VISION

Budget

For the 2024-2025 school year (SY), we budgeted \$636,257 dollars for the life skills portion of special education and \$354,640 dollars for cyber school. These two items alone are more than our deficit budget of \$773,497 dollars. Over the past 11 years, Harrisburg has chosen to provide negligible if any increases to school districts for special education costs even though this cost has risen significantly. The same is true with cyber school funding. There are simple solutions to fix the financial issue with cyber schools, but again, Harrisburg has not addressed the issue. Although school superintendents have continually raised concern over the cost of special education and cyber school, it has not been enough to effect change. It must come from each constituent communicating with their legislators. There is legislation in the House currently setting the price for cyber school at \$8,000 dollars. This is your opportunity to save local tax dollars. Contact Jesse Topper (State Representative) and Pat Stefano (State Senator) and let them know your position on the topic.

With our deficit projected to be at \$773,497 dollars and the state budget not approved, it is vital to support an increase in taxes. Fortunately, the farmstead/homestead reimbursement was increased and will help to offset the increase in tax for those that applied. NBC has the highest median income and the lowest school tax rate in Bedford County.

Each year during the budget process, we budget conservatively on our revenues and more liberally on expenditures. There are many unknowns when preparing the budget. For example, we don't know what special education costs, cyber costs, and employee attrition may be for the following year. We typically do not know what the Basic Education Funding (BEF) from the state will be because they are not required to approve the state budget prior to June 30th. We apply previous years' results to the budget while still understanding that it could fluctuate greatly.

In the meantime, it is vital that you continue to voice your opinions to our state legislature concerning the unfunded mandates placed on local school districts by our politicians and the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE).





ATHLETICS SPOTLIGHT – COACH BRIAN DUTCHCOT

Athletics

Coach Brian Dutchcot was named the District 5 Wrestling Coach of the Year this past Winter by his peers. These accolades came as a result of a terrific season that saw the Panther Wrestlers crown 2 individual district champs, qualify 2 for the state meet, capture the ICC South title for the second consecutive year and was highlighted by the District 5 Tournament Title. The District 5 Title sent shockwaves across the state as the Panthers upset the highly touted Chestnut Ridge Lions who had won the 5-AA tournament 13 consecutive times prior to this year.

Many see Coach Dutchcot as the face of NBC Wrestling but his athletic roots run much deeper than in just that sport.

While growing up in Ridgway, PA, he competed in 3-sports from youth through high school graduation.

During his time at Ridgway Area High School, he was a three year letter winner in football. And as a Senior was selected to the Big 30 All Star game and as an AML Conference All Star. In the winter, as could be expected, he competed all four years of high school as a starter on the wrestling team. In his first two seasons, Ridgway was ranked first in the state, and 23rd and 24th in the nation, according to USA Today. In his Senior season, he placed 2nd in District 9 at 140 pounds and was also a Northwest Regional runner up and a state qualifier. In the spring, he turned his attention to the baseball field. He was a three year starter and letter winner for the Ridgway Elkers. After a second place District 9 finish in his Junior year, the Elkers captured the District 9 title and finished in the top four of the state in AA baseball when he was a Senior.

He continued as an athlete in College at IUP. He started many games as a freshman and was a three year starter at IUP. During those years, he played every position in the infield. IUP's best finish while he was there was his Freshman year, when IUP finished as PSAC Runners-up.

This season marks his 18th year teaching Spanish and coaching at Northern Bedford. He currently holds the Head JH Baseball Coaching position in addition to wrestling. "I am blessed to work and coach in a supportive district," Dutchcot said. "When I attend events with our athletes, they often get complimented on their sportsmanship, and I think that means more to me than anything else. My goal as a coach is to help these young athletes become outstanding citizens who give back to their community in a positive way."

All those who watch Coach Dutchcot can agree that he does an outstanding job at reaching those goals. "He has done a consistently fine job of developing our athletes for years and has the utmost respect of the wrestling community and Coaches and Athletic Directors across our region," according to Athletic Director Jeff Batzel.

After taking over the Wrestling program in 2012, the Panthers hovered around the .500 mark for about 5-years before they took off and other than the Covid Year (2021) NB hasn't had a losing season in wrestling since 2017. Dutchcot's career record in 13-years at the helm is 127-100.

Dutchcot was also instrumental in advocating for and working with Mr. Batzel in starting the Girls Wrestling program at NBC.

Our students and athletes are fortunate to have Senor Dutchcot here at NBC and touching so many lives in so many different ways.

A Healthy Habit

Healthy snacking isn't just about satisfying hunger—it's about fueling the brain for optimal performance. Research shows that nutritious snacks can have significant benefits for students' cognitive function and academic achievement. According to a study published in the Journal of School Health, students who eat balanced, healthy snacks have better attention spans, improved memory, and enhanced cognitive function. Additionally, snacks rich in protein, fiber, and healthy fats help stabilize blood sugar levels, preventing energy crashes and promoting sustained focus. Furthermore, the American Academy of Pediatrics highlights the importance of nutrient-dense snacks, such as fruits, vegetables, nuts, and whole grains, for supporting brain development and overall well-being in children. By incorporating snacks into their diet, students can stay energized, focused, and ready to tackle academic challenges. So, next time your child reaches for a snack, help them make a healthy choice that will fuel their fun!

Clean Food

Washing is one of the primary ways to reduce the risk of food poisoning. From hands to kitchen counters, it is important to wash properly to stop the spread of harmful bacteria and viruses. However, when it comes to food, the rules of washing are not as clear!

Always Wash:

Fruits and Vegetables – Wash all produce, even if the peel will not be eaten, because dirt and bacteria can be transferred from the peel to the inside of the fruit as it is sliced or peeled. All produce, even organic, should be washed with cool tap water immediately before eating or using in a recipe. Skip the soap because the porous surfaces on fresh produce can absorb the ingredients in soap.

Never Wash:

Raw Meat – Despite what many think, washing raw chicken, fish, and other meats does not clean it. In fact, rinsing raw meat may spread harmful bacteria such as Salmonella around the kitchen and increases the risk of cross-contamination to other foods, utensils, and surfaces. The only way to kill those pathogens is to cook all meat and fish to their appropriate internal temperature.

Eggs – Avoid washing eggs after purchase because it can remove the coating (applied during processing) that protects eggs from bacteria.

Go Green(s)!

Dark leafy greens come in an incredible variety beyond romaine or spinach, including kale, chard, collard greens, arugula, and even fresh herbs. Packed with vitamins, minerals, and antioxidants, dark leafy greens support good vision and immune function. Greens can sometimes be a hard sell for younger children, but there are plenty of ways to prepare them that retain their nutrient density while boosting appeal. The USDA's MyPlate recommends incorporating one and a half to two cups of these greens into your family's weekly diet. For a kid-friendly approach, consider adding darker greens like romaine or arugula into the usual iceberg salad mixes. Add a cup of spinach or kale to a mixed berry smoothie. Add chard or collard greens finely chopped to a favorite soup. However, you embrace the opportunity to "Go Green" this summer, it's a great time to make dark leafy greens a tasty and essential part of your family's diet.

Bicycle Safety

Bicycling is one of the best ways to get exercise; see the sights; and reduce your carbon footprint. However, bicyclists face a host of hazards. They often must share the road with vehicles, and injuries can happen even on a designated path.

Cyclists... Check Your Equipment

The seat should be adjusted to the proper height and locked in place.

Make certain all parts are secure and working properly.

Check that the tires are inflated properly.

Make sure the bike is equipped with reflectors on the rear/front pedals and spokes.

A horn or bell, a rear-view mirror, and a bright headlight are also recommended.

Plan to Be Seen

Wear neon, fluorescent, or other bright clothing.

Whenever possible, ride during the day.

If you must ride at night, wear reflective clothing and use flashing lights.

Wear a Helmet

Adjust sizing pads or fit rung until the helmet is snug.

Position the helmet level on your head, covering the forehead and not tipped backward or forward; this will be one to two finger widths above the eyebrow.

Adjust the side straps so they form a "V" shape under and slightly in front of your ears.

Center the buckle on the chin strap under the chin.

Buckle and tighten the chin strap until it is snug; no more than one to two fingers should be able to fit between the chin and strap.

When fitted, the helmet should not rock more than 1" side to side or front to back on your head. **Follow These Rules of the Road**

Get acquainted with traffic laws. Bicyclists MUST follow the same rules as motorists. Ride single file in the direction of traffic.

Remain alert, keep your head up, and look around.


Never hitch onto cars.

Before entering traffic, stop and look left, right, left again, and over your shoulder.

The Homeless Children's initiative ensures homeless children and youth a free and appropriate public education on an equal basis with all other children of Pennsylvania. Program objectives and activities are intended to remove barriers to enrollment and educational success, and to ensure that education is as uninterrupted as possible while students are homeless.

Definitions of Homelessness

A child is considered homeless if he or she is living with or without a parent:

• In a homeless or domestic violence shelter

• In a public or private place not designated as regular sleeping accommodation, such as a vehicle, park, hotel or campground

- With relatives or friends due to lack of housing ("doubled up")
- Outside of his or her home as a runaway or because he/she has been forced out of the home
- In a house for unwed mothers with no other options for living accommodations
- In any of the situations listed above as a child of a migrant family

• Homeless children reside in situations that are not fixed, regular or adequate.

Barriers Facing Homeless Children

Homeless children face a variety of legal, social and emotional barriers that may interrupt their education. They include:

- Lack of school supplies and clothing
- Residency and guardianship requirements
- Lapses in program continuity
- Delays in educational evaluations
- Lack of transportation to school
- Missing academic and health records
- Lack of awareness regarding the extent and effects of homelessness
- Inadequate parental resources
- Social stigma attached to homelessness

How Homeless Children's Initiative Coordinators Can Help

- Assisting with school enrollment and placement
- Providing referrals for clothing, food, shelter, rent, medical services, preschool, housing, advocacy, counseling, etc.
- Coordinating transportation to and from school
- Implementing tutoring and enrichment services in shelters and other settings
- Coordinating support services
- Distributing literature regarding homeless children
- Providing training and in-service related to the McKinney-Vento Act
- Increasing public awareness of homelessness
- Assisting with obtaining school clothing, shoes and supplies for homeless students

How School Personnel Can Help

- School administrators can help by knowing the rights of the homeless and encouraging sensitivity
- Identified Homeless Liaisons can identify and track homeless students, train district staff on Federal and State policies, and contact HCI staff with questions and requests for technical assistance
- Principals can create a welcoming environment for homeless families
- School secretaries can discreetly assist parents with forms and paperwork
- Counselors can refer for needed services
- School Nurses can expedite immunization and health record transfers
- Transportation staff can arrange for children to attend their school of origin
