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am very happy to let all of you know that there has ■ already been a lot of progress on the Capital Project. The State **Education Department approved** the project in the fall and we moved quickly to get our bids out. I am very excited to say that we had several bidders attend the bid opening meeting on January 17. The project will begin in late May, with the bulk of the work being completed in the summer. Once again, thank you for supporting and passing the capital project. Last summer with the first torrential downpour, it quickly became clear that we needed a new roof. Thank goodness our Buildings and Grounds supervisor and staff have kept up with the repairs on the

As we enter into budget season, I want to thank you all for supporting the 2016-2017 budget. It has been a long-standing practice and priority to provide a fiscally sound budget while maintaining programs for our students. Although Albany has already been sending signals out this year that they will not be providing adequate funding for schools, this budget development will be no different from previous years. Speaking of education and instruction, it is important to us to serve your children well. As you know, we began offering TC3 classes here last year, more than doubling our dual credit offerings for students. We are working to increase these offerings in the future. We maintain our partnership with Morrisville State College. We have added coding, STEM curriculum in the elementary grades, and continue to use the data we have to improve our ELA and math programs. This year we have started looking at the best and most effective way to broaden our Agriculture program and Family and Consumer Science program so we can provide options for pathways to graduation for our students.

I send a huge thank you to the members of the Strategic Planning Team. I appreciate the time and effort that this team gives to support the school and students. We have been diligently working on the two main initiatives from this plan. The first is to provide a better transition from 6<sup>th</sup> grade to seventh grade by developing a program appropriate for middle school age children. The second is to develop a sched-

ule that will better support learning and instruction.

In closing, I ask that you let us know how we can better serve you, the community, and your children. Your child's safety and well-being is our priority. The strongest asset in this district is the fact that we are all in one building. It can make scheduling difficult, however, the benefits outweigh the challenges by far. There are opportunities for mentoring and peer-mediation, or simply sharing between grade levels. The older students can offer guidance from their own experiences to help younger students who look up to them. Bringing the students together for several experiences builds a community of learners that may be a bit competitive at times, but will always support each other in reaching their highest potential. Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to be a part of this WONDERFUL school and community. Remember, we can take steps forward alone- but- together we can move mountains.

#### **Your Online Reputation Matters**

Your digital footprint is any information about you online either posted by you or someone else. Despite some privacy settings you may have set into place, this information is never private. Once you post something, it becomes permanent and is at risk of being copied, shared, and distributed by anyone that sees it. The websites you visit, pictures you post, text messages, snap chats, and the things that you tweet all make up your reputation online or your "digital footprint".

A digital footprint can say a lot about a person. People have lost jobs, been kicked off of sports teams, denied acceptance into colleges, and arrested (many young people have been arrested and had to register as a sex offender for sharing pictures). So think before you click and ask yourself these questions: Is this something that I want my parents to see? How about my teachers, coaches, or employers? Who am I? How do I want people to see me now and in the future? Am I portraying a positive image of myself? These are all things you need to think about in order to create a positive digital footprint of yourself. Not

sure what your digital footprint is? Google your name and see what shows up.

#### For Parents:

I am seeing that many students are struggling getting their homework in yet when they get home, they claim that they said they don't have any. Let your child know that there is no such thing as "no homework". There is always something that they can do to keep up or get ahead in their school work. Encourage your child that claims they have no homework to spend 30 minutes to an hour to review notes that they have taken that week, get a jump start on a project that isn't due for awhile, practice quizzing them on some of their work, or just read a book. 


of multiple specimen slides using the Library's iPads. We now have ten (10) Smartphone Microscopes to check out for

#### Jacob Ax:

#### Promoting Handicap Accessible Farming

Stockbridge Valley senior, Jacob Ax, recently traveled to Phoenix, AZ to speak at the annual American Farm Bureau Convention and IDEAg Trade Show. The subject of his speech was handicap accessible farming, which was inspired by a conversation Jacob had with SVCS cleaner, Randy Mennig



back when Jacob first moved to Stockbridge Valley in 2010. Jacob wanted to bring attention to injured farmers and ways to help them continue their livelihood with specialized equipment.

Jacob originally wrote his speech for FFA competi-

tion last year. He placed 4th at the district level and he took 1st place at the sub-state and state levels. In October, Jacob presented the speech at the National FFA Convention in Indianapolis where he earned bronze medal status. During this time, a representative from NYCAMH (New York Center of Agricultural Medicine and Health) heard Jacob's presentation and asked him to share it with the NYCAMH organization in Cooperstown, NY. On his way home from Cooperstown, Jacob received a call requesting his appearance at the American Farm Bureau Convention in Phoenix.

After speaking at the convention in Arizona on January 7-9, Jacob gave his presentation to the Madison County Farm Bureau members in Morrisville and is planning another presentation for Bassett Healthcare in June.

Jacob is currently the New York State Treasurer for FFA and plans to attend Morrisville College in the fall to major in agriculture business. Jacob is the son of Chip and Karen Ax of Munnsville.






