades. Stockbridge Valley encourages parents to be actively involved in the education of their children. In turn, our teachers aim to keep parents regularly informed of student progress. Remember, students are expected to go after school for extra help if they are struggling in their classes. Teachers are available Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 2:40 to 3:16 to provide support and late bus transportation is provided on these days. In addition, our teachers are flexible in providing chances for students to get the necessary support they need. Please be in contact with teachers and the high school office so we all can do what is best for our kids.

Habits of a Successful Student

Being a student is hard work, especially in grades 7 through 12. You suddenly have much more independence and have to figure out how you are going to get homework done, eat dinner, go to practice/work, and then manage to get to bed at a reasonable time. It's not easy trying to figure how to balance this new set of responsibilities. However, if you have good habits in place, I can promise you that it will get easier. The following habits below are listed to help you become a more successful student:

ATTENDANCE!! — This is by far one of the most important habits to have to become a successful student. Did you know that you are considered chronically absent for only missing 2 days of school a month even if they are excused? This is because the more you are absent from school, the more behind you get in your classes. This adds to the buildup of homework and catching up on missed material which only leads to more stress/anxiety. The more you can get to school, the better.

Stay Organized – Use an agenda to keep track of when your assignments are due and set aside specified time every day to complete work and study. Keep

your locker and backpacks neat, this will help you be better prepared for class.

Sleep – Getting a good night's sleep along with eating a good breakfast is imperative to help you to focus on your work throughout the day.

Take Notes – Taking notes allows you to be more engaged during class and helps you better prepare and study for tests.

Ask Questions – Don't be afraid to ask questions or for extra help if you don't quite understand what is going on. Teachers are available Tuesday through Thursday to stay after school to help students.

Get Involved – Join a club, sport, or volunteer within the school. It helps build a sense of community and relationships with your peers and teachers.

Study – Try not to cram. Break your material down in chunks and review frequently. Set aside designated time every night to go over your notes. Study in a place with minimal distractions or find a couple peers to study with so you can quiz each other.

Stockbridge Valley FFA Members Megan Lamb and Austin Nolley are getting National FFA Attention.

Megan Lamb and Austin Nolley have recently received attention from National FFA. Megan Lamb was first noticed when she was contacted as being a Proficiency Finalist. She



was one of four in the nation to be selected for this award. She was chosen for her work in the field of Agriscience Research Plant Systems. Megan first had to fill out an application to the State Level. She then won the Gold

Proficiency for the New York FFA. After that she went on to represent the State of New York for the National FFA Proficiency contest for Agriscience Research Plant Systems. Although she didn't win she made her FFA chapter and home state proud.

Austin Nolley has also recently been recognized nationally for receiving a National FFA grant to expand his SAE (Supervised Agricultural Experience). He was recognized for this accomplishment in December 2017 when he received the 2017 Agricultural Experience Tracker (AET) SAE Grant in the amount of \$1,000 from AET. To acquire this award he first had to fill



out an application pertaining to his goat production SAE about what he does and how he hopes to spend the money. He was one of 152 receiving a grant out of 3339 people who submitted grant applications. Austin was

then interviewed by a local newspaper reporter to explain his future plans and his future goals.

This has been an exciting time for the Stockbridge Valley FFA Chapter and they hope to continue this trend as the FFA heads into the contest season.

The Stockbridge Valley FFA goes to the 90th National FFA Convention and Expo!

This year the Stockbridge Valley FFA attended the 90th National Convention and Expo held in Indianapolis, Indiana. Members from the Stockbridge Valley FFA that attended were Jimmy March, Joshua Wagner, Beau Burke, Jared Couture, Michael Andrews, Barbara Guinto, Michael Wagner, Brandon Burton, Brandon Eastman, Austin Nolley and Adriene Byron. Megan Lamb also attended the Convention as The New York State FFA Vice President, New York State FFA Delegate, and a final 4 Proficiency Award Winner. She participated in the Agricultural Research Plant Systems area.

On the first day of the Convention trip, we all got up bright and early Sunday morning to meet the bus at 7:30. We then went to a beet processing plant called Love Beets in Rochester with their parent company in the UK. The next day we headed to Lincoln Electric, a welding and electric product provider. Here we got to see the manufacturing process and try out the Vortex, a virtual welding simulator. Next we went to The Anderson's, a feed processing and shipping company. At this stop we got to sit down with some of the executives and talk about what the company does and jobs they offer. After this we got to visit their grain elevators and storage facilities.

On Tuesday we toured a 3,500 dairy cow farm in Michigan. Here we got to tour the feed commodities barn, the free stalls and the milking parlor along with their manure processing building. Our last tour was the Wolf Park in Indiana, where we were able to learn about how the wolves are raised in

captivity and studied so that we can learn how they interact within a pack. They also had several coyotes, foxes and bison.

Wednesday night we went to the opening session of the 91st National FFA Convention. Here we got to listen to the keynote speaker, Laila Ali. We also heard from the United States Secretary of Agriculture, Sonny Perdue. For

the next day we went to the 2nd General Session and the 4th General Session. In the 4th General Session we heard from Ashley Willits who delivered her retiring address about giving people our best love. During this session, we also had the opportunity to hear from motivational speaker, Mick Ebeling, founder of Not Impossible, and The Principles of Technology for the Sake of Humanity. He had the opportunity to travel to Sudan and work with this little boy named Daniel, who happened to have both of his arms blown off while hiding behind a tree with his arms crossed and when the shrapnel landed, it unfortunately took both of his arms. Mick spent the next year working with Daniel to build him robotic arms

and David was more than happy to work with Mick so he would have arms again. Normally this type of project would cost \$750,000

but Daniel only paid \$100 for this project to have robotic arms.

New York and Stockbridge Valley made their appearance during the 6th General Session when our very own Megan Lamb went on stage for her Proficiency Award in Agricultural Research Plant Systems. She

was one of four finalist in this national competition! As the convention was winding down to its last days and hours, the Stockbridge Valley FFA attended the 7th General Session which we had the opportunity to hear Jon Petz's motivational speech about some magic tricks and how life is like magic. As we traveled back to our hometown we watched the 9th General Session on the bus T.V. and got to hear the National FFA President, David Townsend, who visited New York during the State Fair. David chose our chapter to have dinner with him and the NYS Officer Team based on our fair booth, "100 years of Agriculture". During dinner we got to know David and in his retiring address he mentioned some students from Stockbridge Valley: Alex Smith, Ethan Smith, Abby Smith, Austin Nolley, Logan Godaire, Josh Wagner and Michael Wagner who showed pride in their chapter, the National FFA organization and their State Fair booth.

On our way home we mingled with our new/old friends and may have shed some tears once we left them. As FFA members, whether it was our first time or our last time, it was sure a fun time and a fun ride!

s we finish the second marking period, our classes are Abusy learning and growing as we approach the 100th day of school very shortly! In Kindergarten, students are learning about gravity and motion. They are also hard at work reading "popcorn" words along with their letters, sounds, and pattern books. First graders have just finished a unit on informational writing. They used the Voice Thread App on their iPads to record their informational writing, share this with the class, and offer feedback to classmates. Our second grade students have begun their "Flat Stanley" project in which Flat Stanley travels across the world and comes back to share his adventures with the class! In third grade, students are studying global climate while also writing informational books. They are experimenting with weather by making their own weather instruments such as barometers to record observations. Fourth graders are reading a variety of texts and identifying themes. They are then making connections between these stories and themes to their personal lives. In fifth grade, students are learning how to collect and organize information from different genres of nonfiction informational resources including books, documentaries, interviews, and articles. Sixth graders are learning about sound waves by creating their own instruments to demonstrate how sound waves work. They are working with seniors in the technology room to build the instruments, and Mrs. Belanger is teaching them how to tune their instruments. Sixth graders will be performing a song using these instruments as well. Ask a Stockbridge student what exciting learning opportunities are happening every day!

We have some important dates coming up in the Elementary as well.

Pre-K registration is on February 14. Any child who will be 4 years old by December 1 is encouraged to register. Representatives from Madison Oneida BOCES will be available outside the elementary office from 8:00 am – 5:00 pm.

Kindergarten Registration is March 5-8 from 9 am to 3 pm in the elementary office. Any child who will be 5 years old by December 1 should register. Packets will go home with current Pre-K students. If you need a packet, stop in anytime to the elementary office. We will also mail one to you if your child is not currently in school. To register you will need the completed packet, birth certificate, immunization record, last physical, and proof of residency.

Marking Period 2 report cards go home with students on February 2nd.

Mid-Winter Recess is February 19-23.

We continue to celebrate being a COUGAR by recognizing exemplary character traits during our monthly Character Education Assemblies. We have celebrated being Courageous, Optimistic, United, and Generous so far this year. Our next month's assembly will be on February 15. We will be focusing on Ambition. Attendance Matters

At Stockbridge Valley, attendance is a priority. In order for our children to learn, they must be here. Of course, when a child is truly sick he/she should stay home. However, when children are out for other reasons as well days can accumulate very quickly.

Chronic absenteeism is defined as missing 10% or more of the school year. In a 180-day school year, this is missing 18 or more days of school by the end of the year. Chronic absenteeism includes all excused and unexcused absences. Missing just 2 days of school a month will mean a child is chronically absent.

Being absent from school on a regular basis can lead to lower achievement rates among those students, decreased graduation rates, and limited future employability.

We want to provide all of our students with the best opportunities for success. Here are some tips and strategies that can help at home in getting your children to school:

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- Set a regular bed time and morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Introduce your child to his/her teachers and classmates before school starts to help them transition.
- Don't let your child stay home unless he/she is truly sick. Keep in mind complaints of a stomach ache or headache can be a sign of anxiety and not a reason to stay home.
- If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, school counselors, or other parents for advice on how to make him/her feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- Develop back-up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, a neighbor, or another parent.
- Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in session.


