It is a new calendar year, which often brings new resolutions, new promises and new beginnings. I have had the pleasure of being your superintendent for three months now. In this time I have gotten to know some of you, but certainly not all of you, and I plan to continue to build strong relationships with as much of the community as possible in the future. I am deeply grateful for the support that this community provides to the school, and it is my mission to build partnerships and increase communication with the community.

Stockbridge Valley's mission statement is strong and reflects the community's desire to empower our students with confidence and fortitude. We need to encourage our students to face challenges with a problem solving mind-set that will help them strive for excellence even if faced with barriers or first failures. This is the kind of character that we want to develop in our students.

Over the past four years we have experienced a convergence of education reforms. The new education reforms brought changes to state testing, the teacher and principal evaluation system (APPR), and the common core standards. The common core standards have been met with much debate. In the spring of 2015 parents across the state chose to opt their children out of taking the NYS English Language Arts and Math assessments. Many districts experienced upwards of a 50% Opt Out rate. Stockbridge Valley experienced an average of a 30% Opt Out rate on each grade level. The Governor and our new CommisElia have heard the concerns of educators and parents, recognized that the implementation of the common core standards and the testing schedule were flawed, and established a task force that gave 21 recommendations to the governor and the commissioner. In response to the public and to the task force, the tests will be shortened and there is a fouryear moratorium placed on the coupling of assessment results to teacher and principal evaluations. The Commissioner also plans to make the results of the assessments available to school districts sooner and be more transparent regarding the test questions so that districts can use the tests for data analysis.

During the community forum and my interviews for this position, I was very clear regarding my stand on Opting Out of the NYS assessments. Here at Stockbridge Valley we use the information from the assessments; however, we value the whole child and recognize that the results of these assessments are one data point and not a total picture of each child's performance. I do not believe that allowing our students to Opt Out of an assessment supports their overall growth or teaches them the values that we strive to teach and I firmly believe that the students' participation in these assessments will prepare them for future academic challenges. As your superintendent, I urge you to allow your children to accept the challenge of these assessments in the spring to support both their academic growth and our evolving educational system that is working to create the best possible learning environment for your children. If you have concerns please discuss them with your child's teacher, principal, or me. I would be happy to answer any questions you may have regarding the Common Core standards and the NYS assessments.

Just as I have asked you and your children to meet challenges with a problem solving mind-set; the district must also meet challenges with that same mind-set.

Stockbridge Valley, along with all other school districts in the state, has met many state funding challenges over the past six years. Beginning in the 2009-10 school year we faced a Gap Elimination Adjustment (GEA). This adjustment is monies that were withheld from schools. Our Governor and our legislature have responded to the pressure from school districts and next year they will restore most or all of the GEA depending on the district. This is of minimal assistance to Stockbridge Valley as the remaining funds for this year equaled \$1775.00. The GEA is only a portion of the funding issue. There continues to be an ongoing struggle for fair funding for education across the state, acknowledging that fair does not always mean equal. In serving this district I will continue to advocate for a change in the School Foundation Aid formula to address the inequitable funding of school districts. I joined the superintendents in Madison, Oneida, and Herkimer County at the end of January to meet with our legislatures regarding this issue and advocated for fair funding for our schools and your children.

Updates for the Community:

Below find updates about the Fuel Island Project, Bus Referendum, Capital Project, Smart Bond Act, and Strategic Planning Process.

Fuel Island Project:

I am happy to say that the *Fuel Island Project* is nearing completion. We were blessed with great weather that helped this project move at an accelerated pace. The fuel island is a necessary addition to maintain efficient functioning of the district. We are grateful that the Village has agreed to enter into a share with the district, as it enabled us to pursue and complete the project.

Several teachers and community members have given me ideas regarding the appearance of the tank in the fuel island. I am investigating the possibility of having our art students paint a mural on the tank that would be up to SVCS Cougar standards! I see this as an opportunity for authentic learning and expression. Thank you all for the great input, I appreciate the thoughts.

Bus Referendum

The district has also been met with a declining enrollment just as many other districts in New York State. Please see the *School Bus Referendum* information sheet on page 15 of this newsletter. I know the community is concerned that even with the declining enrollment the District has maintained the same number of busses in the fleet. With that in mind, the Board of Education and the District devised a plan this year to reduce the fleet by

one bus while maintaining the flow of transportation aid.


Capital Project

Currently, the project is under review by NYS Education Department. This process can take anywhere from 10 to 12 months.

The Capital Project will bring many required upgrades. A few of the items being addressed in the project include: the roof, accessibility between the fields, and upgrades to the parking lots. The installation of new lighting systems and upgraded fire alarm and smoke detector systems will also add to the safety of the school. Instructional space improvements include updating the Family and Consumer Sciences classroom and the Agriculture Building. I intend to keep the community informed as the project moves forward.

Smart Schools Act:

The *Smart Schools* allocation for Stockbridge Valley is \$635,106.⁰⁰. To maintain the safety of our students, \$200,000.⁰⁰ of this money has been reserved for necessary security upgrades to our camera system. The three areas to consider when making improvements in the use of technology for increased learning are:



The district upgraded the infrastructure and connectivity this past summer. The district will address training and Professional Development through district Professional Learning Communities. The remaining \$435,000.000 is allocated for the following improvements:

Upgrade the current computers with leading edge classroom technology, including

- video enabled laptops and interactive displays. This upgrade will empower teachers and promote student centered learning methods including flipped and blended learning models of instruction, along with real-time interactive collaboration.
- Increase one-to-one technology for students so that technology is fully integrated with learning at all times, students have access to technology that is used outside of school, and there is no gap in grade levels that have access to the technology.
- Upgrade the computer lab with state of the art technology, 3D and maker technology that will enable students to create and collaborate through project based learning, coding, engineering and artistic design programs.
- Add communication technology that will provide students with access to the world through video conferencing and distance learning.

A public hearing will be planned to provide the community with more details.

Strategic Planning Process

On March 9 and 10, a committee of community members, school employees, administrators, and BOE members will come together to review and revise the Strategic Plan for the district that will move this district closer to our mission and vision. Once this two day process is complete, it will be communicated to the public.

Thank you for your continued support. It is the support from the community that makes SVCS a great district.

Kindergarten Registration

Kindergarten registration for the school year 2016-2017 will be held at Stockbridge Valley Central School on Monday, February 29 through Friday, March 4, 2016 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. in the elementary office. Any child who will be five years of age on or before December 1, 2016 is eligible to be enrolled in kindergarten. If your child attends the Pre-K program, they still must register for kindergarten.

Registration is required before a student can begin school. It is not necessary for the child to be present at the time of registration. The following documentation is required for registration: child's birth certificate, official immunization record (showing proof of complete Polio, Diphtheria (DPT), Measles, German Measles, Mumps (MMR), Varicella, and Hepatitis B vaccinations), proof of residency (copy of lease, utility bill) and pertinent legal papers.

Second Grade

Second graders at Stockbridge Valley have been very busy learning all about technology! During the month of December, they were all able to learn how to use simple code to program a 3D printer. The second graders took advantage of the 3D printer that we had on loan for several weeks to create a holiday keepsake to enjoy at home. These 3D printed Christmas tree ornaments were the result of learning how to program or code a 3D printer to create something original. It all started with an online pro-





gram that allowed the second graders to use a drag and drop method of coding using symbols and shapes. They quickly decided to put a cone on top of a cylinder to create a tree design. Then the students added spheres for ornaments and even a star on top! After the prototype was printed, it was quickly realized that modifications needed to be made in the original design for it to function correctly. Second graders were problem solvers and added an additional inverted cone between the cone of the tree and the cylinder of the trunk. It worked perfectly! The second graders learned some computer coding and, with a little persistence and determination, created a concrete example of their hard work.

Written Excuses

Please remember, when a child is absent, late or excused early from school, a written excuse from the child's parent or guardian is required per Board Policy 7005:

All instances of excused absence require a written parent/guardian excuse within three (3) school days of absence. The excuse must identify the date/time of absence, reason for absence, tardiness or early departure and parent/guardian signature. Students failing to present an excuse prior to an early departure or upon reporting back to school following an absence or tardiness within three (3) days of the absence will be subject to the absence being recorded as "unexcused" with the possibility of denial of course credit as defined in Board of Education Regulation #7005.1.

Stockbridge Valley Central School Agriculture Teacher Selected for Educator Award

NEW ORLEANS – Erin McCaffrey, agricultural educator at Stockbridge Valley Central School in Munnsville, N.Y., is one of only six individuals nationwide who received the National Association of Agricultural Educators Teacher Mentor Award, given at the NAAE annual convention in New Orleans on November 19.

McCaffrey has served as a supervising teacher for three student teachers. This type of mentoring allows for daily in-



person interactions that help these potential agriculture teachers grow. McCaffrey is able to sit down and evaluate her student teachers' lesson plans and help them develop student management skills.

After the budding teachers complete their student teaching experience, they continue to stay in touch, which allows for further exchange of ideas and support. At the beginning of their experience all of McCaffrey's student teachers spend a week observing her teaching, allowing them an opportunity to see what she expects of her students. During the second week they start teaching one class and work their way up to teaching a full schedule within three weeks. Every day, McCaffrey and her student teacher sit down to discuss how the instruction and classroom management was handled for the day.

In addition to daily support, she provides her student teachers with access to all of her teaching resources and encourages them to use other resources such as NAAE's Communities of Practice, which is a professional networking site for agricultural educators.

"As a teacher I believe that mentoring is the essence of our profession. Often, we only see ourselves as mentoring our students; however many of us mentor fellow teachers every day. I believe that making a conscious effort to provide beginning teachers the support they need is not only essential but also rewarding," said McCaffrey.

Each of the six regional Teacher Mentor Award winners was recognized at the NAAE convention in New Orleans. CEV Multimedia sponsors the Teacher Mentor Award. NAAE is the professional association for agricultural educators. Its mission is "professionals providing agricultural education for the global community through visionary leadership, advocacy and service." The NAAE office is located in Lexington, Ky.

TECHNOLOGY AT SVCS

STEM

I am certain that all of you have heard about the **STEM** (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) movement in schools. We have started our own **STEM** movement at Stockbridge Valley

COLLABORATIVE 3D ENGINEERING:

SVCS students were recently exposed to 3D printing and engineering design when we borrowed a 3D printer from the MORIC. Students in grades 2, 8 and 12 learned the necessary skills to design in 3D and were then able to print their designs. As an outgrowth of this learning, Mrs. Vanderlan approached Mrs. Fisher with a design challenge to create a custom hand brace for a student whose needs are not met with a commercially available splint. Stockbridge Valley is investigating a possible collaborative project between SVCS Seniors and students from the VP-Tech program at Herkimer BOCES to meet this challenge. We will keep you informed as the project develops.

Dear Parents & Spectators,

The Stockbridge Valley Administrative Team and Coaching Staff would like to thank you for your attendance at our athletic events. Interscholastic athletic events are among the most popularly attended school sponsored activities. Spectators at an athletic contest, take on the important role of representatives of our school district. Actions are seen and comments are heard by family and friends, opposing fans, local community residents, the media, coaches and athletes. Our school district expects that all spectators will conduct themselves in a way consistent with our theme of respecting the rights, person and property of others.

In response to feedback regarding Stockbridge Valley spectator conduct, we would like to take this opportunity to review the Stockbridge Valley Central School District guidelines for spectators.

Guidelines for Spectator Conduct at Interscholastic Athletic Events

The following rules of sportsmanship for spectators at School District events outline how you can contribute to making these contests a positive experience for all persons in attendance:

- Learn the rules of the sport so that you can understand and appreciate the action that takes place
- Treat visiting players, coaches, cheerleaders and fans with courtesy as you would a guest in your own home
- Accept that athletics are a learning experience for the participants and value the athletes' efforts
- Respect the integrity and judgment of officials
- Cheer for your team, not against your opponent
- Show concern for an injured player, regardless of the team
- Follow the facility rules set by the game-site management /administration
- Do not attend events under the influence of any controlled substances (alcohol, drugs, tobacco, etc.) that will alter your thoughts and reactions to the situations of the contest

Guidelines for Adhering to SVCS Facility Rules

The following behaviors are unacceptable by spectators at SVCS athletic sites:

- Cheers/chants/songs/signs/banners and gestures which are obscene, taunting, disrespectful or derogatory
- Displays of anger or profanity that draw attention away from the contest
- Throwing any object within the stands or onto the playing surface
- Standing during play in any area other than the identified spectator section of the bleachers; no standing on the court or field
- Not complying with officials' decisions regarding the use of artificial noise makers (Section 3 contest) and sounds meant to distract players at key times in the contest
- The use of "silly string," confetti, or like products in the gym
- The use of tobacco and alcohol containing products and or any illegal substances on school district property

In closing, we must cheer on our children and friends but, at the same time model appropriate sportsmanship. The SVCS Administration wants to make it clear to athletes and fans that poor sportsmanship is not acceptable. Parents and fans who engage in negative cheering, or make disparaging remarks toward the officials, players, coaches or other fans, will be removed from the game.


