## **Tam High Modernization Enters the Home Stretch**

great deal of construction activity is currently underway at Tamalpais High School, and one unfortunate result of this is a temporarily unattractive campus. The good news is that the campus should regain its natural charm as each project is completed over the course of the next few months. This construction activity is the culmination of many improvements to the campus, including major upgrades to utility infrastructure, new buildings, landscaping, and improved pedestrian routes. It is challenging to undertake such complicated projects within an operating high school

campus, but every effort has been made to provide a safe learning environment for students and staff during construction; unfortunately, this can result in project delays.

The projects currently in construction represent the completion of work at Tam as defined in the 2006 Modernization Bond. Namely, the pool, elevator, tennis courts, Miller Avenue parking lot, and frontage landscaping are in construction and are all scheduled to be completed in the next several months. Project specifics are listed below.

#### Front Stairs

Although not readily apparent from the Miller Avenue entrance to campus, quite a bit of work was accomplished during the eight week summer break. Building masonry and concrete staircases, walkway paths, and retaining walls in such a short span is a challenge,

but a safe path of travel for students and visitors was completed just in time for the start of school. Efforts were focused on the east lawn stairs to provide access to a more central location on campus from Miller Avenue. With a safe access route to campus established, work will now focus on finishing the historic stairs and "softscape" landscaping at the front of campus. This scope of work is scheduled to be complete by Monday, September 21.

#### Field House

Designed to replace the old field house that is subject to flooding, the new field house has locker rooms for both boys and girls, coaches' offices, a team room between, and separate restroom facilities for public use at athletic events. The project also provides an accessible route from the new parking area to the athletic fields. A great deal of work occurred over the summer on this project so that students were able to start using the facility on Monday, August 24.

#### **New Assistant Principal**

#### **Giant Sequoia Tree**

The giant sequoia tree that dominated the Tam landscape for many decades was removed this summer following a three-year effort to bring it back to life. The sequoia's water source was the same stream that led to black mold growing underneath the old Keyser building. The situation was worsened by construction equipment during the first modernization effort. Jill Templeton and Rick Misuraca were key figures behind the effort to revitalize the tree over the past few years. When the tree was removed it became clear that that the decay was much worse than expected, and that the sequoia began dying earlier than anticipated. The small amount of wood that was salvaged was provided to woodshop teacher Geo Monley for a few projects.

#### **New Bell Schedule**

Tam's bell schedule was modified for the 09-10 school year to increase opportunity for teacher collaboration throughout the school year. Reducing class periods on Monday by five minutes and reducing the passing periods on Mondays from 15 minutes to 10 minutes generated the additional collaboration time. The bell schedule was approved through the usual process whereby teachers, the district instructional council, and the TUHSD Board agreed and voted to approve the modification.

While modernization completion has not been as timely as we ALL wished, I am confident in saying that all projects relating to Tam will be completed by the end of this semester. We are excited to shift school wide attention beyond construction to the core mission of Tam High: student learning. Teachers and administrators have already begun using this additional collaboration time to review the current instructional programs. The additional embedded teacher collaboration time will be invaluable for providing teachers opportunity to plan, collaborate, exchange best teaching practices, reduce the achievement gap, and ensure high expectations for all students. Tam High and the Tam district are committed to providing the best education possible to all students and this time will be used effectively to move our instructional programs forward.

## **Supplemental Instruction and Assessment Calendars Available Online**

Throughout the year the district offers workshops for juniors and seniors preparing for the California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) or direct writing assessment, as well as for students taking computer proficiency challenge exams.

Workshops for the English and math CAHSEE tests will be held on September 21 from 9-11 am (English) and 12:30-2:30 pm (math) at the Carlisle Building adjacent to Redwood High School, Room A.



A computer proficiency workshop will be held on October 6 from 4:30-7:30 pm at Redwood High School, Room 279.

#### Weight Room

Adjacent to Gustafson Gym, the new weight room is now more conveniently accessed from the boys' and girls' locker rooms. It replaces an older modular structure that was beyond economical refurbishment. As with the field house, this structure is now complete and in use.

### Miller Avenue Parking Lot

Work on the parking lot at Miller Avenue was initially slated for only a "seal coat." Due to the poor condition of the existing asphalt, additional work is required for long-term durability. This increase in the scope of work required the development of a temporary parking lot in the area that will be the new tennis courts. Thankfully, all work performed on the temporary lot was within the original scope of work for that project. The Miller Avenue parking lot is expected to

be complete within a month. Once the Miller parking lot is completed, the tennis courts will be surfaced and fenced.

#### **Swimming Pool**

A great deal of foundation and underground work has been accomplished to get the pool project to the current state of completion. With the pool shell now constructed, the pool deck can be placed. When the pool mechanical building is enclosed, pool equipment will be installed. The pool is scheduled to be filled with water on October 7. Commissioning and inspection by the County of Marin health department is expected to take no more than 2 weeks. All efforts are being made to accelerate this work to try to make up some of the delays caused by the additional foundation work that was required after construction began.

#### **Elevator**

The foundation and major retaining structures for the elevator are complete. Work is now focused on erecting the elevator tower structure. This work will begin the first week of September. When complete, the new site elevator will provide an accessible route from the Miller Avenue side of campus.



Welcome back! The new school year is an exciting time for students, parents and staff. As we enter the final phase of construction on our campus, the Tam High Foundation is also embarking on new construction. We are in the process of bringing up a brand new user-friendly website and we will begin an exciting new project to design and upgrade the interior of the Student Center. Our goal for the website is to make it easy to get timely information about the Foundation, easy for you to volunteer and participate in events, and easy to make donations

and purchase tickets for functions online. We will roll out the site this month so check it out! You'll hear more about the Student Center project in the weeks to come.

Many new and returning families at Tam ask questions about the role of Tam High Foundation. Simply stated, the parent volunteer Tam High Foundation exists to provide additional funding for public education at Tam High School. Through generous donations from community members and local businesses, the Foundation funds academic and student life programs that enhance teaching and learning for all Tam students. Look around campus and you will see the results of the Foundation's work in every corner. The language lab, extended library hours and aide support, laptops, laptops, laptops, quest artists for drama, documentary film lab equipment for AIM, the alignment rack lift in auto shop, literacy tutors and readers for 9th and 10th grade and now 11th grade, the list goes on and on.

The Foundation has a very simple business model. Every year there is a Fall Campaign to raise money from the community followed by a Spring Campaign to raise money from local businesses. - Technology and Tools 20 new laptop computers for use in the library,
- Specialized Expertise New this year, guest artists for the music department
- Ongoing Major Grants include: AIM program camera and peripheral equipment, CTE family theater and technical artist funding, library collection enhancement, Link Crew programs and library aide funding.

The College and Career Center is available to help students research colleges, post-high school programs, financial aid, scholarships, college admissions tests, volunteer opportunities, summer programs and part-time jobs. For the most current information about college and career events, check the Tam High website at www.tamhigh.org and PrepHQ.

#### **Keep Current with Email**

The College and Career Center sends occasional grade-specific emails to remind students and parents of special events, college visits, scholarship opportunities and last-minute scheduling changes. We do not share email addresses with anyone outside of Tam. All families, particularly junior and senior parents, are strongly encouraged to sign up.

The Career Center uses PrepHQ to send emails. If your student has already registered with PrepHQ, make sure the email addresses are current. If your student has not registered, this is how to get started: Log on to www.tamhigh.org, click on Academics and the direct PrepHQ link. Once on the homepage, go to "click here to register" and follow the instructions. Students need their student number to register and each student in a family needs to register separately. Information about Career Center events will also appear in the Tam Family and Daily Bulletin, which may be accessed through tamhigh.org.

#### Senior College Seminar September 24

Tam will sponsor a seminar for college-bound seniors and their parents on Thursday, September 24, at 6:30 pm in Ruby Scott Gym. Tam counselors will provide such need-to-know information as how to obtain letters of recommendation, how to send transcripts and the fall schedule of events. Our guest speaker is B. Noble Jones, senior assistant director of admissions at Kenyon College. He will discuss how colleges read applications and view the admissions process. College-bound seniors and their families are encouraged to attend.

The College and Career Center will sponsor a number of special events for seniors during the fall semester, including workshops on the early decision/early action process, writing the personal statement and completing the University of California and California State University applications. #### **PSAT**

Juniors and Sophomores: The Preliminary SAT, or PSAT, will be given at Tam on Saturday morning, October 17. Taking the PSAT gives students an opportunity to become familiar with the SAT and may help to improve future scores. Juniors who took the test last year are strongly encouraged to take it again this fall.

Students may sign up September 8 through October 10 in the counseling office during breaks, lunch and after school. The \$30 fee is non-refundable. Checks should be made payable to Tamalpais High School. Complete information will be mailed home this month.

Students may sign up online for the ACT at www.actstudent.org, and for the SAT at www.collegeboard. com. Register early for a convenient test site. Tam is not a test site.

Seniors applying to the University of California must complete all testing by December. Certain impacted California State University campuses, including San Diego and Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, require or prefer students to complete testing by November. For more information on the admissions requirements of the California State University and the University of California, go to: csumentor.edu and universityofcalifornia.edu/admissions.

Fee waivers are available for eligible juniors and seniors who cannot afford SAT or ACT fees. Students who receive SAT or ACT fee waivers may also be able to waive some college application fees. Talk with your counselor if you think you may be eligible.

Learning disabled students should contact their creative learning teacher for details on SAT and ACT procedures for students with learning disabilities.

#### College Representatives at Tam and in the Bay Area

Many college admissions representatives visit Tam in the fall to meet with students. Seniors and juniors are urged to take advantage of these opportunities. The visit list, available in the Career Center, on tamhigh.org and on PrepHQ, is updated regularly. Announcements of visits also appear in the Daily Bulletin. Students need a pass from the Career Center and permission from their teacher to attend a college meeting during class time.

Among the first schools to schedule visits to Tam this year are: American, Bowdoin, Bucknell, Colgate, Denison, George Washington, Haverford, Mills, Mt. Holyoke, Northeastern, Pacific, Pomona, Scripps, Seattle, Skidmore, U of British Columbia, U of Connecticut, U of Denver, U of Oregon and Washington U.

#### **Work Permits**

Work permits expire in September. Students under 18 need to get a new work permit from Jane Shapiro in the counseling office whether they are starting a new job or continuing a summer one. All jobs except babysitting and yard work require work permits.

#### Job Board

## TAM Drama 2009-2010: Plays From Classics to Modern, Plus Three New Works

The stage is set for a brand new year at Conservatory Theatre Ensemble (CTE), Tam's student-run theater company. New students begin their first days in class while former students take the reins of the student-run parts of the company. There is a flurry of activity as students sign up for shows, crews, production teams and intern positions. Third-year students prepare to assimilate as student company leaders, while seniors decide what their priorities are for their last year of running CTE. The new season is announced to the community so that our prospective audiences can see what we will offer during the upcoming year.

The first plays kick off in early September and include modern short plays from The Theatre of the Absurd and the UK's National Theatre that jumpstart our varied season. Next we'll move to classic Native American tales (Crow and Weasel) and Dumas's "The Three Musketeers" before winter

break. In the spring of 2010, audiences will be treated to Chekhov's intriguing play, "The Seagull." Original works include the March premiere of a new play by CTE graduate Ben Snyder (now a full-fledged playwright) that will explore the conflict in Gaza, examining Israeli and Palestinian viewpoints. In May we will develop two short new plays called "From Butoh to Buffo" which will feature contrasting and complementary theatrical movement styles.

New plays are a big part of CTE. We have pioneered many original adaptations and new works in our 30-plus year history. Premiering new works by current students,

alumni and commissioned playwrights has been a cornerstone of our season every year. Many of our young playwrights submit their plays for festivals or competitions that encourage young writers. We will continue to provide guest artist instruction for our emerging playwrights and to produce their plays in staged readings or the student-written one acts in the spring.

Speaking of one acts, we will present two one act festivals in which first and second year drama students act and third and fourth year students enrolled in honors theater direct. The Winter One Act Festival in January features classic or contemporary plays by leading playwrights; the Spring One Act Festival in May presents student-written plays and contemporary short plays. Last year the festival produced about 33 short plays that were very well-received by our audiences. The support for young writers was an added boost to all involved.

Watch for the student design work at CTE productions too. Our students are given ample opportunities to design for set, sound, lights, costumes and props during the year. The Daniel Caldwell Theatre is a state of the art facility that is highly theatrical, offering a world of experiences for students behind the scenes. Philosophically, we want our CTE students to experience the spectrum of artistic opportunities that theater provides. Actors must appreciate the "ensemble" of support backstage that affords them their moments in the spotlight. Our guest artist who is the technical director/production manager, Heather Basarab, oversees this important aspect of our program. Thank you Tam High Foundation for covering nearly half of the costs for bringing Heather to CTE students.

Needless to say, fundraising is a huge aspect of supporting a student-run theater company. Did you know that most of our annual budget is raised by

Of course, box office brings income and a great way to support us is by seeing the shows. The Tam High Foundation sponsors the family theater production and helps out CTE in many ways, including as the "umbrella" for the non-profit status we benefit from organizationally.

All the coaches are excited about the season ahead. More than half of our head coaches are in their first or second season coaching at Tam, and a few even coached teams that competed against Tam in the recent past. All have a clear sense of the keys to their teams' success this fall, want the kids to build skills and have fun and are looking to build the kind of team camaraderie that makes for a great experience.

Tam's Athletic Boosters Club and all of our coaches invite you to come out and support Tam's teams. As one coach put it, "Fans are like having an extra player. They make a difference."

#### **CROSS COUNTRY**

Last year was a strong one for both the boys' and girls' teams. Tam's boys' team won the NCS (North Coast Section) and went to the state finals. Of the seven-man team, five students graduated. So, Head Coach Sylvia Goodman sees this as a rebuilding year for the boys' team. The boys will be led by returning junior Dan Milechman, who placed third at state, and returning sophomore James MacDonald, who was the team's number two runner last year.

According to Coach Goodman, "we've been running all summer" and three additional runners are returning to the team: David Fuchs, Adam Scott, and Ben Taska. Sophomore Alex Olson is also looking very strong this summer. Nedd Byrnes is new to cross country, but is a seasoned distance runner for the Tam track team. In Coach Goodman's words, "All in all, the boys' team, under the leadership of team captain Dan Milechman, is shaping up nicely."

According to Coach Goodman "last year's girls' team was very, very strong but this year's has the potential to be one of the best I've coached" because of the returning and new talent with huge potential. Two girls went to state last year - one who graduated, and Monica Milstein, who is a senior this fall. Also returning is, in Coach Goodman's words, "an incredibly athletic groups of sophomores" including Caitlin Firmage, Jenna Lea, Sami Emory and Caroline Fearon. The team has also added several girls who ran track last spring, including Katie Lee, Lilla McMillan and Ciara D'Onofrio. And sophomores Quinlin Caicic and Meagan Monroe have shown lots of strength this summer during off-season training while incoming freshman Briggeite Winkler also looks to add strength to the pack.

Coach Goodman is "super excited about the girls' team this year." Tam's girls came in fourth in NCS last year, and just missed going to state. Could be a different story this year.

#### **WATER POLO**

Tam's girls' water polo team took second place in the league last year behind Marin Catholic. Several seniors on the team graduated, and Head Coach Brandon Williams is looking forward to two returning star players. Goalie Maddy Winkler scored a record number of blocks per game and for the season, and top scorer Erin Schlueter set the single-season scoring record last year. Coach Williams was happily surprised to meet several incoming freshmen with experience at the end of a recent summer tournament, and is looking for a few other players to round out the team.

"Last year we were number 12 in North Coast – this year, we aim to be a top ten team. Maybe top five," he said.

Tam's boys' water polo teams had successful seasons last year -- the varsity team was 15-10 and the JV's were 7-3. As varsity Head Coach Bob Kustel sees it, "Our biggest challenge this year will be to replace the six seniors who graduated." He added that a lot will depend on how quickly the young players develop.

This year's varsity boys' team may be one of the youngest in the league. Team leaders in and out of the water include Cody Nagy, Sasha Leidman, and Riley Shine. Junior Max Sieck, who set the Tam record last year for most goals scored by a sophomore, will be a starter, as will sophomores Brennan Latimer and Joe Weber. Coach Kustel's goal for the varsity team this year is to make the MCAL playoffs again (which would make a string of seven consecutive years), hit the 15-win mark again, and compete for the MCAL crown. An NCS berth is also on the coach's goal list, and he says, "the prediction here is that all are attainable."

As for the JV team, Head Coach Dave Beutel sees a very experienced group of players and a nice crop of incoming freshmen. Look for an MCAL JV title for these guys, who will be led by sophomores Dylan Glave, Trevor Williams, Riley Sykes, Reese Butler, and Tyler Parkerson.

#### GIRLS' GOLF

Last year's girls' golf program struggled to get enough girls to form a team. New this year to Tam, Head Coach John Haight aims to build a fun, competitive girls' golf program at Tam. The minimum number of players to field a team is five, and Coach Haight is thrilled that eight girls expressed interest before school even began. He hopes to have a total of 10-12 girls on the team this season.

#### **GIRLS'TENNIS**

According to Head Coach Bill Washauer, the girls' tennis team had a terrific lineup last season. Two starting seniors graduated, and the team's hardworking captains – Adrienne Foley, Emily Prescott and Meagan Schuler – got a head start organizing this year's team and fundraising.

Last year's singles lineup was the strongest in MCAL. This year, the coach plans to work on improving the doubles lineup while maintaining the team's strength in singles. To reach this goal, the coach and team will focus on the net game, in particular. Coach Washauer expects the team to be competitive in MCALs again, and looks forward to building a new, even stronger team this year.

#### **GIRLS'VOLLEYBALL**

This is a rebuilding year for Tam girls' volleyball. All three head coaches are new to Tam and are focused on helping the girls to become tougher and more competitive.

"It's all about athleticism," according to Varsity Head Coach Jon Feller.

JV Head Coach Casey Mondragon outlined these priorities for the team this season: 100% commitment, understanding the game, beginning to master key volleyball skills and having fun. He loves seeing the girls take pride in the quality of their play and reports that "these girls are passionate about their sport!"

Thirteen girls showed up at the Dipsea steps for a summer run, which was a good start to building this year's varsity team. Coach Feller would like to see the boys' and girls' volleyball teams support one another. He plans to run the same drills and has the same expectations for Tam's girls as he had for the boys he coached for the past four years at Terra Linda. His goal for the varsity girls as well as the JV and freshman teams is to develop a program that improves over time.

#### **FOOTBALL**

A rookie and two second-year coaches lead Tam's football program. This year's freshman players are bigger physically than last year's, and Head Coach Jon Black suspects they may be better defensively, too. He is surprised at the great team dynamic, and the players' commitment to improving their skills through hard work. Players and their parents should look forward to team dinners after study hall on Wednesdays to continue building the camaraderie that already exists among the players. Coach Black's goals for his players this season: "have fun, work hard, and enjoy football for the next four years at Tam."

Head Coach Eddie Savino hopes this year's JV team will earn a reputation for moving the ball effectively and for stopping opponents by hitting them hard. Team leaders who are setting an example by their performance are Mack Huffman (wide receiver and linebacker) and Kevin Le (fullback and linebacker). Coach Savino is pleased that the players are so coachable and so willing to follow instructions and learn the Tam system.

"We want the guys to do a couple of things really well – run and stop the other team's offense," he said.

Varsity Head Coach Kevin Goyer, new to Tam this year, was at San Marin last year and observed Tam from across the field. He saw that Tam's defense against the pass was a weakness, and one he plans to improve this year. He's been pleased with the way the seniors stepped up their training over the summer: speed training in the morning, weight training at midday and team practices in the afternoon for a total of four to five hours a day. He was also pleased with the number of kids who worked out this summer and by how willing they are to work hard.

Fans should look for Tam's varsity team to be more effective running the ball. Coach Goyer feels that dominating the running game will open up the passing game for the team.

"We're going to make teams work hard to stop us," he said.

#### BOYS' SOCCER

For this year's boys' JV soccer team, Head Coach Chris Hutchison says, "fun is the name of the game." Last year's team came together mid-way through the season and really came on strong in the second half. This year, Coach Hutchison wants that camaraderie to happen sooner and plans team pasta feeds and other events to make sure it does. His goal: early wins to give the team confidence.

"We're building skills and laying the foundation for the future varsity team this year," said the coach.

Boys' varsity Head Coach Dustin Nygaard sees player continuity as a huge strength of this year's team.

"These guys have come up together from their freshman year," Nygaard said. "They're team-oriented, hard working and good at the fundamentals of soccer."

He's also excited about the crop of up and coming freshmen, and believes this year will be fun. For two years in a row, the varsity team has seen its playoff hopes dashed at the end of the season. Coach Nygaard hopes to change that and predicts, "This will be our year!"
