Dear Community,

reetings by way of Stockbridge Valley Central School. Let me first start by saying, *THANK YOU* for being so welcoming to me. Many of you have stopped in to see me or have spoken to me out in the community. During our visits and/or discussions, you've all made me feel very welcomed. It is because of your support that I have been able to "hit the ground learning." To add to this, the children and staff of our school have also been a pleasure to work with. Our students are bright and insightful. Additionally, our teachers truly care and are committed to ensure that our children receive an outstanding education.

As of today, January 21, 2014, I have completed more than 60 days of my 100 day entry plan. This plan, which is posted on our school website, is designed to help me as I continue to learn more about our district. In keep-

ing with this plan, I am in the process of organizing and/or facilitating several forums (parent, teacher, and community). Please know, I am inviting all of you to take part in these groups

or to either stop in or call me to let me know your opinions and thoughts about our school.

Aside from my entry plan, the Board of Education and I are also now working closely on developing our districts 2014-15 school budget. Our goal is to make certain that we continue our district's history of providing a fiscally sound budget. In an effort to do so, we are working diligently to ensure that the 2014-15 budget is:

Flexible: it provides for flexibility within

budget codes

Full Proof: it provides for emergencies should

they occur; and

Flows: has enough cash flow available

should State Aid be withheld.

To add to this, our priority is to assure that our Budget development process:

- Is focused on balancing the community's desire for both excellent school programs and reasonable taxes by diligently evaluating current practices, proposed expenditures and revenue sources other than taxes.
- Ensures that SVCS graduates have the skills, knowledge and attitudes needed so that they can compete in a demanding and technologically sophisticated global marketplace. This will include support for innovative instructional models and programs that have proven to be effective ways to deliver

Stockbridge Valley's First One-to-One Tablet Project Is A Champion

Mrs. Wright's fifth grade has been involved in a new program where every student in the class has an electronic tablet device to use during the school day. This program was proposed by Mrs. Fisher and enthusiastically embraced by Mrs. Wright and Mrs. Iritz as a trial of one-to-one computing. Each fifth grade student has a LearnPad, similar to an iPad, to use on a regular basis at their desks for research, writing, and project work. The LearnPad is said to be purposely built for education which Mrs. Fisher and Mrs. Wright have found to be flexible and easy to use and manage in the classroom.

Since the beginning of the year, the fifth grade has completed several projects integrated with their Common Core ELA studies. They use their LearnPads to read and annotate primary source documents and E-Books, to do research using the school's online encyclopedias, to analyze photographs, do project based learning, and conduct video interviews. In addition to project work, students use the LearnPads for math and writing enrichment and personal inquiry.

As a result of the work being done with LearnPads at SVCS, the Educational Resources Company invited Mrs. Fisher to apply for their inaugural LearnPad Champions program. Sixty five educators were invited to apply based on how the LearnPads were being used in the classroom and a student created video testimonial. Mrs. Fisher was one of eleven educators chosen as a LearnPad Champion. She will be working with the other LearnPad champions from around the world on product evaluation, curriculum development, and professional outreach.
