An Introduction to the 2010 Parent Education Conference

Our annual Parent Education Conference on November 13 will be the culmination of a series of conferences focused on reducing stress and aiding student and family wellbeing in our community. Three years ago, we fine-tuned the focus of the parent education conference to address the alarming rate of teen suicide in Mill Valley. We began our dialogue on student wellbeing with Denise Pope, focusing on stress in the lives of our kids. Last year, we invited Dan Ginsberg to help us understand how we can help our kids build resilience in the face of stressful lives. This year we asked ourselves, "What's next?" In today's over scheduled, demanding world, what is the next step in understanding how to help our kids cope? Our answer is ... Happiness. How can we help our kids be happy?

This year's conference will focus on how to help your family thrive. The burgeoning field of positive psychology has revealed unprecedented insights into how human beings flourish. Our speakers are two internationally recognized positive psychology researchers, Dacher Keltner, Ph.D., and Christine Carter, Ph.D., from the Greater

Link Crew Gets School Year Started for Incoming Freshmen

ugust 13, 2010. Seven am. Seventy Link Crew leaders entered Gus Gym full of energy, enthusiasm, and that good 'ole Tam High Spirit. After a quick pep talk and a whole lot of caffeine, the countdown began. At 8 am, the doors opened. With "Dynamite" blaring, almost all 330 freshmen poured into the gym, through the welcome gauntlet, and onto the bleachers. This was Freshmen Orientation.

Beginning right away with orientation, Link Crew centers on making the transition between middle school and high school as easy and stress-free as possible.

Orientation begins with a welcoming assembly that's more of a "wake-up, get excited" sort of deal than an assembly. The fabulous Ms. Abigail Levine goes through a sequence of short and sweet activities to get the energy going and ease the nervous tension in the gym. From there, the freshmen are divided into groups of 10 to 11 students, each of which has its own personal upperclassman Link Leader to guide it throughout the remainder of the day. The Link Leaders disperse into their respective classrooms and lead their "Linkies" through a series of activities to get to know one another, talk about all the opportunities at Tam, and give some insight on how to be successful in high school from the get-go. And finally, the day closes with a free barbecue presented by the wonderful PTSA.

Yet, Link Crew extends beyond just orientation. Link Crew centers on creating a community at Tam. This community revolves around maintaining an active presence throughout the year in the form of Freshman Advisory.

Every freshman is enrolled in an Advisory. Advisory meets an average of once a week during tutorial, usually on Fridays. There are 16 separate Freshman Advisories this year at Tam, each equipped with four

to five Link Leaders. There are many goals of a successful Freshman Advisory, but the most notable is that of enabling a sense of academic community. The Link Leaders model useful life skills for the freshmen, such as time management and goal setting, and demonstrate the many resources Tam has to offer.

On behalf of all of Link Crew, we are off to a wonderful start with the most enthusiastic class of freshmen yet and cannot wait to see what this year will bring. We look forward to helping each individual freshman feel comfortable and find success here at Tam.

Good Science Center at U.C. Berkeley. Dr. Keltner is professor of psychology at UC Berkeley, co-founder of the Greater Good Science Center, co-editor of Greater Good Magazine, and author of Born To Be



Good: The Science of a Meaningful Life. Dr. Carter is a sociologist and author of Raising Happiness: 10 Simple Steps for More Joyful Kids and Happier Parents.

The conference is designed to give you practical tools to help you and your family thrive. You will also learn how recent scientific discoveries support the insights of ancient traditions in identifying the set of skills necessary to cultivate happiness and compassion in our daily lives. To offer a "teaser" for an idea you will learn about at the conference, the concept of jen ratio is an absolute magic elixir for teenagers. Keltner describes the *jen* ratio as "a simple but powerful way of looking upon the relative balance of good and uplifting versus the bad and cynical in life." I've been focusing on the jen ratio in my home, and I'm finding that when you understand and practice this idea of *jen* you can actually sense your teen relax and become grounded. You will see them hold their heads a bit higher. Find out more about your *jen* ratio at the conference on November 13 at 8:30 am in the Student Center.

Q: What is the guest artist program and how did it start?

In the guest artist program, professional musicians are hired to work in the classroom in their area of expertise. It started with hiring a choral accompanist and expanded from there.

Q: Who are the guest artists and how do you choose them?

- Vince Lars (saxophonist, songwriter, producer) band
- Britt LaGatta (soprano soloist, voice teacher, piano teacher) choir
- Ellen Pesavento (violinist, orchestra personnel manager, violin instructor) - orchestra
- Rob Ellis (pianist, vocalist, composer) staff accompanist

Guest artists are chosen by referral and through an interview process. I also had each musician come in for a few class visits so that I could observe them in action with students.

Q: How do guest artists work with Tam music students?

Guest artists help lead sectionals, provide one-on-one instruction and also serve as full ensemble conductors to offer the students a different perspective than my own.

Q: How does having a guest artist program strengthen music education here at Tam? What's your goal for this program?

Musicians learn from having as many teachers as possible. It is impossible to have one person be an expert in all fields. Guest artists offer diversity and specialization - skills that cannot be matched in any other way. My goal is to expand the guest artist program by bringing in more guest artists in areas of needed instruction. This way, Tam's music program will continue to expose Tam music students to experts in the field – professionals who have experience and help raise the bar for excellence in performance, individually and in collaboration.

Q: How is the guest artist program funded?

The guest artist program is funded generously through an ongoing major grant by the Tam High Foundation. Thanks to the generosity of donors in the parent body and community our program has been able to give students many more teachers with professional performance expertise who help build skill and musical knowledge. Also thanks to THUMB, our Tam High United Music Boosters, who also support our music program with time, talent and treasure.

As Our Town opens the new season for CTE (Conservatory Theatre Ensemble) in early October, the next production of Shakespeare's Twelfth Night is just around the corner playing October 19-23. One of the Bard's most entertaining, endearing comedies, this production will be directed by Julianna Rees, a guest artist with CTE, who directed the extremely popular production of The Three Musketeers last year that played to sold out audiences. Certainly Twelfth Night will offer the same color and spectacle that is Ms. Rees' specialty.

Loss, separation and unrequited love: only Shakespeare could spin these themes into comic gold. In CTE's production, the action takes place on the island of Malta during the Regency period when dueling and pirates

Advanced drama students also design the lights, set, costumes, props and sound under the guidance of Heather Basarab, guest artist in technical theater and design. The line-up for this production includes stage-managers Noelle Erskine and Micaela Chavez, plus designers Max Kligman, lighting, Benji Elkind, sound, Sarah Higgins and Lauren Ashe, costumes, Gabe Marino and Jon Demegillo, set, Carlotta Kirby, props, and Jenna Wallace, technical director. CTE is a unique program for its extensive opportunities to design and lead production work at the high school level.

All performances will be in the Daniel Caldwell Theatre located at the back of Tam's campus at 7 pm. The box office opens at 6 pm for ticket purchases. The house opens at 6:30 when seats are claimed on a first-come, first-served basis. Ticket prices are \$5 for students and senior citizens and \$12 for adults. Come early to be assured of a seat! Leadership News



With Homecoming looming on the horizon, the school year is officially in full swing. The Back to School Rally was a rousing success.

Seniors Danielle Bowen and Carrie Brandon kicked off the excitement with a duet of the Glee version of Lady Gaga's "Poker Face." Seniors Maddy Ball and Sam Hayman were the emcees of the rally and challenged the Tam High student body with new rally games. As a surprise event the Rally Committee rented an inflatable Jousting Ring and the captains of the Tam High sports teams battled it out for the honor of their squads. After Tam Football's star player Brian Scott took home the trophy, history teacher Aaron Pribble took on his brother Alex Pribble. After three intense rounds of jousting, the students cheered Aaron Pribble on to victory.

The Fall Blood Drive, hosted by the Blood Centers of the Pacific and promoted by Tam Leadership's own outreach committee, had its best participation in years. A total of 97 people registered and 76 people donated, eight of whom donated "double red." This means that a special machine was used to allow these donors to donate two units of red blood cells during one donation. It is also exciting to note that 68 of this year's 76 donors donated for the first time.

On Friday, September 17, the staff took on the students in a game of soccer. Tam High's sports committee provided pizza to a large group of students who turned out to see the action. The sports committee will also host a powderpuff football game between the junior class girls and the senior class girls after the varsity football game on Saturday, October 9. SAT & ACT

You can download the current SAT and ACT testing calendars and register for either test by going online. For the SAT, go to collegeboard.com and for the ACT go to actstudent.org. Students are strongly encouraged to register online. Register early for a convenient test site. Tam is not a testing site.

Students applying to the University of California must complete all testing by the December test date. Certain impacted California State University campuses, including San Diego and Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, require students to complete testing by November. For more information on UC and CSU admissions requirements go to: csumentor.edu and universityofcalifornia.edu/admissions.

CHSPE

The California High School Proficiency Exam (CHSPE) will be given in San Rafael on October 16, March 19 and June 18. Students who pass the CHSPE will receive a high school equivalency certificate and may leave high school with parental permission. Pre-registration is required. For more information, go to chspe.net. The CHSPE is separate from the California High School Exit Exam needed for graduation from Tam.

COLLEGE REPS AT TAM

Representatives of colleges from across the U.S. come to Tam each fall to meet with students. These are wonderful opportunities for students to put a face on the college and learn about the application process. The list expands daily and is announced in the bulletin. It is also available in the Career Center and online at tamhigh.org. So far, 50 colleges and universities from across the country are scheduled to visit Tam in October.

COLLEGE APPLICATIONS

Applications for admission to the University of California and California State University are available online October 1. Students can access the CSU application at csumentor.edu and the UC application at university of california.edu/admissions. Application fee waivers are available online. The filing period for CSU campuses is October 1 to November 30. UC accepts applications November 1 to November 30. November 30 is the absolute deadline to submit applications to CSU and UC campuses.

The Common Application, used by more than 400 colleges, is available online at commonapp.org.

Reel News: News from the Academy of Integrated Humanities and New Media (AIM)

With AIM beginning its eighth year, the previous seven successful years produced a few itches that dared to be scratched. Gone is "The Mandy Project," the popular Barry Manilow-inspired project where students worked in teams of four to five to travel around the Bay Area to create a story based on the theme of a teacher-assigned song. In its place is "The Profile Project," ramping up the rigor by having students create a compelling portrait of one of their peers based on intensive interviews with parents and friends as well as archival footage and music. Integrated around skills rather than a song, The Profile Project requires students to sharpen their interviewing, writing, research and technological skills and gives incoming AlMsters more hands-on experience with the technology as well as the film-making process. By the end of this two-month project we hope to have 80 short films that reveal our students' unique characteristics.



One thing that has continued through all our years is AIM's appearance in the Mill Valley

Film Festival. This year AIM is proud to announce that White Walls, a short film about a high-energy and eccentric art dealer in San Francisco, will be shown on October 16 at 11 am at the Rafael Theater as part of the MVFF's Youth Reel. White Walls was selected from over 100 submissions from around the world. Congratulations to Michael Zimmermann and AIM alums Tomer Sabo, Riley Shine and Katie Pilot for making a film worthy of this honor.

Boys' and Girls' Water Polo

Alumni support was in great evidence this September with a large contingent of "Bob's Boys" turning out to cheer on the 2010 team. No fewer than 12 alumni were spotted on deck at each of the first two home games, and many are dedicated assistants, helping with team training at pre-season and regular season practices.

As of mid-September, the boys' varsity water polo record is 11-2, Coach Bob Kustel celebrated his 100th win in nine years of coaching at Tam and Senior Max Sieck became Tam's all-time leading scorer with more than 176 lifetime goals.
