VISION 2027 for ESSER Funds

All students will read on grade level by fifth grade.

ESSER III TIMELINE

Summer 2021

Surveys, engagement sessions, town hall meetings, email, phone calls gathered information on priorities from various school communities.

Fall 2021

Process established to receive proposals from community-based organizations due to high interest from CBOs.

Winter 2021-22

Grade-level reading vision established with supporting pillars to focus planning and implementation for spending.

Winter 2022

Schools were allocated ESSER planning funds based on number and percentage of students currently reading below grade level.



School-level stakeholder engagement processes identified services needed for students and allowed schools to explore partnerships with community based organizations.

Spring 2022

District staff looked at centralized services, programs, and personnel needed to meet the vision and supporting pillars, as well as other expenditures needed for COVID recovery.

By Spring of 2027, All students will read on grade level by 5th grade.

Why Reading?

It's a matter of realizing untapped potential

If we can help children to reach their potential to read well, we will also positively impact math, science, social studies, and other areas necessary for their long-term success.

Currently, half of CCSD's elementary students are reading at or above their grade level.

One-fourth are "approaching" grade level and one-fourth are well below grade level.

Reading proficiency has long-term consequences

Ensuring that all students read on grade level can start a lifelong change in earning potential and quality of life for the students of CCSD and their future families.

For children of color and children in poverty, the percentage reading below grade level is one-and-a-half times the CCSD average.

Reading impacts on-time graduation rate

Students who leave elementary school reading on grade level are 4 times more likely to graduate on-time from high school than students who are below grade level.

3 Phases of ESSER Funding

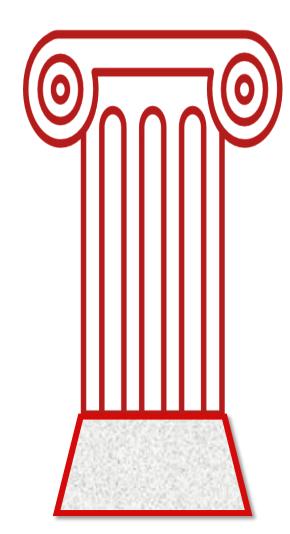

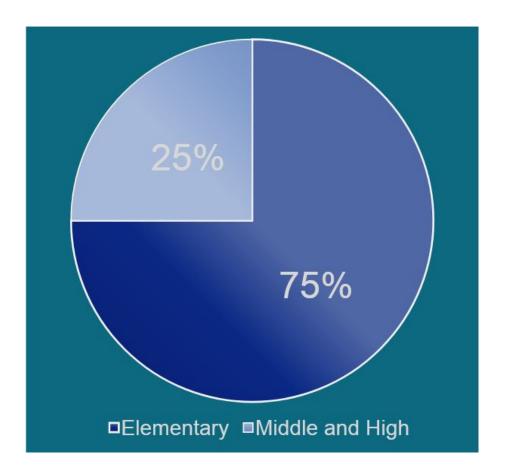
ESSER III Update School Based Allocations



ESSER Allocation Model for School Funding

- School allocations are based on the number and percentage of students reading below grade level on the most recent SC READY Reading (Spring 2021).
- ♦ 75% of total funds will go to grades K-5.
- ▶ 75% of funds will be spent in schools with more than half their students reading below grade level.

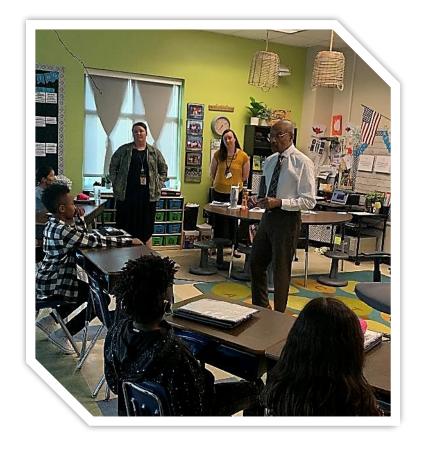
