In another year of firsts, we joyfully watched our students not only believe and become, but achieve beyond measure. "I am very proud to be Hispanic and Puerto Rican," says Alaisha. "I love my culture and learning about it as I grew up." Adds Carolina, "I am proud that someone like me had the chance to achieve so much at DPCR. I never thought I could make it this far and now know my culture and language are not a disadvantage."

Their families, particularly their moms, have been their biggest cheerleaders. "When my mom found out that I'm valedictorian, it was the first time I've ever seen her cry. She knew all my hard work has meant something," says Alaisha. "My mom always believed in my education. She told me to work hard because nothing would be handed to me. She's really proud of me and told me to remember this day and always have confidence in yourself," says Carolina.

Alaisha will attend **Berea College** on a full scholarship majoring in biology and elementary education to pursue her dream of becoming a medical geneticist. Carolina has earned

a full scholarship to the **University of Notre Dame** where she will major in pre-health with a goal of entering the field of pediatric dentistry.

"We have overcome barriers due to our gender and ethnicity so I hope other Hispanic families can see their children in us and think, if these two can do it, so can my daughter or son," says Carolina. Adds Alaisha, "When I first saw my valedictorian medal, I cried. It hit me how far I've come. I didn't speak English when I started grade school and I was told I was stupid and would always be last. Now I say, don't let someone put you in a box. Even though I am the first Hispanic valedictorian, I hope I am not the last."

Class of 2024 Full of Firsts!

When the Class of 2024 started at DPCR, the campus was still closed due to the pandemic. They spent most of their freshman year learning virtually. Despite that challenging start, they finished strong!

- They are the earliest class to achieve 100 percent college acceptance.
- They completed 895 college applications.
- Nine seniors received full tuition scholarships.
- They helped create DPCR's first documentary film, "The Comeback."
- They helped form DPCR's first St. Vincent de Paul Service Conference.
- Five will be among those taking DPCR's first school-sponsored international trip to Tanzania in July.



The Rey of Light Scholarship Benefit for Students, held April 27 at DPCR, raised the most funds in the event's history. Sponsorships, silent and live auction bidding, raffles, and a paddle raise for tuition assistance all combined to raise over \$825,000 for financial aid for DPCR students.

Chairs Lisa and Chuck Ciccia and Tammy and Tony Silvestri led a dedicated committee of volunteers to plan the sold-out event. One of the highlights of the night was the Fund-A-Need paddle raise which directly raised over \$400,000 for tuition assistance. A video created by students in DPCR's Film Program helped to inspire the bidders.

"Investing in their future is investing in our future." Ohio Bureau of Workers' Compensation Recognized for Partnership

CWSP Partner Profile

The seven-year partnership between DPCR's Corporate Work Study Program and the Ohio Bureau of Workers' Compensation (BWC) has benefited dozens of students in three cities as well as the government agency, and earned the BWC national recognition from the Cristo Rev Network.

BWC Chief of Claims Services Scott McFadden says the partnership works because they don't treat the students as students. "We onboard the student associates as we do all new employees and set a tone from the start that they are part of our team."

In turn, that has had a positive impact on BWC employees, says Ken Brown, Cincinnati Claims Director. "The students bring positive energy to our office and have been a morale boost for our staff. Supervising the students has enhanced our staff's leadership development."

The success of the program in Cincinnati has led to BWC partnerships with the Cristo Rev schools in Columbus and Cleveland. "This program has helped our leadership consider how to prepare for the next generation of workers," says Scott. "We view the students as potential future employees and investing in their future is investing in our future."

At the Cincinnati area office students work on data entry, scanning, mailings, and other typical office tasks. Additionally, staff take the time to learn about the students' interests and future career goals and connect them with other departments for job shadowing and related projects. Preston '25 is exploring journalism and was given the opportunity to work on newsletter articles. Christian '25 shared his interest in film and worked on a Christmas video.

"There's so much more to our organization than claims," says Scott. "Students are exposed to all of the opportunities within the BWC including IT, law enforcement, medical, and communications."

DPCR Relationship Manager Katie Spiece facilitates the DPCR-BWC partnership. "At the BWC they make the students feel part of their community right away. They go above and beyond to mentor and care about the students. They become the students' cheerleaders for life!"

The BWC was honored as a DPCR Partner of the Year in February and as one of seven National Impact Award recipients by the Cristo Rey Network in April. "This award affirms that we're doing something right and making a difference," says Ken. "Working with DPCR students, our staff feel like they are contributing to the greater good."

Two of DePaul Cristo Rey's Corporate Partners are among a select group of employers to receive the Cristo Rey Network's inaugural National Impact Award for their contributions to education and workforce development, and for making a positive impact on student lives. Expeditors and the Ohio Bureau of Workers' Compensation (BWC) both employ Cristo Rey students in multiple cities with Cristo Rey schools. They were recognized among seven national honorees at the Cristo Rey Network Annual Meeting in Dallas in April.

Expeditors is a global trade company partnering for more than 10 years with schools in 14 cities. DPCR students work at the Expeditors location in Hebron, Kentucky. The BWC hosts student work teams in Cincinnati. Cleveland and Columbus.

Growing Film Program Unlocks Students' Creativity

In just two years, DePaul Cristo Rey's film program has grown to offer students experiences and opportunities they can't find at any other local high school. With support from a generous benefactor, teacher Romayne Jones started the film program in the 2023-24 school year and continues to push it and her students to new heights.

In the program's first year, students focused on creating the multi-part docuseries, "The Comeback," that had a red-carpet premiere at DPCR last May. This year Romayne continued teaching the Film 1 class and added a more advanced Film 2 class as well as a Film Club for students who aren't enrolled in the classes. Olivia '26 enrolled in Film 1 to meet her fine arts credit requirement. "I heard it was a cool class with a lot of independent work. It has been way beyond my expectations," she explains. "I've learned to work with others to create a story that evokes emotion and how to use a video to make a statement."

Last year, Romayne taught in a typical DPCR classroom. This year two classrooms were converted into an actual film studio with state-of-the art virtual reality capabilities allowing students to create endless scenes without leaving campus. Romayne believes DPCR is the only local high school with this level of professional film facilities. The focus this year in classes and the film club was on creating short films. Students entered work in local, national and international film festivals. In May, student short films premiered at the inaugural Canvas & Reels Festival. That event was the culmination of a busy spring for film students. They created a video shown at Rey of Light and 22 of them took a trip to Florida to attend the Florida Film Festival and take a behind-the-scenes tour of Universal Studios.

"This program is a game-changer for students in the Cincinnati area," says Romayne. "Moving forward I envision adding a project-based Film 3 course in which students learn to create portfolios of their work to market themselves to future colleges and employers. I'd also love to see our students working on video projects for their corporate partners."



CANVAS & REELS FESTIVAL

Transforms Campus and Students

DPCR's campus was transformed into a living canvas of art and film at the inaugural Canvas & Reels Festival in May. More than 300 guests enjoyed a gallery walk and silent auction of 75 works of art and fashion, as well as demonstrations and opportunities to paint, make jewelry, and experiment with virtual reality technology. Guests viewed 25 short films created by DPCR and other local high school students. Guest judges from the local art, music and film communities reviewed all of the works and awarded prizes in both art and film categories.

Catching Up with DPCR's First Valedictorian

Alumni Profile

It's been 10 years since Ruvarashe Chimusoro '15 stood on the Mount St. Joseph University stage as DPCR's first valedictorian, and to honor that milestone, she was asked to return as this year's commencement speaker. "I felt honored to be asked to speak at graduation and to help these new graduates understand and fully grasp the impact DPCR has had on them," says Ruva. "It's not a temporary relationship finished in four years; the ties to the DPCR family are deep."

Ruva first grasped the importance of her DPCR ties as she navigated her freshman year at Franklin & Marshall College in Pennsylvania. "Every day my freshman year I called Mrs. Jackie Siders (school secretary) after chemistry class. It was so hard and sometimes I was crying, but she always told me I could do it." She later transferred to the University of Cincinnati where she received her bachelor's degree in economics in December 2019. Over the next months during the pandemic, she worked several part-time and entrepreneurial positions before joining Dell Technologies. That led her to transfer to Austin, Texas, in 2021. She now works as a Microsoft Education Program Manager and Business Development Manager for SHI International, another tech company in Austin.

While she doesn't remember much about her first commencement speech, she does have fond memories of being in DPCR's first class. "I remember the talent shows at Christmas and the snacks Miss Jackie used to keep in her desk for us students," she recalls. She also has a strong recollection of what she learned through the Corporate Work Study Program. "Our CWSP jobs exposed us to many different careers and opportunities, teaching us time management and self-advocacy."





Ruva says there are three ways she believes DPCR most impacted her. "I learned personal responsibility, self-advocacy and the importance of picking your community and surrounding yourself with the right people. We represented DPCR and ourselves when we went to work and that's a lot of ownership for a high school student," she says.

She is a student again herself, pursuing a master's degree in information science at Texas A&M University. "The workload is challenging while working full-time, but I hope to move from sales into a more technical role at my company. I am really only three years into my career and recognize I have so much to learn!"

Sophomore Wins **Coveted Bruin Award**

Track & Field Runs into the Record Books

Members of DPCR's track & field team broke multiple school records, won the Cincinnati Metro Athletic Conference (CMAC) Championship, and went all of the way to the regional finals. DPCR records were set in girls' long jump, high jump, and shot put; 100, 200, 800, *and 1600 meters; 4x100 relay, and 4x200* relay. Records were set in the boys shot put and discus; 100, 200, 400, and 800 meters. The girls CMAC Championship *is the first track* & *field conference title in* school history! At the regional competition, the girls 4x100 relay team finished 7th out of 73 teams, setting a new school record with their time.

35 Students Inducted into National Honor Society

In May, 35 students were inducted into the DPCR Chapter of the National Honor Society, the nation's premier organization that recognizes outstanding high school students. They were selected after an application and review process requiring them to demonstrate their excellence in the areas of scholarship, service, leadership and character.
