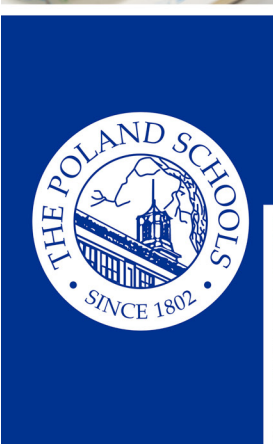

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Poland Residents,

Here we go again; 2023-2024 topped ALL the charts! Our academic ranking came in with McKinley and Poland Middle School earning the highest award in the state getting tagged with a FIVE STAR ranking with the Seminary close behind with a 4.5 STAR ranking. We showed growth in nearly every aspect measured by the Ohio Department of Education. We hit our mark for compliance for special education with a 4.0 score, which is the highest you can receive. We were granted EXEMPT status by the Ohio Department of Education for three straight years of meeting the academic performance benchmarks. We also had a remarkable 151 students earning College Credit Plus at the Seminary.

We continued our athletic dominance in the Northeast 8 Conference earning nine conference titles and several athletes earning **Player of the Year**. We all had the chance to enjoy the great sounds of the Poland Marching Band, Choir, musicals, plays, and art shows across Mahoning County.

We ended the year with a strong, healthy Five-Year financial forecast, clean audit, and a detailed Forging Bulldog Forward, a long-term plan for repairing and maintaining our facilities.

This is all because of our amazing teachers, incredible students, principals, dedicated support staff, and supportive parents who are a part of sensational culture winning at Poland.

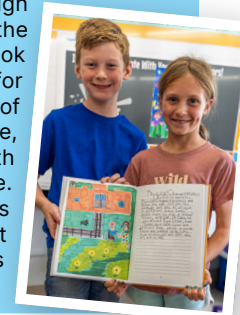
RIGHT TO READ WEEK

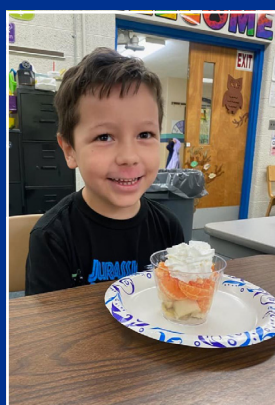
BIOGRAPHIES

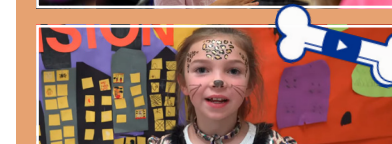
QUIZ BOWL

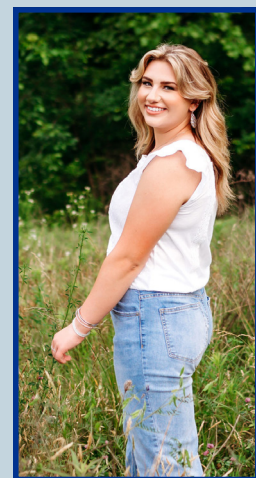

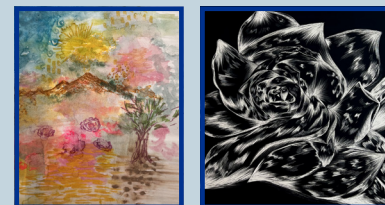


SILVER KEY PORTFOLIO

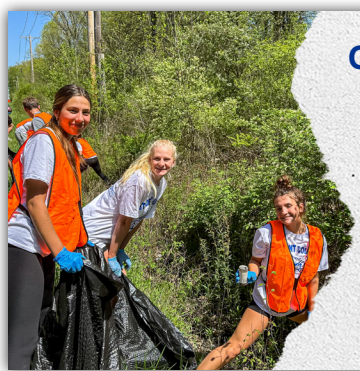
KINDNESS CLUB

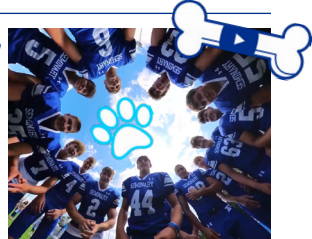
TAIL-WAGGING TALES OF 2023-2024

Through Ohio's K-12 School Safety Grant Program, the district has enhanced security measures by installing additional door locks and cameras, as well as door alarms at McKinley. This year, the safety of students and staff was further supported by the presence of four School Resource Officers (SROs), with two stationed at each building. Thank you to Poland Village and Poland Township Police for their contribution to school safety.



CURRICULUM

Curriculum focus continues to prioritize early educational development, especially among Poland's youngest Bulldogs. This year, the district will collaborate with United Way's 'Success by Six' program, which supports students entering kindergarten. Additionally, the district received a State Support Team Grant that will provide essential curriculum materials to Dobbins Early Learning Center.



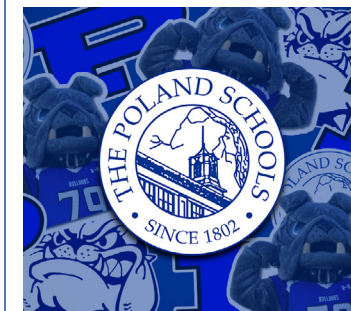
TECHNOLOGY

Through the E-Rate program, the district will save 50% on the cost of upgrading the WiFi across all K-12 school buildings. This significant investment will support the increasing number of devices and the 1-to-1 Chromebook network, ensuring robust and reliable internet access for every student.



FOOD SERVICES

The Food Services department has successfully passed an audit with exemplary results, demonstrating compliance and efficiency. Additionally, the department launched healthy snack initiatives to enhance nutritional offerings. Thank you to the dedicated team of workers who have served over 85,000 meals this year.



OPERATIONS

This summer, the district will be undertaking projects to enhance facilities. These improvements include installing ADA-compliant ramps at the stadium, resurfacing PSHS & Dobbins parking lots, and repurposing select K-6 existing rooms into classrooms for class size reduction. THE PRESCHOOL PUPS

Poland Local School District hosts a preschool at the 3030 Dobbins Road facility. The Dobbins Early Learning Center hosts over 60 students in three preschool classes:

- Monday-Friday (Transitional Kindergarten) 9 a.m. - 2 p.m.
- Monday + Wednesday + Friday 9 a.m. - 2 p.m.
- Tuesday & Thursday 9 a.m. - 12 p.m.

The young pups at Dobbins Early Learning Center had a vibrant year filled with numerous activities. They celebrated their 50th day of school, performed experiments on science day, showcased their talents in a Christmas concert, and welcomed parents to special concerts and snack times for Mother's and Father's Day. Their most notable achievement was raising \$590 through the Trike-A-Thon that supported St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

CHECK OUT POLAND'S CHECKBOOK

In May 2024, CFO/Treasurer Janet Muntean presented the Five-Year Forecast May Update to the Board of Education. The five-year forecast serves as a tool to communicate and assess the financial health of a school district. Local school districts are required to submit five-year forecasts twice annually to the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce. Each five-year forecast contains two components: 1) historical and projected financial data and 2) notes to explain any significant changes or "assumptions" a district used to develop the reported financial projections.

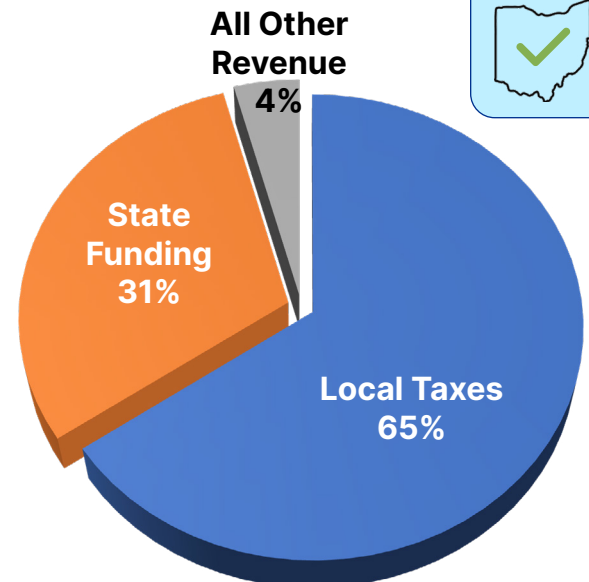

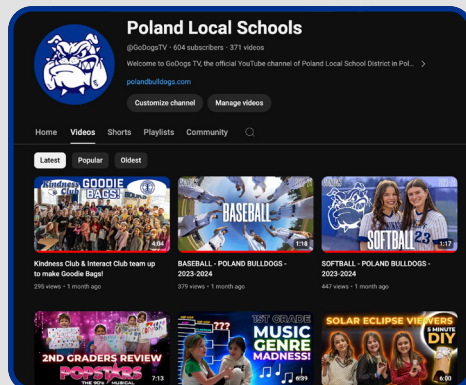
