As you read your non-fiction book:

- Complete the attached "Summer Reading Assignment for Non-Fiction Book" handout AND
- Complete the attached "Summer Reading Assignment for Non-Fiction Book Vocabulary Portion" handout

When you return to school in September, you will hand in all <u>four</u> completed assignments to your Honors English teacher.

This is a mandatory assignment; you must read one fiction and one non-fiction book and be prepared to discuss and write about both when you return to school in September.
