### We Empower Students Through Education

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irst and foremost, I am very pleased to announce that Mr. Ron Spadafora began as Stockbridge Valley's Interim 7-12 Principal on October 13<sup>th</sup>. Ron retired as the Superintendent of Oneida last year. Previous to that position he was the Deputy Superintendent of Oneida and High School Principal at Syracuse City Schools for several years. He has been getting to know the students, faculty, and staff. I am sure you will meet him soon as he is enjoying the games and school functions.

The District has started a search for a new principal. I am hoping that we will have the principal in place by January 1st, 2017.

The year is definitely underway and we are off to a great start. It may seem early to discuss the state assessments, however I want you to know how we used the Superintendent's Conference Day. Last year I asked all of you to please support your student(s) in taking the state ELA and Math assessments. Many more of our students participated in the assessments in the Spring, but we continue to fall short of the state required 95%

participation rate. I encourage you again this year to you allow your child(ren) to participate in the ELA and Math assessments. I explained last year that the Commissioner had shortened the tests and promised to release more of the questions so that districts could use the data for professional development. The Commissioner held true with her promise and during our Superintendent's Conference Day, we reviewed and analyzed the data. The teachers reviewed the data for program gaps so that we can continually improve our instructional practices to meet the needs of all of our students. Teachers will also be using the data to vertically align our curriculum. I am thankful that we have the ability to do this again, as we did in the past, as it is a tool that will bring us closer to our mission. Thank you for supporting our efforts.

I mentioned in the "Back to School" newsletter that the 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> grade teachers are being trained in Project Based Learning and how to incorporate these strategies into their curriculum. We also took advantage of an opportunity that presented itself when develop-

ing the schedule this summer. We were able to schedule the 6<sup>th</sup> grade students in one of the high school labs each day during fourth period. Mr. Josephs and Mr. Eanniello are team teaching the 6<sup>th</sup> grade students and offering a chance for them to use a science lab prior to being in the high school. Our hope is that this will build the students' love of science, while lessening the transition from elementary school to high school next year. Along with this opportunity we were asked to partner with Seimens and the Alliance to Save Energy to teach our students about the importance of saving energy. The 6th grade students will conduct an energy audit on the school's use of energy, analyze the audit and present their findings publicly. The students will also present solutions to the concerns that they find. They will be energy saving experts! The most exciting thing about this is that they will be solving real world problems while learning. They will use critical thinking, math, and science, while having fun. The students will hone their presentation and collaboration skills during this year.






#### A Note from the Guidance Department

Dear Parents/Guardians and the Senior Class of 2017,

Deadlines are quickly approaching and applications to colleges should have already begun. The following is a list of steps/checklist of things that need to be completed as you apply to college:



- Financial Aid (FAFSA) the Free Application for Federal Student Aid is the entrance point for all federal and state financial aid. All students and their parents/guardians should complete this form ASAP which opened on October 1st, 2016. <a href="https://fafsa.ed.gov/">https://fafsa.ed.gov/</a>
- 2. Take the **SAT** or **ACT**. Every college will have different requirements and about 80% of them require one of these exams. Please see the college website to see what exams will be required. It is recommended to take the exams by December in order to get your scores in time to apply. Deadline for the **SAT** in December is November 3<sup>rd</sup> and the deadline for the **ACT** in December is November 4<sup>th</sup>. Please see Mrs. Gleason with any questions.

- 3. Talk to teachers/community members/employers for letters of recommendation. You will want about **2 to 3** letters. Be sure to ask for these letters prior to submitting your application.
- 4. Apply to your college of choice. If you need assistance applying, Mrs. Gleason is more than willing to stay after school and assist you through the process. There are several different ways to do so:
  - One popular option is the Common App.
     This application can be used to apply to over 700 different colleges. You can find the app at commonapp.org.
  - Interested in only SUNY schools? SUNY has their own app you can use to apply to. This can be found at *suny.edu*.
  - If you are planning on starting off at a community college, apply directly to their website.
     Many community colleges will waive the fee if you do so.
- 5. Once you have applied, see Mrs. Gleason. She needs to know so that she can send in your transcripts, etc.
- 6. Periodically check the scholarship binder/school website for updated information regarding scholarships. Many deadlines for scholarships approach quickly so check regularly so that you don't miss out.

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#### 10 Study Tips for Students

- **Study Alone** Unless your friends are super serious about studying with you, put off the social time until you are prepared to take your test.
- **Create your perfect study area** Comfortable, quiet, and free from distractions.
- Get it all out Don't give yourself another excuse to get up once you sit down. Get everything you need at once and dig in.
- Make flash cards from your notes This will help you narrow down to the important facts. Rewrite them into Q & A as you make them.
- **Snack Healthy** Stay away from junk food. Eating a banana or apple with give you the boost you need without the crash from caffeine.
- **Narrow it down** You'll go crazy trying to remember everything your teacher said. Focus on the important stuff then move into the finer details.

- Take a break Take about a 15 minute break for every hour you study. This will help clear your head and refocus to allow all of the information to sink in.
- **Put yourself to the test** Use your flashcards to allow others to test you. Carry your cards with you to review during your free time prior to the test.
- Get some sleep Pulling an all-nighter is only going to cause more trouble during the test.
   Get some sleep to recharge your brain.
- **Study all year long** Review your notes frequently so that you are not cramming for a test. Reviewing what you went over in class each day will allow the information to stick easier.

#### Students Get Involved in Effort to Make Sylvan Beach "Smoke-Free"

Sylvan Beach, NY - Eight teenagers from Madison, Stockbridge, and Canastota traveled to the beach on Saturday October 8th, not to swim or hang out, but to clean up the beach. The focus was on the most littered item



in the world, cigarette butts. Roughly 4.5 trillion are being tossed each year. The teens did the clean up to help reduce this impact, but they did it even more to show elected officials that Sylvan Beach needs to be tobacco-free.



Hailey Bernet, a seventh grader at Stockbridge Valley Central whose family owns a camp on Sylvan Beach says "I wish the beach was smoke-free, so that kids don't pick up cigarette butts to deco-

rate a sand castle, and so kids don't end up smoking later in life, turning a family beach trip into a disaster."

The group of teens collected over 300 cigarette butts from 19th Ave to 22nd Ave. They put the butts they collected in clear plastic piggy banks to give to the Village of Sylvan Beach. Kat Wojsiat a freshman at Holy Cross Academy said, "We didn't want to leave the cigarette litter there, and we didn't want to throw it in the trash. The filters are not biodegradable, so we decided to share our findings with those who can improve this beach. We hope to have an opportunity to talk with them soon about what they can do.

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"It felt good at first to be cleaning up the beach and helping out a community, but after a while we just were overwhelmed by the amount of tobacco litter. We hope that the little that we did made a difference, but we know a tobacco-free beach would be the best solution for the health and safety of families that visit this beach." said Riley Hysell an eighth grader from Madison Central School.





#### **School Spirit**

Dear Parents & Spectators,

The Stockbridge Valley Administrative Team and Coaching Staff would like to thank you for your attendance at the "Game Under the Lights" at Morrisville College.

Interscholastic athletic events are among the most popularly attended school sponsored activities. Spectators at an athletic contest take on the important role of representatives of our school district. Actions are seen and comments are heard by family and friends, opposing fans, local community residents, the media, coaches and ath-

letes. Our school district expects that all spectators will conduct themselves in a way consistent with our theme of respecting the rights, person and property of others.

In response to feedback regarding Stockbridge Valley spectator conduct, we would like to take this opportunity to review the Stockbridge Valley Central School District guidelines for spectators.

#### Guidelines for Spectator Conduct at Interscholastic Athletic Events

The following rules of sportsmanship for spectators at School District events outline how you can contribute to making these contests a positive experience for all persons in attendance:

- Learn the rules of the sport so that you can understand and appreciate the action that takes place
- Treat visiting players, coaches, cheerleaders and fans with courtesy as you would a guest in your own home
- Accept that athletics are a learning experience for the participants and value the athletes' efforts
- Respect the integrity and judgment of officials
- Cheer for your team, not against your opponent
- Show concern for an injured player, regardless of the team
- Follow the facility rules set by the game-site management /administration
- Do not attend events under the influence of any controlled substances (alcohol, drugs, tobacco, etc.) that will alter your thoughts and reactions to the situations of the contest

#### Guidelines for Adhering to SVCS Facility Rules

The following behaviors are unacceptable by spectators at SVCS athletic sites:

- Cheers/chants/songs/signs/banners and gestures which are obscene, taunting, disrespectful or derogatory
- Displays of anger or profanity that draw attention away from the contest
- Throwing any object within the stands or onto the playing surface
- Standing during play in any area other than the identified spectator section of the bleachers; no standing on the court or field
- Not complying with officials' decisions regarding the use of artificial noise makers (Section III contest) and sounds meant to distract players at key times in the contest
- Bringing food or drink into the gym; water and sports drinks are allowed only in the team bench area for the athletes and coaches

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- The use of "silly string," confetti, or like products in the gym
- The use of tobacco and alcohol containing products and or any illegal substances on school district property

In closing, we must cheer on our children and friends but, at the same time model appropriate sportsmanship. SVCS wants to make it clear to athletes and fans that poor sportsmanship is not acceptable. Parents and fans who engage in negative cheering, or make disparaging remarks toward the officials, players, coaches or other fans, will be removed from the game.
