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


In closing, I just want to reflect on Brookstone's mission:

EXCERPTS FROM FACULTY BACCALAUREATE SPEAKER HUNTER CHAPMAN

When I think about you seniors sitting here before me, I think back to my first impressions of y'all when you came to the Middle School in sixth grade. Quirky. Odd. Funny. Goofy. ...you remember! Just think back to those days for a second...the glory days, am I right? None of the teachers in the Middle School quite knew how to accurately describe your grade, but we could all agree that this was a special group. A unique group.

When I think back to how we viewed y'all then, one word rises to the top: childlike.

I'm talking about childlikeness—the most positive traits of a small child continuously ...throughout every stage of your life. So what I want to do this morning is affirm right now what I see in you as a grade and as individuals and challenge you to grow in that more and more as you get older. And that trait is childlikeness.

There was a kind of freedom about you, a joy, a laughter, a willingness to engage and joke with teachers, a hunger for something bigger, and a willingness to soak up the journey together. When y'all moved to the Upper School, I moved with you! I loved you that much! I remember welcoming lots of new faces to your class and going on the freshman retreat with you. Laughter. Adventure. I could go on with more and more stories...the point is that y'all have really impressed me and so many others, not just with a general trend of growth over the past few years but with how you have been able to grow and mature in a way that the childlike spirit within you has actually blossomed more this year than ever rather than fading away.

And so, as I encourage you and challenge you to grow in childlikeness, I just want to pause and highlight the beautiful traits that fall under that umbrella that you already possess. These traits are in you, so I'm not encouraging you to strive for something you have not yet attained, rather grow in something you already possess.

It is a true honor to be in front of you today. Today is quite a BIG day. I feel especially fortunate to be speaking in front of your class in particular. I am not sure that faculty and administration are allowed to have favorites, but I have heard several speak of your class as special. I have had the privilege to observe this myself on many occasions. I am so very thankful to many of you who have volunteered as childcare helpers in our YoungLives teen mom meetings. I also hear many stories from my preschool daughter, Anna, about her seniors who come to visit her classroom and bring treats, as well as stories from Witt about his senior buddies who visit his 4th-grade class. And I have gotten to know many of you who serve as Wyldlife leaders to our Middle School students here at Brookstone, my 7th-grade son included. And as a parent, I can think of very few people I am more thankful for than students like you who are willing to give up a latestart Wednesday morning of sleep to come and model a truly special type of leadership to George and his Middle School friends. So I wholeheartedly agree - you are special.

Many times at Graduation and Baccalaureate and things like this, we want to talk about the next goal post ahead. We want to focus on the horizon and tell ourselves bits of encouragement about the fact that we are prepared for what lies ahead. And I don't want to spend a whole lot of time on that, because you ARE ready. This school is a most excellent place to come and be prepared for that next step. He would be so proud of Brookstone and how the principle of servant leadership has become a cornerstone in the identity of our school. I had the privilege of watching my grandfather live out his servant leadership, and it was the greatest gift to witness that the source of fullness and richness in his life was from lifting others up. The gift of the Brookstone experience is learning this truth: that the goal of servant leadership is to build a place where everyone is loved, a caring community; reaching that goal in our communities is what really leads to our own fulfillment. 



Brookstone is committed to the social, emotional, and physical wellbeing of students and faculty. With dedicated counselors working directly with students in all divisions and a full-time nurse serving the school, the overall wellness of the school community is a primary focus. Each year, the school hosts a number of cuttingedge speakers to inform, engage, and inspire the school community.

This year, the Counseling Department has provided many programs for parents, students, and faculty to learn, strategize, and develop a sense of shared community. Speakers for the 2022-2023 school year focused on issues important to all families including digital safety, suicide, child-trafficking, student anxiety, and chemical dependency.

SIGNS OF SUICIDE

In September, Brookstone partnered with Mindwise Innovations, using their program called SOS Signs of Suicide to talk with students and parents about this difficult topic and encourage them to seek help when necessary. SOS has been used by thousands of schools for over 20 years. Studies have shown that it effectively teaches students about depression and suicide while reducing the number of students' self-reported suicide attempts.

SOCIAL MEDIA RESPONSIBILITY

Richard Guerry, founder of the Institute for Responsible Online and Cell-Phone Communication (IROC2) and author of Public & Permanent, was on campus Thursday, November 3, to speak with students and parents. Mr. Guerry discussed with Middle and Upper School students the importance of a mindset that digital actions are public and permanent. Parents learned more about how to support their children in dealing with social media responsibility during the parent session.

FACING ADDICTION AND MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES WITH HOPE

David Magee, author of the bestselling memoir Dear William, spoke on November 7 to Middle and Upper School students, faculty, and parents about the importance and impact of mental wellness. Students, and therefore families, face an unprecedented mental health crisis resulting in anxiety, depression, substance misuse, eating disorders, and suicide ideation. David Magee delivered a powerful, inspiring message outlining both the problems and solutions.

CHILD TRAFFICKING

Brookstone hosted Noel Thomas, co-founder of Zero Trafficking, to speak with parents and Upper School students on Thursday, January 12. Noel shared information around human trafficking and exploitation while giving a framework for how to stay safe both online and in the real world.

UNDERSTANDING ANXIETY

The Learning Center invited Dr. Scott Hamilton to visit Brookstone School on Wednesday, January 18, for a discussion with faculty and parents on the impact of anxiety in the classroom, on the field, and in relationships. Dr. Hamilton is a licensed clinical psychologist and founder of Understanding Minds, PC in Atlanta. He has over 20 years of specialization comprehensive neuropsychological evaluations of children, adolescents, and young adults. Scott received his master's and doctorate degrees in clinical psychology from Indiana State University. He is board certified by the American Board of School Neuropsychology. Scott is a frequent presenter at regional and national workshops on a variety of topics related to the interface between education and neuroscience.

SUBSTANCE MISUSE PREVENTION

On Thursday, February 2, Brookstone hosted prevention specialists from Prevention Solutions for a parent round-table. The program with Prevention Solutions within the Hazelden Betty Ford Foundation provided an opportunity for parents to learn more effective ways to communicate with their children about alcohol and other drug-related issues.


INNOVATIVE PROCESS

INVITING STUDENTS TO INNOVATE ONE STEP AT A TIME

If you had a chance to read the previous Brookstone magazine, you may have come across a piece entitled, "A Faculty Focus on Cultivating Culture, Collaboration, and Curiosity." When that article was written, the Lower School teachers were immersed in a book study of "I'm The Kind of Kid Who...": Invitations that Support Learner Identity and Agency by Debbie Miller and Emily Callahan. This book introduces the idea of an "invitation to learn" and provides a simple framework for allowing choice and engagement among students in classrooms. One of the author's essential suggestions is to allow students some autonomy in determining what they learn, how they learn it, and the materials they need to support their learning; all done within the parameters of the curriculum, of course, and with the teacher as facilitator instead of leader. So our teachers gave it the old college try!

Releasing complete control and autonomy to students can be a daunting task for teachers. Teachers are trained to think about safety first which means putting rules and procedures in place that establish a warm and respectful classroom environment, while also creating the optimal conditions for all students to learn at their best. Allowing fifteen students with fifteen different ideas and fifteen ways of expressing





their ideas may, in fact, be antithetical to a well-managed learning environment. Regardless, the teachers were open to exploring the nuances of "invitations" and how it would enhance and deepen student learning.

Many realized that they were already doing part of the invitation protocol and just needed to loosen the reins and trust that students could guide their own learning. Others welcomed the chance to try to incorporate invitations into a lesson or two, just to see what might happen. Ultimately, the teachers dove right in, followed the framework, and trusted the process. They were able to learn so much about their students and even more about the power of choice and engagement.

Professional learning is a continuous part of our growth as educators. While we are inviting our students to innovate, we are also reflecting and building upon our own capacity as learners. The process is not always methodical or predictable for either students or teachers. As a matter of fact, learning is best for both when there are questions to explore, puzzles to solve, and solutions to determine. It can be messy and disorganized yet lead to harmonious findings. Here's a snapshot of what it looks like when teachers invite students to innovate:



SECOND GRADE

The second grade teachers invited their students to explore famous African Americans from our nation's history and/or important events. Students then had the option to work independently or in partnerships. They chose a way to show their learning with many choosing to speak, to perform, or to create an artistic rendition of the person or event. Because this was student driven, the only teacher directions given were to show everyone what they learned and how they learned it.



5TH GRADE SCIENCE

Without going through the formal invitation process, Mr. Cowser led his fifth graders through a unit on electricity. When Upper School student, Ava Chang, inquired about Intermediate School students helping her to brighten the lives of senior citizens by writing letters, Mr. Cowser's fifth grade students used the skills they learned while studying electricity to create greeting cards with messages that lit up when a button was pressed. This lesson was a double



blessing; our students learned about conduits of electricity, and the senior citizens at Love For Our Elders and Color A Smile received some really electrically innovative greeting card messages!

LOWER SCHOOL PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Physical education is not just traditional sports this year! Lower and Intermediate School PE teachers introduced a new unit that focused on line dancing. Through an exploration of various traditional and contemporary line dances, students were invited to form groups and create a dance using the skills that had been taught. This process allowed students to collaborate, innovate, and present their dance moves to their classmates showing that students as leaders of their own learning is full of fun and creativity!

As they make their journeys to college in the fall, they carry with them the confidence, poise, and communication skills acquired through stage performance and production. Avery Ellis says, "Theatre has allowed me to feel comfortable and confident in all aspects of my life." And Hailey Todt is sure that theatre has created within her a "passion" that she will be able to summon and "apply for the rest of [her] life."

While these young performers speak of the intrapersonal effects of theatre, many speak of the interpersonal skills garnered through theatre participation. Charity McWilliams says that theatre has helped her "cultivate friendships." Certainly the focus on empathy and ensemble fostered by theatre arts education will be a continuous benefit to these graduates.

While confidence, connectedness. communication skills might be foremost in their minds, these seniors will soon notice that working in the theatre has provided them access to fields of study and interest that will open doors for them on college campuses and later in the workforce. For performers, theatre at Brookstone is literature, history, psychology, political science, and physical education. Our technicians utilize and apply the whole realm of mathematics, as well as digital technologies, chemistry, economics, engineering, and an array of the visual arts. Brookstone's Technical Theatre Director Robby Davis says, "A wise school administrator once told me that if a school was forced to keep only one curriculum, it should be theatre because theatre involves all the other curricula."

There is ample empirical evidence that links theatre arts experience with academic self-efficacy and engagement, self-esteem, and empathy with others. At Brookstone, we see these skills in our theatre graduates, who, like theatre students around the world, will reap life-long academic and career benefits from their participation in the performing arts.



In April, the Arts Alliance and the Theatre Arts Program produced Brookstone's first dinner theatre show, an audience-participation murder mystery called *Win, Lose, or DIE!* The production, along with a catered dinner, was staged among the dazzling artwork of the Bo Bartlett Center at Columbus State University's uptown Riverside Campus. The show served as the finale to the annual Spring Arts Festival week at Brookstone.

The cast, featuring Brookstone faculty and students, treated the audience to an episode of a fictional game show, *Lyrical Pursuit*, and three lucky audience members were selected to be contestants for the wild and wacky, on-stage competition that asked them to sing the lyrics of popular songs. During the game show—as expected—a mysterious homicide occurred. After which, the audience, working in teams, raced to consider clues, interrogate suspects, and correctly identify the killer and the motive.

WHAT ARE YOU CURRENTLY DOING (POST-GRADUATION CAREER OR IN YOUR CURRENT FIELD OF STUDY)?


I am currently working as a digital reporter for CBS Sports/247Sports covering LSU sports as well as a play-by-play broadcaster on multiple ESPN platforms.

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




What is your favorite animal?

Will the school stay the same as it has been?




