Thanks to your gifts of \$100,000 to the Tam High Foundation, the Library underwent an Extreme Makeover during the summer months. Students who had a sneak preview of the new facility had this to say: "This is a way cool library now!"; "Awesome!"; "Wow!"; "This is really nice!"; "It's crazy!"; and "It's beautiful!"

You won't recognize the place! The back room was carpeted for a quiet study space. New couches and reading chairs were purchased as were new computer workstations and laptops. Students can now quickly find anything they need on the new catalog—only computer terminals.

The facility isn't the only thing that was upgraded. New reference books in the sciences, geography, history and more were purchased, as was new current fiction. Students can now find relevant material conveniently at school, without needing to go to the public library.

To make the library more accessible for students, library hours have been extended from 7:30 am to 7 pm Monday-Thursday, and 7:30 am to 4 pm Friday. Now students can fill those wasted hours between school and sports with productive study time, or have a place to meet with a group after school or ask the after-school library aide for assistance.

Communication

Parents/guardians are encouraged to communicate with teachers and school staff to get information or discuss concerns about students. Our school website is a great source of current information with links to teacher or program websites. While e-mail is a good tool for asking questions, sharing information, or setting up appointments, it is not very effective for discussing concerns or expressing emotion. Phone conversations or meetings are more effective modes of communication when addressing issues. Staff have both e-mail and voice mail accounts with both expected to be checked daily. Staff is requested to respond to parent inquiries within 48 hours.

Extended Library Hours

Thanks to a grant from the Tam High Foundation, our library will be open until 7 pm Monday-Thursday throughout the school year.

Tam Centennial

The 2007-08 school year will be Tam's 100th. We are forming a committee of 6-8 people to organize events to commemorate this milestone throughout the 07-08 school year. Modernization

Keyser Hall was demolished over the summer. The new Keyser buildings will start to be built in spring 2007. The two new buildings will house 22 classrooms and other support functions. A path of travel will be provided between the two buildings as well as a new student plaza.

The Caldwell Performing Arts Center is nearing completion. We are starting to move into the building with complete occupation by mid-September. The kitchen in the student center will also be finished by early September. The ADA-required elevator from the front of school up to the upper campus has been in discussion and study for several months with an ad hoc committee. After options such as a funicular were explored and found to be not feasible, a likely location for the elevator has been identified along the covered walkway adjacent to the pool area. •

Where to Park (or Not) on Campus

Parking on campus is limited for visitors and students. The front lot (off Miller Ave.) is reserved for staff and visitors only. Staff are assigned numbered spots, and visitors may park in spots marked "visitor." Student drivers may park in the back lot off Almonte Ave. on a first-come, first-served basis, as long as an approved 2006-07 permit is displayed in the vehicle. Carpool spots will be reserved for vehicles carrying three or more passengers, but are also limited on a first-come, first-served basis. Additional parking is available in the football field lot and off campus. Tam High is not responsible for parking tickets issued to those who park illegally, and Tam is not required or equipped to provide parking for all student drivers.

To obtain a student parking permit/decal: Fill out a parking permit request form (available in Room 105 or on-line at tamhigh.org>Site Map>parking & transportation) and return the completed form to the Assistant Principals' office, Room 105, Wood Hall. •

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Modernization Update

2001 Bond Projects:

Caldwell Fine Arts Theater

There has been a series of unforeseen delays in the completion of this new building. The first performance in the theater will be held in mid-October.

Cafeteria

The kitchen has not yet been approved by the County and the District is waiting for the arrival of new equipment. Students will be served from the temporary kitchen located behind the pool until the kitchen reopens in mid-September.

Phoenix Hall

The alterations for the Art Department are currently in the office of the Department of the State Architect for review. The estimated occupancy schedule is during the December break.

2006 Bond Projects:

Keyser Hall

The 1920 structure was demolished during the Summer and the site is currently fenced and ready for construction in Spring 2007. The design of the replacement building is in the design development phase. At the August 21 Board meeting, WLC-Architects presented a contemporary design solution for the Student Center (back) side of the building. The design completion remains December 2006.

Pool & Fitness

During the summer, Superintendent Bob Ferguson held two meetings with the high school communities to get feedback on the size, type and usage of the pools at the three primary campuses. The architects have met with the Tam coaches, teachers and Site administration to discuss their athletic program needs. A location for the pool has not yet been decided upon.

Exterior Elevator

On August 15, Superintendent Ferguson met with the Site Committee and City representatives to discuss how the District will comply with DSA's requirement to provide accessibility to the campus. After researching options and meeting with DSA officials, the District has determined that the only viable option that meets State codes is the use of an elevator. The Superintendent proposed locating an elevator tower/bridge structure across from the new Keyser Hall site. The bridge would connect to a path of travel that runs the length of the Campus at the 25-feet elevation. The District has requested architectural concepts for the Site Committee to review. This proposal will require final approval by DSA.

Tamalpais High School Emergency Phone Team 2006-2007

What is it?

The Reverse Phone Tree is to be used by parents should a significant emergency occur which affects the school operation. In a major emergency it is conceivable that the phone system will be unable to respond to the hundreds of incoming phone calls from parents and loved ones seeking accurate information on the status of Tam High students and staff.

When and how will it be used?

The Reverse Phone Tree system will be implemented should the school face an emergency which would preclude the school's ability to receive incoming calls. The parents listed on the phone tree will receive a call from a site administrator who will provide a status report on the school along with other important information. As a parent it is your job to call the appropriate person on the phone tree who will pass along information provided by the administration on the status of the school, staff, and students.

"TOP TEN" LIST OF THINGS YOU CAN DO ABOUT TRAFFIC & SAFETY AT TAM HIGH

WITH MORE STUDENTS THAN EVER AT TAM, and another year of heavy construction, PTSA leaders asked the Traffic & Safety Committee to suggest some things parents and students can do to improve traffic and safety and help avoid serious accidents. While we all agreed that completing Keyser and creating a safe drop off and pick up zone on campus were the two items most needed at Tam High, we met with staff and public safety officials before school started and walked and drove the campus. Here's their "Top Ten" list for this year:

- 1. Encourage your student(s) to walk, bike, carpool or take the bus to school. Walking is a great exercise, there are lots of bike racks here at Tam (don't forget your lock), there's probably a good carpool already in your neighborhood, and students can take the bus anywhere in the County for only \$1.00 per ride. For local bus schedules, call MCTD: 499-6099 (www.marintransit.org)
- 2. Try out a new meeting location away from the school if you have to drive, where you can pick up or drop off your student(s) safely and he/she/they can walk, bike or take the bus the rest of the way. Set a specific time and place to meet each day, (cell-phones get lost, confiscated or turned off) and a back up plan just in case.
- 3. Avoid the traffic crunch before and after school, for about 15-30 minutes before and after the final bell. Students who leave earlier, or later, can visit the library, do homework, meet with teachers or peers, participate in school sports or clubs, or attend before or after school tutoring programs. These have other benefits as well.
- 4. Be prepared before you arrive so that you can drop off or pick up your student speedily and without incident. This is NOT the time or the place to switch drivers, fumble for lunch money, have a long and involved conversation with your teenager about curfews, or search for lost articles in the trunk or back seat. If you need more time, have a lot of stuff, or have to get out of your car, pull into a legal parking spot or one of the school parking lots.
- 5. Pull forward and leave room for other cars in front and behind you, if you must use the congested yellow zone in front of the school to drop off or pick up students. This is a loading zone only, do NOT park here, or leave your vehicle unattended. When leaving, signal and merge back into traffic carefully, watching out for pedestrians, bikes and skateboards. (Check your manual: the signal indicator is to the left of the steering wheel.)

- 6. If you can't be safe, keep driving past the school to the staff parking lot or further past the sports fields to Almonte. If you're coming west on Camino Alto, MVPD recommends taking wide, slow turn from the RIGHT HAND lane so you can see if there's an empty space and pull in to the marked yellow zone safely without blocking the intersection or impeding southbound traffic. If the back parking lot entrance is blocked (the gateway is narrow), drop off your student at the sports lot instead.
- 7. Slow down and obey posted signs near the school or when using the front or back school parking lots. Unless you or your student is disabled (and you have a blue tag on your car), don't try to drop off any one, ever, in the tiny lot off Gomez or at the maintenance driveway near Meade Theatre. And remember: there is a NO left turn sign out of the staff parking lot onto Miller.
- 8. Don't park in private lots, spaces or driveways. Despite what your student may have heard, you may not park or leave your car in numbered spots in the staff lot, in any area labeled "no parking" or "handicapped only", or in the Safeway parking lot on Miller Avenue. If you park on the street, you need to find a legal parking spot which leaves driveways, hydrants, pedestrian paths and crosswalks clear. If you're not sure, check with a police officer, campus supervisor or the front office.
- 9. Model good and safe driving behavior. It sets a good example for our students and will save you money and/or time in traffic school. Mill Valley Police and Marin County Sheriff will ticket for speeding, stopping or parking violations, illegal turns, and impeding traffic. People who jaywalk across Miller or cross against the light will be fined. Those who disobey laws, flip off other drivers or shout epithets that can't be published in Whole Tam Family, will be warned and reported.
- 10. Support monthly traffic safety days at Tam High, held the first Wednesdays every month. Volunteers meet in front of the school at 7:30-8 am to hand out cookies and raffle tickets (free Jamba Juice and Safeway gift card prizes), and do traffic and pedestrian counts. Come and try it, it helps the school and it's a lot of fun.

DOES YOUR STUDENT HAVE LEARNING CHALLENGES that are causing difficulties in school? Do you have questions about his or her IEP (Individualized Education Plan) or 504 plan, or do you need to know more about such plans and how to make them more effective? If the answer to any of these questions is "yes," you can find help at Parent-to-Parent Connection ("p2p"), a Tam District support group for parents of high school students with learning challenges. Our parent meetings offer information from dynamic speakers on a wide variety of topics, and we open each meeting an hour before the program to allow for informal discussion and networking with other parents.

As Tam High's representative, I meet will meet monthly with TUHSD administrators Karen Mates and Carol Eber in order to plan p2p programs and also to voice your questions and concerns about how well the district is serving student needs. New Coaches Lead Tam's Fall Rosters

awks athletic teams are starting the school year with a slate of new coaches.

Tam's boys' varsity soccer team will shoot for a repeat of last year's Marin County Athletic League (MCAL) championship with the addition of new head coach Glenn Goodman, who headed Marin Catholic's soccer team the past two seasons. A large group of kids have tried out for the soccer program, which also includes a junior varsity team.

Tam's football team is betting its turnaround hopes on new head coach Greg Lauchenauer, last year's defensive coordinator. Last year, Tam's varsity lost all of its games, mostly by wide margins. The past couple of years, the school fielded only varsity and freshmen teams because of limited student interest.

But the popularity of the sport at Tam may be on the rise. As of Aug. 21, 60 kids have tried out, the biggest group in several years. Thanks to the large turnout, a JV team is also in the works, according to athletic director Gene Ng, who expects to see Tam compete in closer games.

The season's first game will be September 9 at home against St. Patrick's of Vallejo. The real challenge begins with the regular season start September 23 against Marin Catholic followed by a game against Novato - likely the league's two toughest teams.

Girls' tennis also features a new head coach in Bill Washauer, who is the parent of a student and last year's assistant coach. A large group of returning players and some good incoming freshmen should hopefully boost the team above last year's sixth place finish in league play.

The girls' golf team has brought on Dustin Nygaard, a new physical education teacher at the school, as its new head coach. A large group of new players should strengthen the program. Cross country will attempt to continue its winning ways under the coach-

ing of Sylvia Goodman and Bob Friedlander. Tam's boys won the MCAL championship the last two years and have a good shot at a repeat this season. The girls' team should improve on its third place finish with several top runners returning.

The boys' and girls' water polo teams return following respectable third place finishes and playoff appearances last season. The girls' team has many returning players and should be competitive against top teams Drake and Marin Catholic.

All students who entered the summer internship program also participated in a ROP workplace learning class in order to enhance their experience as well as to receive school credit for their work. After visiting with students at their internship work sites and seeing them interact in their classes, I found that students were able to learn information about their career fields of interest, were able to meet their learning goals through their internship experience, and also enjoyed the opportunity of working with professionals in the community. Many students found further excitement and motivation to move forward in pursuing their career field of interest, while some students realized that they do not wish to pursue the career they explored in their internship. Sixteen Tam students participated in the summer internship program and were placed in various internships throughout the bay area including Marin General Hospital, Marin Services for Women, Canal Alliance, Inner Balance, Artisans Art Gallery, Intel, Trinecom, Weir/Andrewson Assoc., Travel Adventures into Art, and the Marin City Golden Gate Village Resident Council.

Fall Internship Deadline—September 15

Applications are now available for fall student internships. Fall internships begin on October 2 and continue through November 30. Students will have the opportunity to work with a professional in a

career field of their choice for a minimum of six hours per week for an eight week period. Students may obtain an application for fall internships in the College and Career Center. Many new and exciting internships are now available for this academic year.

2006-07 Season for Tam Drama Offers Much to Celebrate

new school year brings with it much anticipation and excitement as former students return and new students begin their time at TAM high school. Conservatory Theatre Ensemble (CTE), TAM's student theatre company, usually begins with a flurry of activity as students sign up for shows, crews, production teams and intern positions. Third year students prepare to assimilate as student company leaders while seniors decide what their priorities are for their last year of running CTE. The new season is announced to the community as our prospective audiences see what we have to offer for the upcoming year.

This year we have even more to anticipate and celebrate. Not only have CTE students and staff received recognition for their work with special performances or presentations, but we will move into our new facility in September, offering our audiences a whole new level of experience at the performance level. One big reason to celebrate is our young theatre artists' achievements. At the end of the school year last year, two CTE sophomores, Casey Hanley and Robbie Bruens, were named top finalists for a play they wrote and submitted to the Magic Theatre's Launchpad One Act Play competition. Their play, "The Last Fictional Pigeon", was mounted with professional theatre artists and performed along with the other finalists last June. On the final day, their play was chosen as the best of the Launchpad series. Robbie and Casey received accolades for their play along with great feedback from the panel of writers and an award. This year, as part of the CTE opening Advanced One Act series, their play will be performed at TAM under the direction of guest artist, Wendell Willat (actor/playwright) who

teaches the CTE Playwrighting lab.New plays are a big part of CTE. We have pioneered many original adaptations and new works in our 30-plus year history. Premiering new works by current students, alumni and commissioned playwrights has been a cornerstone of the annual season every year.

In recent years, three documentary play projects were developed with students under the guidance of John Warren, CTE guest artist director. Over the summer John and Susan Brashear (CTE Co-Program Director) were chosen to present this model at the National Educational Theatre Conference in Denver, Colorado. "Theatre as a Mirror: Developing Documentary Plays With High School Students" will be presented in late September. This opportunity will create a national forum for this innovative method of play development that challenges both students and their community to dialogue about current issues based on real-life stories from that community. CTE pioneered works exploring the John Walker-Lindh story, Mill Valley's history of activism, and same-sex marriage in thought-provoking works that also played at our local professional theatre, Marin Theatre Company.

Perhaps the biggest celebration of all will be scheduled in early fall when the new Daniel Caldwell Performing Arts Center will finally be completed. Although CTE is moving incrementally into our office and backstage areas, the performance space and lobby area won't be finished until September 21, "Back To School" night, for a first preview. Watch for the larger "ribbon-cutting" celebration that will be for the wider community sometime later in the fall.

We are looking forward to a great full season in our new space.

We open with an Advanced One Act Festival of plays directed by our guest artists with advanced students acting. This formula is designed to get as many students as possible to perform in the new space right away. Next will be a production of "The Laramie Project", an acclaimed documentary play directed by guest artist John Warren, which explores the impact of Matthew Shepard's death in his home community. Later mainstage productions in the year include "Macbeth", two original shows developed through improvisation, and a movement-based play developed by Sheila Lopez. As we do every year, there will be two one-act festivals that are directed by the advanced students and performed by first and second year students in the CTE program. 
