## Principal's Message

#### New Basketball Coach at Tam

Alex Pribble has been selected to serve as the Boy's Varsity Basketball coach at Tam. Alex served as interim coach the past two weeks, and was recently selected as the permanent coach. Alex played basketball at Cal for four years, and was a stand-out athlete at Drake High School. Alex's brother Aaron, Tam Social Studies instructor, will assist the program this year as well. Alex is replacing Mike Evans and Ralph Wilson. We thank Mike and Ralph for their outstanding contributions to the basketball program, including a Division IV State Championship in 2000.

### Modernization

I am pleased to announce Keyser Hall classrooms will be ready for occupancy second semester. New student schedules reflecting second semester room assignments will be distributed to students in December. Teachers are in the process of being assigned classrooms, and their classroom contents will be moved to their new rooms over winter break. The "T-town" portables will be removed immediately after the move, allowing greater space to complete the Tam pool, weight room, and tennis courts.

#### **Pedestrian Paths of Travel**

Update: The breezeway between Ruby Scott and Gus Gym will no longer be available as a pathway around campus starting Monday, December 1. The area will be inaccessible to allow construction of the elevator near Keyser and drilling of the pool support piers. The stairs between Keyser and Hoetger reopened November 3 as a new pathway around campus, which should help minimize travel time. Students will likely need additional time to get around campus during December. Travel times will be reduced once the pathways around Keyser open in January.

## 09-10 Course Registration

The AP and honors course registration process will commence in January. Students are required to attend informational meetings in order to enroll in any AP or honors course. The purpose of the meetings is for your students to learn about course expectations, prerequisites, homework load, etc. Students must attend informational sessions for each AP or honors course they are interested in taking next year. In addition, many classes require a placement test or essay for class enrollment. An AP/honors matrix delineating dates, times and locations of the informational meetings and entrance tests will be made available on the school web site next month. The actual course selection process will take place in February.

## **Notes from the Assistant Principal**

One famous organizational slogan is: Prior Planning Prevents Poor Performance. This is often referred to as the "Five Ps." Planning and organization are critical elements to excellence and success in your student's life. For a student to manage a group project, a long-term goal or even a short-term goal, prior planning is a key part of a great final product or performance.

To help your student be more successful in school, encourage him or her to use a school planner. This organizational tool will allow your student to lay out plans for the day, the week, the month, and even the year. In each class, your student can write down assignments, upcoming reading, and imminent deadlines. With this information, your student can plan out his or her time most effectively. He or she will know how much time to allot for homework and how much for friends or other responsibilities.

Take time to talk to your student about planning. Have your student break down big projects into manageable pieces. By turning a large assignment into a series of small steps, your student will feel less overwhelmed. These small steps can then be written into a daily planner making a 3-week project seem more like a series of small, daily assignments.

Parents want their kids to be successful. There are many opportunities to thrive and excel at Tam High. With a little planning, your student can maximize his or her experience at this great school. •

## One Acts Are Coming! One Acts Are Coming!

As we move into the winter semester it is that time of year again ... the CTE Winter One Act Festival is happening right after we return from winter break: January 7-10, 13-16 and 20-23, 2009. The marathon-like festival involves all CTE students who perform, direct and produce the festival in the Daniel Caldwell Performing Arts Theatre.

The one act plays are entirely student-directed and student-produced. The process begins when advanced students in Honors Theater Directing choose one act plays to direct. Then students from all of the first and second year classes are cast in these plays. Currently, all are rehearsing during class periods in preparation for the festival. The winter one acts are chosen from established playwrights and are either contemporary or classic plays. Chekhov, David Ives, Ionesco, Tennessee Williams, and many other well-known playwrights are featured.

Advanced students also produce the festival covering all aspects of behind-the-scenes work, including scheduling and technical logistics. When the festival opens, these advanced students will also perform the front of house duties, put out the programs and provide scene changes. Students will also videotape all the performances for DVD duplication. Every student in CTE will be involved in some aspect of the festival in order to put on an event of this scope.

The one act performances are enormously popular and often sell out. Seating is limited so here are a few other things to watch for that may help you enjoy the shows even more:

- 1. Permission and Conflict Sheets: By the time this article comes out, the permission slips and scheduling sheets should already be completed. Keep in mind that once the dates are set, we cannot shift them. The logistics of planning play performances for nearly 300 students require that everyone involved make their play a priority for the weekend it is scheduled and avoid any last-minute changes that would interfere with their performance.
- 2. Ticket Policy: Advance tickets are not available by phone orders or on the same day as performances. The box office will be open at 6 o'clock on the performance nights for ticket sales: these are non-reserved seats, first-come first-served and they are non-refundable. We do not permit "saving" seats so you must occupy your chosen seat before the first play begins or your ticket is void. We have had to implement this policy because it insures that audience members will

not save seats for late arrivals when patrons are already present to fill the theater. There is often a large turnover at intermissions, so if your student's performance happens later in the evening you may be able to move your seat after intermission so that your party is seated together. The Box Office number is 380-3535 and information is available on the website: www.ctetam.org.

- 3. Come early: Audiences should still try to arrive early since there will be no reserved seats. The doors open to the house at 6:30 pm when patrons can claim seats on a first-come, first-served basis. Seating is not permitted after the play has begun. In the intimate Caldwell Theatre, late arrivals are distracting for both audiences and young performers. Please avoid bringing young children who may find sitting through play performances too much to handle and talk or otherwise interfere with the live performances.
- 4. No Video or Cameras: Please do not use cameras either for photo or video. Flash photography is very distracting to young performers struggling with their concentration, and video cameras often interfere with the enjoyment of other audience members. All shows will be videotaped and DVDs can be ordered and purchased from CTE by sending an email to ctevideo@comcast.net.
- 5. During and after the show: Avoid distracting performers by calling out their names or motioning to them. Don't text message during the show; turn off cell phones. Avoid socializing during the play and be attentive to the performers. Do not attempt to go backstage or go up on the stage to see the performers after they finish. You will be able to meet outside where your presence will not interfere with set changes and other actors preparing to come on in the next play. This consideration for others will help the festival run smoothly and quickly between each play.
- 6. Respect: Please respect the CTE students who are trying to run the festival with professionalism and courtesy. Sometimes adults tend to forget that the students are in charge of running things and disregard their instructions.

## AIM Begins Documentary Projects on Race; Students "Transmogrify" in Ten Hour Film Challenge

Fall is a busy time of year in AIM as students complete traditional classroom instruction and segue into independent research for their documentaries. Additionally, AIM students get another chance to hone their technical, collaborative and storytelling skills in the annual Ten Hour Film Challenge Contest.

Because the documentary projects take the place of final exams, we wrap up the course curriculum in November. Each of the three AIM classes each came to a close in its own way. After weeks of breaking down different documentary styles, DIMS (Documentary and Integrated Media Studies) finished with a close examination of storytelling structure as we brainstormed topic ideas for our films. We learned techniques for approaching big topics such as race "sideways" instead of head-on and the importance of having a narrative spine and train. In US History, our final exam included writing an in-depth, analytical essay on the legacy of slavery. The essay required us to synthesize 400 years of history as documented in over 30 different sources including first-hand testimonials, film, text, college lectures, and live performances. The timing was incredible because it coincided with the election and gave us a perspective for Obama's historic win.

Instead of finishing this semester of English with a test, Mr. Tarpinian concluded our study of Mark Twain's Huckleberry Finn by focusing on methods of literary humor. We used Twain's famous techniques of satire, irony, farce, and parody to write and act out our own original skits. The activity produced some amusing performances, but more importantly it taught us how to effectively use humor in writing.

In the midst of this flurry of learning, we also had our annual Ten Hour Film Challenge. Working in large teams of 12, each group had only ten hours to write, act, film, edit and produce a three-minute film that incorporated three "ingredients." This year's ingredients were a large reptile, transmogrification and a bad smell. Ten hours later, each team presented its masterpiece and the teachers voted "Weresnake" the winner. Selected Ten Hour films as well as Mandy project films were shown November 23 in the Caldwell Theatre to an enthusiastic audience. •

#### Tam Girls' Water Polo

The Tam varsity girls finished with an 18-8 overall record, and a 7-1 second place finish in MCAL. This is the first time Tam has defeated Drake in the last decade! Their rigorous tournament and travel schedule put them up against many East Bay teams, and helped them earn a first round bye and 12th place in the NCS championship tournament. This is the highest NCS seed of any Tam girls' water polo team. The girls met their match against East Bay powerhouse and number five seed, Carondelet. They held on on 5-6 at the half, but after three of their starting line-up fouled out at the beginning of the third quarter, Carondelet went on an 8-0 run to secure the win.

The Tam varsity girls went further than any Tam team has, and the future looks bright. At the awards banquet, junior goalie Mattie Winkler was named "Most Improved." Mattie broke the team record for the number of saves in a single season and also the number of saves in a game, 19 against Drake! Junior Erin Schlueter was named team MVP. Erin broke the team record for the number of goals and steals in a season. Senior captain Avery Mosser was named team "Most Inspirational." The team said good-bye to its other graduating seniors, captain Jillian Gamboa, captain Amelia Harvey, Alexis Kleinman and Sophie Sieck.

The JV girls had limited MCAL play due to few JV teams competing, but managed to play enough non-league games and tournaments to get some solid experience under their belts. Sophomore Kristen Sato was named team MVP, sophomore Emma Ellison was named Most Improved, freshman Charlotte Passot received the Coach's Award, and freshman Jenna Wallace was voted Most Inspirational.

## Tam Cross-Country at MCAL Championship

Under sunny skies, with the temperature in the comfortable 60s, the Tam Hawks cross country squads performed well at the county championships run on the IVC Novato course on November 11. The boys' team, led by sophomore Dan Milechman's third place finish in a time of 15:41, finished in 3rd place, just behind Redwood and San Rafael. Other scorers were senior Cory Rand (8th) 16:38, senior Chris Lowell (14th) 17:03, freshman James McDonald (26th) 17:47 and senior Kalen Rago (30th) 17:59. Rounding out the varsity were senior Michael Fearon (32nd) 18:00 and senior Connor Gillespie (38th) 18:16. Dan and Cory made first team MCALs and Chris made the second team MCALs. There were a total of 122 runners competing.

The girls' team, led by senior Devin Patrick's fifth place finish in a time of 19:56, came in fourth place behind winner Redwood, second place Drake and finishing within five points of third place Terra Linda. Other scorers were junior Monica Milstein (21st) 22:00, freshman Caitlin Firmage (24th) 22:25, senior Linden McGreevy (27th) 22:28 and freshman Sami Emory (28th) 22:30. Other varsity runners were senior Olivia Blackstone (38th) 23:06 and freshman Jenna Lea (42nd) 23:23. Devin made the first team all-MCAL squad. There were 88 runners in the girls' race.

The Tam Boys took the title, winning by one point over St Mary's. Dan Milechman placed first, beating the second place finisher by 40 seconds. They will now move on to team state qualifiers.

Tam Girls placed fourth, missing going as a team to state by one place. They were the highest placing team from the MCAL division. Devin Patrick and Monica Milstein will compete at the state meet as individuals.

The team finished the season with a 17-7-1 record, adding an MCAL championship and NCS second place banners to the rafters of Gus Gym.

## **Varsity Football**

In the MCAL season finale, the Red Tailed Hawks (5-5, 2-4) played Justin-Siena High on Saturday, November 15. Tam started the game with quarterback Sean Betzner nailing a pass to Colton Danz for an 80-yard score. Unfortunately, this momentum didn't stick throughout the game, as Justin-Sienna was able to win the game with six consecutive trips to the end zone.

"It was the opposite of lately. The last couple of games we've come out slow and today we came out strong," said varsity football coach Tony Keefer. "We played good football for the first nine minutes. Then they started to wear us down. Despite the final score, Coach Keefer added that he was pleased with his team's effort.

"Their effort lasted throughout the whole game," he said. "That's always something you look at as a positive."

The players can say the same about Coach Keefer and his coaching staff. Because of Coach Keefer's efforts throughout the whole season, Tam Varsity football joined a bevy of Marin teams in NCS. The Red Tailed Hawks were seeded 13th and headed to the East Bay to take on fourth-seeded Bishop O'Dowd in November. Tam hasn't played a post-season football game since 2000. This is a positive for Tam football. �




Alex received a master's degree in education from Cal through a program called "Athletes and Academic Achievement." He is also a physical education teacher here at Tam.
