Our school has a subscription to www.raz-kids.com, which allows your child to access an online library of reading materials from any computer connected to the Internet. Raz-Kids helps students improve their reading skills as they listen to a book read for modeled fluency. If the computer has a built-in record function, they can record themselves reading the same book. Or, students can read the book to themselves or aloud for practice. Interactive quizzes are available at the end of each book to check for understanding.

With this letter, I am sending home a summer reading contract for you and your child. Please sign it and return it to me. You will also find a Summer Reading Log for use during the summer vacation. Please make sure that your child adds the information for each book read, and that you add your initials. Have your child turn in the log to his or her teacher after the summer break.
