Q02: If you wish to provide more information about your responses to the previous question, please let us know below. Re: Q01: Did the perceived quality of the SAU70 schools have an impact on your decision to live specifically in Hanover or Norwich?

169 responses. After removing "no" and similar answers → 123 answers → 28 Ray answers

- 1. I prefer other school systems but my \*\*\*\* \*\*\*\* here and its a good school, so not worth the arguing.
- 2. We moved to the region for several reasons but bought our home based on the school district.
- 3. It was a major consideration
- 4. Peace place to live around

- 5. The quality of the schools is a primary reason that we chose to live here because we don't want to have to send our kids to private school for a quality education.
- 6. The schools are the only reason the high property values and real property taxes make sense.
- 7. We moved here for the schools, there was really no other reason. We used to live in Lebanon.
- 8. I chose to move my family from Lebanon to Hanover to my kids could attend the school districts in Hanover and Norwich.
- 9. Reputation speaks a lot; curriculum and academic structure are good in SAU
- 10. Moved here from other UV town for the schools
- 11. Everyone kept saying that the Hanover schools were top notch but so far I think the elementary school we were in Boston was much better. My main issue is that the \*\*\*\* is not very present, doesn't know the kids or parents and I don't feel like the administration wants parent involvement.
- 12. Grew up in the area and have an affinity towards Hanover compared to other nearby towns:)
- 13. The Hanover school systems offers an excellent education and my child has learned so much.
- 14. Moved to a Dartmouth rental, and then did not want to move kids once we got settled. Love Ray School.
- 15. SAU70 is long reputed for its strong school system & community
- 16. I previously lived in Lebanon, \*\*\*\* \*\*\*\* \*\*\*\*. My wife preferred to live in Hanover to allow the children to attend school in this school district. Another factor was that many of our child's friends would be in the school district as well.
- 17. Moved to Hanover specifically for the schools, but in the Upper Valley area generally because of Dartmouth
- 18. The schools aren't the reason we're in the Upper Valley, but it is the reason we chose Hanover.
- 19. good school system
- 20. I looked up schools next to Harvard, Brown and DH and moved here mostly because of schools.
- 21. I also work in the district so logistically living in district helps navigate family life.
- 22. The schools changed a lot since 2017 when we toured all 3 Hanover schools. I am not sure if we would have decided on Hanover if it was a question today. Too many negative changes happened since the pandemic. We still have 2 kids in the SAU and hope that there will be a return to the previously experienced quality of educational service.
- 23. We are prioritizing the school district for our kids, which is a huge financial decision.
- 24. Ray School is a high ranking school in NH.
- 25. It was very important to us to be in the best school district possible.
- 26. When we bought our house we wanted to be in this school district
- 27. Moved here for high-quality schools that allow for differentiation
- 28. Before children we lived in another UV location but once our kids were school age, we wanted to be in Hanover schools

Q04: If you wish to provide more information about your responses to the previous question, please let us know. Re Q03: Generally, is living in Hanover or Norwich financially challenging for your family?

180 responses. After removing "no" and similar answers → 141 answers → 32 Ray answers

- 1. Taxes are really high.
- 2. It is not common concern now but I do worry about what would happen if my job changed and we could no longer afford our mortgage.
- 3. We rent, but could not afford to buy here
- 4. We both work highly educated and professional jobs, and are stretched thin with the cost of housing, childcare, and general cost of living.
- 5. The recent real property reassessments were challenging. My real property taxes increased by 33%.
- 6. It is not a challenge for our family, however we are extremely fortunate and have good remote employment that afford us to live here. Relative to employment opportunities in the area the cost of living in the UV is a considerable concern in terms of creating a culturally and economically diverse community.
- 7. We sacrifice to live here, but not at the expense of retirement and savings. We do less travel than we might otherwise and drive old/less expensive cars that we otherwise would.
- 8. We are a dual-income household who does struggle at times and live very close to our margins. If it wasn't for credit cards, it would be challenging for us. I don't have a safety net when it comes to finances. It's just my spouse and I.
- 9. There have been times when my spouse and I who earn salaries have lived pay check to pay or had less then \$1k in our bank account. We have had lean times. We are the classic house rich cash poor family.
- 10. High tax rates.
- 11. Housing prices are exponentially growing and there is no new construction. This could be challenging for young families with the kids who are starting their professional careers but do not have bandwidth to afford a decent housing
- 12. There can be some pressure to volunteer either time or money which is t always feasible.
- 13. There is no housing in Hanover and the fee homes that come on sale are priced so high that it makes me want to move back to MA. I look at home prices in \*\*\*\* MA compared to Hanover and you get a better home in MA than here.
- 14. We feel fortunate to have purchased our home when we did (2018), it'd be much harder for us to afford it today. We find student enrichment activities and camps (and daycare) are some of our most significant costs.

- 15. We own our home, but would not be able to afford to move to another home in town
- 16. Hanover is financially feasible for us but not for many, and that continues to be something we think about relative to SAU70. Economic diversity and diversity of opportunity is important to us, including supporting others.
- 17. Initially problematic, but now in a (hopefully solid) financial groove
- 18. Initial start-up issues were challenging in the first year, but (hopefully) we're stabilized now
- 19. Housing is so expensive!
- 20. Housing costs are a huge challenge for our family. We began looking for a home in Feb of 2020, and watched in dismay as the costs kept rising. Both of the adults in our family work full time in good jobs (one at the College, one freelance) and it's still not enough for housing.
- 21. Getting a house here seems to be the biggest hurdle; there doesn't seem to be any other financial hurdles beyond housing
- 22. It wasn't until housing market blew up. I couldn't buy a house in this market.
- 23. I live with my family in \*\*\*\* \*\*\*\* \*so my children can attend SAU 70 schools. It's not ideal actually, it stinks. There is no housing to purchase that our family can afford in the school system towns and it's a logistal nightmare getting my kids to school after I would need to be at school \*\*\*\* \*\*\*\* \*. Lucky for us, I have \*\*\*\* house we can live in.
- 24. Hanover is expensive!
- 25. Cost of living is higher than near by places.
- 26. Very high rent
- 27. We bought our house in 2014 (in Hanover) and probably could not repeat that today (we would be priced out).
- 28. The cost of housing is exorbitant
- 29. Childcare costs are very high.
- 30. The cost of living and the expectation of wealth is a challenge as well as having to work and take time off to attend school functions that could be held after hours.
- 31. Property taxes are high. Contractors often charge more in Hanover.
- 32. This is a very affluent community, wherein sometimes the rate becomes the norm and it is hard to reconcile

197 responses. After removing "no" and similar answers → 160 answers → 28 Ray answers

- 1. Our daughter has \*\*\*\*, \*\*\*\* and a poor \*\*\*\* \*\*\*. We didn't feel her needs were being met at school so we are supplementing with after school private tutoring sessions.
- 2. Speech
- 3. The curriculum isn't enforced; teachers are free to teach what they want. This creates asymmetrical learning opportunities between classrooms, even classrooms in the same grade.
- 4. Logistically challenging and limited local options. Mostly to augment and supplement child's interests and or needs.
- 5. ongoing private tutor for spelling
- 6. But we have tried to add supplementary online resource.
- 7. My child is a year behind in math (in \*\*\*\* grade) and could benefit from tutoring. \*\*\*\* teacher has been really disengaged this year and hasn't been interested in adapting to my \*\*\*\* needs.
- 8. My child receives additional help in school for 2 subjects and if s/he continues to need such services, I will likely secure private tutoring despite it being financially and logistically prohibitive.
- 9. Our child received reading support in school from K through 3rd grade. While it was helpful, it was not sufficient so we supplemented this with weekly private one on one tutoring. After incurring this substantial cost for several years, my child is now at the appropriate reading level and enjoys reading but it took substantial financial and time resources.
- 10. Kumon for math and reading
- 11. Used to be that advanced math was offered to students in 4th and 5th grade that were excelling in math. The teachers would correct it and give feedback. Now I was told to buy the books myself and spend time correcting it myself. That is frustrating.
- 12. My daughter goes to Kumon program. There is no one on one tutoring but have some support and structured program

- 13. I would like to because the Ray school doesn't seem to be pushing the kids along or giving homework. The lack of tests they have make it difficult to know where they stand academically. Private tutor would help resolve that
- 14. There is so much pressure in Hanover to be excellent. Parents always say that they don't care but all the kids are taking extra math courses, reading camps, sports are another pressure point. It's.l a bit of a crazy town with academics and sports.
- 15. Always good to have extra support!
- 16. Mathnasium
- 17. I expected a greater focus (and progress) on learning to read in Kindergarten this year.
- 18. We do have some concerns with the curriculum that the school district is forced to use, as part of the public school system.
- 19. My kid is a bit behind on one subject and gets supplementary stuff in the school. The personnel say that they don't think there's any long-term concern, but the internal pressure is there. "Am I being a good parent if I get my child supplementary teaching to help them catch up, but I'm choosing not to due to costs and logistics?" It's hard to face the mirror on this sometimes.
- 20. Reading help for about 2 years
- 21. My kid is very gifted. And we're Asian. \*\*\*\* gets enough of that at home.
- 22. After the pandemic one of our children at Ray School needed a lot of catching up in \*\*\*\*. We were remote during the pandemic school year and the online option was very poorly designed and the teachers were not at all supported by the school. Our child's \*\*\*\* score plummeted on the year end testing the following year and we requested some assistance in the \*\*\*\* grade (the beginning of the current school year). We were told that there is no staff allocated for this kind of support anymore.
- 23. \*\*\*\* tutor specifically trained in \*\*\*\* \*\*\*\*
- 24. We believed that the education provided by the school is so far enough.
- 25. Kumon
- 26. Math can be more challenging. It is too easy for an average kid. The school should provide enrichment program like extra worksheets and homework
- 27. It was very costly but much needed.
- 28. Attends math enrichment to access more rigorous material

Q08: If you wish to provide more information about your responses to the previous question, please let us know. Re Q07: Philosophically, do you feel that taxpayers should pay for the costs of these supplementary private educational activities for subjects taught in school, or should costs be borne out by participating students and their families?

210 responses. After removing "no" and similar answers → 173 answers → 29 Ray answers

- 1. Taxes are really high. It is not appropriate to push additional cost burden on tax-payers.
- 2. I havent really ever thought about this- always assumed it should be families paying for kids
- 3. The elementary school does a great job of supplementing what students need, from my experience.
- 4. Students shouldn't have to pay for tutoring to get an A. Getting an A should be attainable without parent's money. Extra hours should be available to everyone even people performing above grade level.
- 5. Subsidies for financially challenged families is reasonable when there is a demonstrated need for assistance. However, I feel that the district provides significant resources for families.
- 6. The Hanover schools already provide comprehensive services. Extra services MUST be the responsibility of the families. Students are NOT entitled to extra-curricular academic services.
- 7. If the academic needs are not being met, through school based education, then yes.
- 8. I think it should be covered 100% for individuals qualifying for free/reduced lunch and only if it's necessary to keep students at grade level. Supplemental tutoring to provide "advanced opportunities" for students should be 100% supported by the family.
- 9. As a community, I think it's important to support all families. I think you could have a sliding scale fee system with waived or reduced fees based on need.
- 10. Subsidized for children with IEP's or demonstrated financial need.
- 11. I think it should also be sliding scale, where families who are struggling get more financial support than other families. Perhaps a sliding scale.
- 12. Extra tutoring should be available for kids who need it. Some families may want to spend a lot more.
- 13. Tax payers are not social welfare workers

- 14. I think taxpayers should only pay for services that help kids who are performing below grade level. I have such a child and pay \$65/week for additional reading and writing tutoring.
- 15. students need to be challenged
- 16. I think school is where you should learn and extra curricular should be for fun but this town is a little crazy and kids feel so much pressure to keep up. I don't want to supplement but my kids beg me because their friends are all in accelerated math classes
- 17. If it helps students keep up to grade level, school should pay. If it is just because of person interest, family should pay.
- 18. This is a complex issues fraught with broader challenges. School budgets SHOULD be able to provide supplemental services for students needing such interventions without additional taxpayer support.
- 19. I think my wife would have preferred to send the children to a private school system, but we could not justify the loss of taxes that we would still continue to pay towards the public school system. If we were allowed to deduct this amount from our taxes, I think our child would be in private school instead.
- 20. This is solely dependent on goals. Are the children at grade-level etc.
- 21. Some quick scheming/gaming would likely occur if taxpayers took this on 100%
- 22. If a child needs extra help on something taught in school, then I think the school should provide that assistance using taxpayer dollars
- 23. I'm not certain about this answer. My perception is that SAU70 schools are exceptional, and have the resources to meet any additional needs for students who need support. But: in the case of families who do not have the financial resources for a perceived need for private tutoring outside of the district, I'm not certain what the right answer is.
- 24. Because parents need to invest time in their kids education. There's literally nobody in Hanover who's not educated.
- 25. The supplementary nature of the support I am thinking of is due to the schools lack of support from the previous years. Our child is a hard working student but the school did not provide a full time teacher for her class during the pandemic. This was true to all \*\*\*\* of our children who were remote during the pandemic school year. The SAU shamefully dropped the ball at all three Hanover schools. The right thing would have been to say that the schools are not able to provide adequate education in the remote format.
- 26. It is a private matter.
- 27. Perhaps local services could be approached to offer scholarships
- 28. My child is on an IEP and I don't believe that \*\*\*\* is really getting the full extent of services that \*\*\*\* needs/requires. Very disappointing.
- 29. The district is required to educate all children, and I believe Dresden to have resources beyond most other districts to accommodate for these needs during the school day.

- 4. My child has expressed interest in additional classes but honestly, they are very expensive and hard to get to during the work day.
- 5. I thought about robotics but it's expensive and logistically cost prohibitive.

- 13. My child does take music lessons at the Upper Valley Music Center, but I'm not sure if that applies to this question?

- 21. Our daughter is enrolled in private piano and music reading lessons to supplement her weekly music special.

114 responses. After removing "no" and similar answers → 67 answers → 11 Ray answers

- 1. I strongly feel the \*\*\*\* services are inadequate at ray school, really upset my child should have qualified, just barely missed the cut off. Only \*\*\*\* percent understandable in \*\*\*\* grade. When denied services, we were offered a friend of the \*\*\*\* \*\*\*, who didn't take insurance. Instead we found private \*\*\*\* with insurance. We're not even told that option!
- 2. She has a new IEP, not sure if we'll need additional services on top of that next year.
- 3. I know families on IEP who recieve round the clock aide while in school but still need to supplement with weekly services because what the school provides while good is simply not sufficient. It is a burden for them time and cost-wise. Both parents work full time and have had to take time off from work regularly. This also had adverse career ramifications.
- 4. Kumon reading
- 5. I pay for additional reading and writing tutoring \$65/week
- 6. Mre help needed for ADHD and social skills. Need Camp Coyote back
- 7. The middle school does a great job with food allergies but the Ray school needs some serious training. There is a lot of talk about diversity and inclusion but it's all talk. Kids with food allergies are excluded and if you say something, you're the problem. the food services provided at the Ray school are so dangerous for kids with food allergies, you can't trust what's on the website and foods have common allergens almost everyday of the week without any option for meals without common allergens. The middle school does a much better job. The person in charge makes meals that most kids can have.
- 8. My child has a IEP and would benefit from supplemental services; however, the district does not pay or offer after-school services.
- 9. Private tutoring with an \*\*\*\* specialist

- 10. My Child with recent IEP: considering summer tutoring to avoid having an IEP at RMS. Stigma attached to those students but being segregated even as a homeroom
- 11. We currently do not have supplemental services that I believe she needs but it is cost prohibitive.

107 responses. After removing "no" and similar answers → 63 answers → 13 Ray answers

- 1. Therapy
- 2. The school provides services that meet our family's needs.
- 3. Minimal support through school guidance counselor for anxiety, not significant enough for additional intervention.
- 4. It was very, very hard to find. Once I mentioned \*\*\*\* was finally in counseling, the school came forward with additional resources that would have been helpful months ago.
- 5. She does not have a mental heath disorder but is seeing someone due to the \*\*\*\* \*\*\*\*

  \*\*\*\* \*\*\*\* \*\*\*\*
- 6. I pay \$200 every other week to visit a psychologist that is not covered by health insurance.
- 7. The pandemic pushed many kids over the edge and anxiety is a real problem. Wish the school would have a therapist on site.
- 8. I had very minor concerns at the preschool phase, but I don't think there's a need currently.
- 9. My kids seem fine on this, but there appear to be many anecdotes in my social circle of folks struggling with this, particularly costs and availability of providers
- 10. I can't find anyone locally that has openings for my child. The only therapists with available appointments don't take insurance and I can not afford to pay out of pocket. If there is one thing the schools should make more available to families, it's mental health care.
- 11. These services were highly beneficial and my child no longer needs them at this time.
- 12. One-off help with anxiety issues related to child's \*\*\*\*
- 13. It's very difficult to find child therapists for young children in the Upper Valley.

Q16: If you wish to provide more information about your responses to the previous question, please let us know. Re Q15: Does your child have difficulty obtaining nutritious meals?

97 responses. After removing "no" and similar answers → 52 answers → 13 Ray answers

- 1. The quality of the meals served at the Ray School cafeteria has declined notably in the past several years. We generally send our kids with food to ensure they have a nutritious meal.
- 2. Ideally would like to see more healthy, local and organic, healthy foods in school. We limit school meals because many options include highly processed foods of low quality and are a lack of regional/ local sourcing remains a consideration.
- 3. School lunch should be free for all students. We can afford it no problem, but as a free lunch kid myself, it was incredibly stigmatizing. Make it free for everyone and no one has to worry about being hungry.
- 4. I wish s/he had more variety but that's more a function of age and personality.
- 5. The child is picky!
- 6. Used to be more healthy options at Ray. All schools need more healthy options. Veggies! Roasted veggies, Fresh Kale chips, etc.
- 7. Working parents/ not a lot of time to prepare meals for several children.
- 8. Wish there were a greater range of healthy lunch options. Our student has \*\*\*\*, so limited range of what he'll currently eat, so we pack lunch but wish there were greater range. Ideal would be some incorporation of local farm to school.
- 9. I think the school lunches at Ray are not of good quality- not very healthy and too much repeating.
- 10. The quality of food provided at the Ray school is suboptimal for growing, learning kids.
- 11. I'm assuming that "pickiness" is not what the question is concerning
- 12. Im the only one who is making income.
- 13. I wish school meals were more nutritious, and I would pay the extra cost. The convenience of school meals is big.

Q18: If you wish to provide more information about your responses to the previous question, please let us know below. Re: Q17: Does your child have regular access at home to technologies or devices needed for educational purposes, such as internet access, a computer, a tablet, or a printer?

104 responses. After removing "no" and similar answers → 62 answers → 14 Ray answers

- 1. The internet and screen time are a HUGE negative influence on my childrens' ability to focus and engage in real life. PLEASE keep screen time out of the curriculum. The current school assignments are requiring them to get ONLINE. This is unhealthy and not age appropriate for our \*\*\*\* and \*\*\*\* graders.
- 2. The schools provide all required technology.
- 3. Working to be very mindful of screen time and prefer hands on and experiential opportunities where and whenever possible. However recognize high value and appreciate high value and high quality technology options have to offer.
- 4. It's a challenge when multiple children need to use my laptop and I need to use it too for my own use including work. Sometimes this involves me using my laptop after s/he goes to bed as the kiddos come first.
- 5. If I am working on my laptop, I cannot always let my child use it. Sometimes we take turns.
- 6. Students at RAy and RMS should not be expected to have phones. This is especially a problem at RMS
- 7. More guidelines from school about age-appropriate technology and apps/etc. would be helpful, as would knowing what students are doing on tech in school.
- 8. We also use the free/low-cost technology available at the public library as needed for school work.
- 9. Our family also uses the free/low-cost technology provided through our public library (computer, printer, copier)
- 10. not much is needed, but my child has access when he does need it
- 11. At this point, there's not a great need for technology at home. I assume as my child gets older, there will be a greater need.
- 12. My kids are in grades \*\*\*\* & \*\*\*\* so at this point they do not use technology for outside of school educational purpose. When the time comes, they will have to share with me because I can not afford to purchase these items.
- 13. We have a young child, so no real need for this yet

14. I think we should limit as much as possible exposure of children to screens in elementary school, so I don't favor accesses to online tools at this age, even when labeled educational tools.

125 responses. After removing "no" and similar answers → 92 answers → 23 Ray answers

- 1. Please DE Emphasize SPORTS. Travel teams for grade school children is INSANITY. Put a stop to this NONSENSE and refocus childrens' time and attention.
- 2. There are no organized sports at the elementary school.
- 3. He learns swimming, \*\*\*\*, and soccer.
- 4. Ford Sayre Nordic and UVAC swim lessons
- 5. My child has done basketball and baseball and while s/he enjoys them, practices and games are scheduled with the assumption that there is a stay at home parent that can chauffer the kid to practice and games. Who has the financial and time resources to do this? My spouse and I make it work but its not without difficulty. It would be nice if the schools had school-sponsored and/or related programs instead of having to either go through parks and recreation or private leagues. I know there are families who would theoretically like to participate in such sports but for various reasons cannot or chose not to for the reasons I mentioned. It's truly a shame. Kids who don't have access to the same resources get left behind.
- 6. We do parks and rec for soccer and basketball and private league for baseball and basketball. Our child loves baseball and basketball and in order for them to possibly play at the high school level, this is what they need to do.
- 7. More options for sports you have never tried before would be nice even martial arts, where you are not the only new child and so you feel at a disadvantage
- 8. The rec department does not seem to care about youth sports anymore. Which is sad. Most or all youth sports are now private because the town dropped the ball.

- 9. The middle school doesn't have teams but larva and Rec does. Wish there was another option for soccer all he round. Not everyone wants to do lightning; it's super expensive and super intense. Some kids would like to play all year round without the intensity of lightning
- 10. Participate in activities across the upper valley (arts, swimming, gymnastics, etc)
- 11. Wish the sports were part of school or right after school so parents weren't expected to drive.
- 12. HPR sports
- 13. I'm not aware of specific school-sponsored sports at Ray. If there are some, please publicize more!
- 14. club sports
- 15. Lightning soccer and Ford Sayre nordic skiing
- 16. I spent so much time reading to him. He doesn't want anything else! It's sad!

We have chosen to enroll our children in other much more costly programs since the Rec programs are limited and in my opinion some sports are very poorly run as the coaches are volunteer and have no guidance. Better organization and paid coaches (I.e., not begging parents with full-time jobs and little coaching experience), would make these programs a more viable option and hopefully cut down on the perceived need to do Lightning soccer or private baseball at a huge expense of both time and money. There is a lot of pressure to join the travel teams and it is just too much for our family. But the rec leagues seem to phase out by the end of elementary school.
- 4. School based activities should be easily accessible for all families. Other outside activities should be borne by families.
- 5. School-sponsored sports and activities are a societal good that everyone should pay for.

- 5. You didn't ask about preschool costs. You didn't ask about caregiving costs. You didn't ask about KAST availability problems. I would rather the taxpayer pay for universal preschool than football uniforms.
- 6. Summer opportunities! Huge issue for many kids, especially 12-15.
- 7. The strings program is financially uneven. Violins are cheap, but other instruments are very expensive.
- 8. Cancellation of KAST was a huge hardship for us, a 2 working parent family
- 9. Thank you to the costing out committee for working on the survey so tirelessly. Your work does not go unrecognized. It is so key for families to have voices and to tackle a nuanced topic such as out-of-pocket costs, its important to do it in an anonymous manner like a survey. I was also very dismayed to hear a handful of board members in Hanover and Norwich be so dismissive of families experiences with cost and essentially boiling it down to family choices during the SAU 70 board meeting on 3/21/23. Some families don't have choices. I was also upset to hear some board members express the idea that hearing from families was not needed and a simple number was all that was needed. What a number means to a family will vary tremendouly. Thank you for perserving in the face of adversity from your colleagues. I am glad they eventually did the right thing and voted to move forward with the survey however I want them to know that I and other parents are now watching them closely.

- 21. Please provide advanced math homework/ worksheet for the kids who need more challenge
- 22. As a Ray school parent happy to cover instrument rentals, teacher gifts and classroom social events. It seems that the costs increase at the high school level and a donation based, opt-in fund makes sense for students that would benefit and could use additional resources
- 23. My perspective is a bit limited, since my oldest child is in 2nd grade, but my impression is that the Hanover/Dresden schools are excellent. I don't see additional tutoring as necessary given the quality of education and student-teacher ratios. That additional tutoring is perceived as necessary by some families likely has to do with a misguided notion that a perfect GPA is necessary for admission to college and success in life. If families want to pay for that, that is fine, but there shouldn't be an expectation that taxpayers fund tutoring and instruction beyond what the schools offer. Also, in a highly educated community, parents should be able to provide some tutoring themselves.
