I also want to thank you for allowing your children to participate in the ELA and Math assessments last spring. Our participation rate in the spring was 91%, just short of the state required 95%. The NYS Commissioner of Education continues to work towards the modifications in testing that parents seek. The tests will be two days this year as they were when first required. Every question has been written by a group of teachers, and most questions are released to be used for professional development. The district reviews the data for program gaps so that we can continually improve our instructional practices to meet the needs of all of our students. I am thankful that we have the ability to do this again as we did in the past. It is a tool that will bring us closer to our mission. Thank you for supporting our efforts.

### News from the High School Office

Greetings from the High School Office. The school year is in full swing now and I hope everyone is really enjoying the unbelievable fall weather. September and October have been very eventful in the high school and I know I have enjoyed my new role as Principal over the first couple of months.

The students have done a fantastic job adjusting to new schedules and I have heard a tremendous amount of positive feedback from them on the experiences they are getting in class. In addition, the students have been extremely cooperative with all the construction delays at school. Thankfully, as I write this, those delays are coming to an end. Our Family and Consumer Science room is being completed and our students will have an opportunity to work in a brand new kitchen. The playground is now open and the tennis court/ basketball court is now being completed. The building project has really added more opportunities for our students and we are lucky to have such amazing facilities.

Since the last newsletter our students have ventured out of the district on several field trips. The Science Club took a trip to Marquardt Switches in Cazenovia. They were able to tour the factory and listen to presentations on modern technologies and careers. The 7th grade math classes took a trip to Gold Rush Mini Golf in Westmoreland as a culminating activity for their unit on integers. This is the type of activity our new block schedule allows and I would like to thank Mrs. McLean for setting up this opportunity for the students. The FFA also participated in Field Days at SUNY Morrisville and the Junior Class was able to visit the college fair at Oneida High School.

The entire school also had a spirit week, pep rally, and tailgate to prepare for the varsity soccer games vs. Madison at SUNY Morrisville on October 7. The Student Council did an amazing job organizing the events with Mrs. Bingel. The week was a great success and every year reminds me how proud I am to be a Cougar. It is always one of the highlights of a very successful fall sports season.

Finally, 5-week progress reports were sent home the week of October 16. The purpose of these reports is to provide students and parents with an idea of how they are doing in their classes. The goal is to provide feedback to students so they can then find ways to improve and grow. Students are expected to go after school for extra help if they are struggling in their classes. Teachers are available Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 2:40 to 3:16 to provide support and late bus transportation is provided on these days. In addition, our teachers are flexible in providing chances for students to get the necessary support they need.

### News from the Elementary Principal's Office

Playground - We are very excited to have our new playgrounds open and in use. There are two playgrounds side by side. One for our younger students and one for our older students. We recently opened the playground with a ribbon cutting ceremony.

Fire Safety - The Munnsville Volunteer Fire Department provided fire safety training for our students. Our students learned about setting up a safety plan and how to evacuate a house fire. They watched the firefighters put on their fire-

fighting equipment so that if they had to be rescued they would know what the firefighters looked like. Lastly, students got the opportunity to see all the equipment in the fire truck and even spray the firehose! Thank you Munnsville Volunteer Fire Department!

Character Education - We had our second character education assembly. Students were recognized for their *courageous* traits. We also discussed this month's character trait: *Optimism*.

Library Club - The Elementary Library Club is an after school program that meets once a month for students in grades 4 - 6. Students have created a Makerspace, so our focus is on building, creating, exploring, and STEAM activities. The first month, students team up to create a working marble run out of pool noodles and duct tape. In the coming months, students will work together or individually to design and build a project of their choosing! Past projects have included welding horseshoes with Ms. McCaffrey; making smoothies in Mr. DeBraccio's for their class; building a reading nook out of cardboard; paper mache volcanoes; and much more!

Intramurals - We have started our first session of intramurals. Intramurals are a wonderful opportunity for our 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade students to learn teamwork and sportsmanship and begin to prepare for modified sports in 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade. There are four 5-week sessions of intramurals throughout the year. Please encourage your child to sign up.

Student Pick-up and Drop-off - If you are dropping off your child after 8 a.m., please come to the elementary office to sign him/her in. If you are picking your child up any time between 8 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. please come to the elementary office to do that as well. ### Updates from the Guidance Office

It has been a great start to the school year with several Admission Counselors from area colleges visiting and meeting with students. Through these meetings, students have the ability to learn what colleges have to offer such as various degree programs, campus life, athletics, and scholarships. These visits were followed up with a trip to Oneida High School for a college fair where many Junior and Senior students had the ability to meet with even more admission counselors, technical school representatives, and military representatives to explore other post-secondary options. It is never too early to start exploring postsecondary options and if you ever have any questions, please contact the Guidance Office.

#### Class of 2018

Deadlines are quickly approaching and applications to colleges should have already begun. The following is a list of steps/checklist of things that need to be completed as you apply to college:

#### Financial Aid (FAFSA)

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid is the entrance point for all federal and state financial aid. All students and their parents/guardians should complete this form ASAP which opened on October 1, 2017. <u>https://fafsa.ed.gov/</u>

#### Take the SAT or ACT.

Every college will have different requirements and about 80% of them require one of these exams. Please see the college website to see what exams will be required. It is recommended to take the exams by December in order to get your scores in time to apply. Deadline for the SAT in December is November 3 and the deadline for the ACT in December is November 4. Please see Mrs. Gleason with any questions.

#### Talk to teachers/community members/employers for letters of recommendation.

You will want about 2 to 3 letters. Be sure to ask for these letters prior to submitting your application and have them submitted directly to me.

#### Apply to your college of choice.

If you need assistance applying, Mrs. Gleason is more than willing to stay after school and assist you through the process. There are several different ways to do so:

- One popular option is the Common App. This application can be used to apply to over 700 different colleges. You can find the app at commonapp.org
- Interested in only SUNY schools? SUNY has their own app you can use to apply to. This can be found at <u>suny.edu</u>
- If you are planning on starting off at a community college, apply directly to their website. Many community colleges will waive the fee if you do so.

- Once you have applied, see Mrs. Gleason. She needs to know so that she can send in your transcripts, etc.
- Periodically check the scholarship binder/school website for updated information regarding scholarships. Many deadlines for scholarships approach quickly so check regularly so that you don't miss out.

#### Class of 2019

Prior to your Senior year, it is recommended that you take your SAT exam. Colgate University offers a FREE SAT Preparation Course that begins in the end of January and meets once a week up until the SAT in May. This is a great opportunity to take advantage of and if you have any questions, please stop down to the guidance office or email SATPrep@colgate.edu

#### SVCS Alumnus Named Broadcaster of the Year

2007 Stockbridge Valley graduate,

Nathan March, was recently named "Broadcaster of the Year" by the Florida State League. Nate just completed his 6<sup>th</sup> season announcing baseball games for the Bradenton Marauders, the Class A-Advanced affili-



ate of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Nate is a 2011 graduate of Ithaca College and has provided play-by-play coverage for Bradenton since 2012. He has called more than 750 professional baseball games, including the Marauders' first Florida State League championship in 2016 and the 2014 Florida State League All-Star Game. In 2017, he led Bradenton in becoming the first Florida State League team to video stream home games on MiLB TV.

Prior to joining Bradenton, Nate called NCAA Division I games for Colgate University and served as an in-house copywriter for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

### SVCS Grad Oversees Campus Facilities Project Work

The district-wide capital project at SVCS this summer brought more than a new playground and improved facilities to campus – it brought back a familiar face.

Katy Jacobs, a 2004 SVCS graduate, served as the project manager through her position with Appel Osborne Landscape Architecture,

a firm based in Syracuse. In that role, she participated in the project planning process, working with the district's Facilities Committee to help prioritize and budget for different components of the project. Her firm designed all outdoor as-





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pects of the project, including the new playground, athletics facilities, and the parking lot and driveway. She was also on campus weekly to monitor construction progress.

"We wanted to transform the site to be a safer, more inclusive and more enjoyable place for the SVCS community," she said.

After graduating from SVCS, Katy attended SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry (ESF), graduating with a bachelor's degree in Landscape Architecture in 2009. Prior to this project, she served as project manager on two projects at the Rosamond Gifford Zoo in Syracuse, a new Event Terrace and a new Elephant Pool.

Katy still lives in the SVCS district and said it has been a nice bonus to work in her own neighborhood. "It is awesome to be working in my hometown and involved in something that improves my community," she said. "This truly was a fun design project and a labor of love for me."


### **Career Exploration**


