Stockbridge Valley Central School District Mission Statement

The mission of the Stockbridge Valley Central School District is the education of all of its students, including but not limited to, the areas of intellectual, social, physical, and psychological growth.

The purpose of this education is to give each student the skills, knowledge, understandings of relationships, ability to analyze and solve problems, and guidance in moral, social, and ethical behavior necessary to become an independent being, able to function in an ever increasingly complex global and technological society. In pursuing this endeavor, the members of the Stockbridge Valley Central School District and its community will strive to mold a society in the image that it wishes to be, rather than accepting it as it is.



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Community Advisory Committee

The Stockbridge and Madison School Districts applied for and received funding to conduct a two district feasability study. To facilitate this study, the S.E.S. Study Team Consultants wre appointed. This study was designed to gather information and provide facts and recommendations to the Boards of Education regarding the potential reoraganization of one or both districts.

The consultants worked closely with a Board appointed "Community Advi-sory Committee." These community members, from Stockbridge and Madison, met seven times at rotating locations from March through December.

At their most recent and final meeting, with the Community Advisory Committee, on December 12th, the consultants shared three "What If" scenarios. These documents provide a detailed "What If" draft road map and framework to implement the overall student program in existing facilites, in a financially prudent and responsible manner.

1. A "What If" Program/Staffing Picture of a Reorganization of the Two School Districts into one. (Based on the Program Vision Discussion

the Joint Community Advisory Committees.)

- 2. A "What If" Picture of a Pupil Transportation Plan for a Reogranized School District based on the Prime Building Use and Grade Configuration Options Identified by the Joint Community Advisory Committee. (Including school day times, transportatoin times and bus runs.)
- 3. A "What If" Financial Picture of a Reorganization of the Two School Districts into One (Based on the Program Visions Ideas of the Joint Advisory Committees for Opportunites for All Pupils.)

Essentially, the work for the Joint Community Advisory Committee is finished. We appreciate very much, their time, collaboration, insights and data analysis. All of their voluntary efforts were related to the possibility of a reorganized Stockbridge Valley C.S. and Madison C.S. into one School District.

Next Step for the Study Team: Based on what we have learned with the Joint Community Advisory Committee since

of Opportunites for All Pupils by March, the Study Team will draft a study report. The study is sent to the State Education Department for their review and approval.

> As directed by SED, such a draft study is not a public document. After review and approval by the State Education Department of the study, the Study Team will arrange for public copies of the study and then host a community meeting in each of the two districts to present the findings of the study.

> After the community meeting presentations of the findings by the Study Team, the Boards of Education enter a phase over a few weeks for community meetings hosted by each Board to discuss the findings and to listen to community perceptions. After this public period, the Boards deliberate to decide if reorganization of the two school districts should be presented to each respective community for an advisory referendum ("straw vote") that is a tool to judge interest by the communities to proceed to a binding referendum.

Two Seats Open for S.V.C.S. **Board of Education**

Petitions for the Board of Education will be available March 15th – April 22nd, 2013 between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. in the District Office. Two Board of Education seats currently held by Thomas Jones, III and Michael Oot will expire on June 30th, 2013. The public vote will be held on Tuesday, May 21st, 2013. 
School is Open for Walkers

Attention Parents of Students in Grades 9, 10 & 11:

It is that time of year again! Course selection is right around the corner. Each year, Mrs. Cameron sits down with every student in grades 9-11 to begin planning for the upcoming years and start talking about what pathway students would like to pursue. Starting March 4th, every Junior and Sophomore will have an individual meeting with Mrs. Cameron for their "Junior Interview" and/or "Sophomore Session". This is an opportunity for each student to sit down and discuss a variety of things, such as: course selection for their senior year, college planning, SAT/ACT testing. Each student will have a College Board account created (if they do not already have one) to use in assisting them with college searches, planning and researching a major. Junior interviews typically take about 30-40 minutes and Sophomore Sessions are about 30 minutes. Scheduling meetings with Freshman will begin April 1st. Parents are encouraged to attend these meetings! If you would like to schedule a time to come in for your child's meeting, please contact Mrs. Cameron at least a week before the "starting" dates (3/4 and 4/1) to set up a time.

Kindergarten Registration

Kindergarten registration for the school year 2013-2014 will be held at Stockbridge Valley Central School on Monday, March 4, 2013 through Friday, March 8, 2013 from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the elementary office. Any child who will be five years of age on or before December 1, 2013 is eligible to be enrolled in kindergarten. Even if a child attends the Pre K program, they still need to be registered for kindergarten.

Registration is necessary before a student can begin school. It is not necessary for the child to be present at the time of registration. However, the District requires that a parent bring the child's birth certificate, official immunization record of his or her shots and proof of residency (mortgage/lease or utility bill). Any pertinent legal papers should also be provided at this time. According to New York State Law, all children must have a certificate showing complete polio, diphtheria, regular measles, German measles, mumps, varicella and hepatitis B immunizations before entering school.

If the established dates are not convenient, parents may contact Ms. Tami Singer in the elementary office at 495-4550 to make other arrangements.



7th & 8th Grade Citizenship Program

We are implementing a new positive proactive behavior management plan with the 7th & 8th graders called the Citizenship Award. It is based on behavior and points. In the months of March and June, students who have not accumulated more than the determined amount of points, will be able to attend Middle School specific field trips. Sport Physicals

In February, parents of students in grades 6-11 will be receiving sports physical questionnaires. If you would like your child to have a sports physical by the school physician, this questionnaire must be completed, signed and returned to the nurse's office by March 22nd, 2013. 


Movie Night


My family and I would like to thank you for all of your generosity, support and compassion afforded to us during this difficult time. Words can never express how grateful we all are.
