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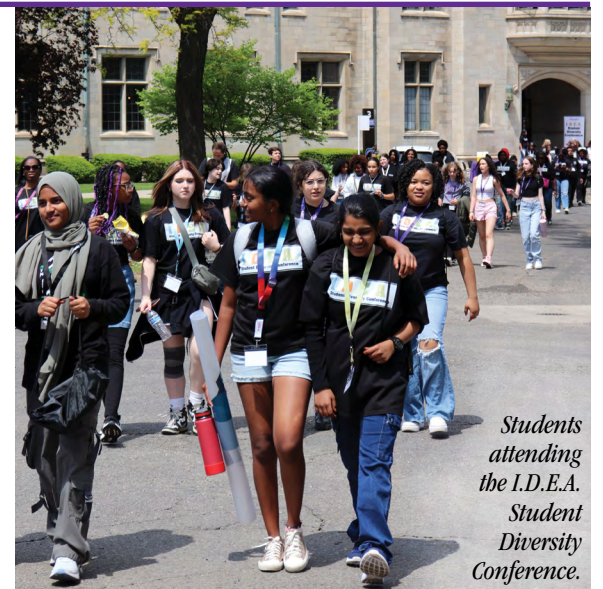
Farmington Public Schools hosted I.D.E.A. Student Diversity Conference

lunch from around-the-world. The theme of this year's conference was "Look at Me" with a focus on equipping middle and high school students with tools and knowledge necessary to navigate the world.

"Look at Me" serves as a call to action, urging teachers, parents, stakeholders, and peers to acknowledge and recognize the multifaceted identities, experiences, and perspectives of others. The conference aimed to shine a spotlight on the importance of visibility, representation, and empowerment within diverse communities. It encourages participants to step out of their comfort zones, listen attentively, and embrace the stories and voices that often go unheard. Ultimately, "Look at Me" is about meaningful connections, empathy, and understanding, living and breathing out equity, inclusivity, and justice.

The keynote presenter at this year's conference was Dr. Jay Marks, a widely respected educator, working in education since 1991. Dr. Marks has served as a classroom teacher, education consultant, and most recently, a Diversity

and Equity Consultant with Oakland Schools.

This year's I.D.E.A. Student Diversity Conference breakout sessions were created for students, by students. The breakout sessions were designed for students to address, embrace, celebrate, and collaborate on all things DEI at Farmington Public Schools, its community, and the world. Breakout sessions include Do Not Judge Me, Don't Play In My Face, I Own My Own Identity, To Be "Othered", Are We Standing On Business, Confidence Is Key, Trap Yoga and Mindfulness, You Know I Can Hear You, Right?, and Discussions on Healing Through War.

District issues survey through Cobalt Community Research

Farmington Public Schools is working with Cobalt Community Research on a survey of parents and community members to gather information about Farmington Public Schools. Farmington Public Schools awarded Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting

Farmington Public Schools (FPS) has received the Association of School Business Officials (ASBO) Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting for the fiscal year that ended in 2023.

According to the ASBO, this award represents significant achievement and reflects the District's commitment to transparency and high-quality financial reporting. FPS has won this award for the past 27 years.

By participating in the COE program, school districts demonstrate their commitment to financial transparency. Applicants submit their ACFR for review by a team of financial professionals who provide feedback to improve future documents. If the report meets the requirements of the program, it may receive the Certificate of Excellence. A district's participation in the COE program can facilitate bond rating and continuing bond disclosure processes.

"For more than half a century, ASBO International's Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting has been the gold standard in promoting and recognizing excellence in financial reporting," according to ASBO International Executive Director Jim Rowan, CAE, SFO. "Communicating the financial and the economic state of a district is so



important when engaging with the school community and building their trust. Districts that receive the COE Award have demonstrated their ability to do that at the highest level."

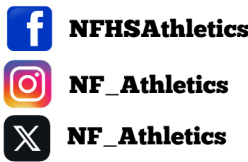

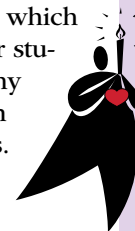
