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
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From the Superintendent

The development, formulation, presentation and eventually the approval of a district's annual budget is a long and complex process. Administrators, teachers and supervisors collaborated to present a realistic and affordable plan to the Board of Education. This year the NY State Budget was approved on time. Assemblyman Magee and Senator Valesky helped to achieve this important milestone.

Essentially, the 2013-14 budget plan is a Level Services financial plan. This proposed budget will provide essentially the same programs for students during the next school year. All of this was a formidable challenge in the face of escalating costs and less than adequate NY State support.

Estimated Revenues 2013-2014







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

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

Help Keep Teen Drivers Safe During Prom and Graduation


The Two Deadliest Driving Weekends of the Year For Teens!

was challenged in this class to become better in English and Economics. It also helped me to improve my organizational and time management skills".




Salutatorian


