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Upcoming VotesOn Tuesday, March 8th, we will be proposing the purchase of two buses. These will replace two buses which are both over thirteen years old. After our transportation aid is deducted, the purchase of the two buses will cost the district a total of approximately \$21,000.

Tuesday, May 17th, is the day the district-wide vote is held for the 2011-2012 school budget. As you read the newspapers and watch TV, you know that school districts took another significant reduction in state aid based upon the Governor's proposal. For schools like SVCS, who are heavily dependant upon state aid revenue, it hurts us even more. Add the potential property tax cap to the substantial cut in state aid and this creates major problems for poor districts. We continue to review every line of our budget to find efficiencies and areas that we can trim costs while attempting to have a minimal impact on school programs.

From the Superintend

Along with the school budget vote, community members will also have the opportunity to vote for school board members. There are three seats up for reelection this year. If you are interested in serving on the school board, petitions will be available in the District Office from March 18 through April 18 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. If you have questions, please contact Pam Mennig at

"IMPORTANT MESSAGE FOR PARENTS"

As you may have heard in the local media, prescription drug abuse is a serious and growing problem among preteens and adolescents. At our school, students are educated about the dangers of prescription drug in our Health classes and specific programs such as *DARE* and the Drug Quiz Show preparation.

Parents (and grandparents) may wonder what they can do at home to prevent abuse and guard their child's safety. These steps might be considered to limit access and to keep your child, as well as other children, safe:

Safeguard all drugs in your house. Monitor your prescrip-

tion drugs to keep track of any missing pills. If you find you have to refill your prescription more often than expected, someone may be taking your medication without your knowledge.

Remind your child of the dangers of sharing medication, or of not following the recommended dosage. At school, only school nurses, with a physician's written permission are able to dispense medication.

Be a good role model by not sharing prescriptions with other family members.

Properly conceal and dispose of old or unused medicines. Prescription drugs should be kept where a child cannot access them. Old drugs should be disposed of promptly.

Talk with your teen about the

dangers of abusing prescription drugs, as well as the fact that it is illegal to give or sell anyone else a prescription drug. Web sites of interest: www.drugfree.org or www. theantidrug.com

Pre-K Registration

Madison-Oneida BOCES is now accepting Pre-K applications for the 2011-12 school year. It is important that parents provide:

- Child's birth certificate
- Child's immunization record
- Proof of residency (utility bill, rent receipt, or mortgage receipt)
- Children must be four years old on or before December 1st, 2011.

Parents are encouraged to register now so that children can be part of the orientation program. Registration packets can be picked up at SVCS in the elementary office.

Kindergarten Registration

Kindergarten registration for the school year 2011-2012 will be held at Stockbridge Valley Central School on Monday, March 7th, through Friday,

March 11th, 2011 from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the elementary office. Any child who will be five years of age on or before December 1st, 2011 is eligible to be enrolled in kindergarten. Even if a child attends the Pre-K program, they still need to be registered for kindergarten.

Registration is necessary before a student can begin school. It is not necessary for the child to be present at the time of registration. However, the District requires that a parent bring the child's birth certificate, official immunization record of his or her shots and proof of residency (mortgage/lease or utility bill). Any pertinent legal papers should also be provided at this time. According to New York State Law, all children must have a certificate showing complete polio, diphtheria, regular measles, German measles, mumps, varicella and hepatitis B immunizations before entering school.

If the established dates are not convenient, parents may contact Mrs. Norine Miller in the elementary office at 495-4550 to make other arrangements.



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
