
While the new Tam administration will spend a considerable amount of time with parents, students, and staff in establishing new goals and priorities, we will be moving forward in improving a few areas immediately. The athletic program will be a point of emphasis for Mr. Elsen and our new Athletic Director Christina Amoroso, both of whom participated in collegiate sports teams. Honor-T/CSF will now be led by Laura Garrett; I will continue the Tam Celebration Committee this year, with the first meeting taking place toward the end of August; Abbey Levine is overseeing Link Crew advisors during 9th grade tutorials to build school community and create a positive school culture. School-wide, we will all focus on teaching and learning to ensure all students have a rewarding learning experience.

Congratulations to our students for another year of outstanding performance on STAR testing last spring. Tam students improved in nearly every category at all grade levels. All indicators suggest our API will grow from last year's 857 score! We appreciate your support in encouraging your students to give their best effort on the tests.

I am pleased to announce that all modernization projects on the Tam campus are currently on schedule for their projected completion date. Keyser Hall is scheduled to be completed and open for classes in January; the new pool and weight room are anticipated to be completed in August 2009; the new student drop-off was completed just before the beginning of school and has been operating successfully. Some of the pedestrian paths on campus have been altered to provide a safe means of access during ongoing construction work. In addition, the Monday bell schedule has also been slightly modified to afford students additional time traveling between classes.

#### p2p Co-Coordinators

Does your student have learning challenges that are causing difficulties in school? Do you have questions about his or her IEP (Individualized Education Plan) or 504 plan, or do you need to know more about such plans and how to make them more effective? If the answer to any of these questions is "yes," you can find help at Parent to Parent Connection (p2p), a Tam District support group for parents of high school students with learning challenges. Our parent meetings offer information from dynamic speakers on a wide variety of topics, and we open each meeting an hour before the program to allow for informal discussion and networking with other parents.

As co-coordinators of p2p, we meet monthly with Tamalpais Union High School District administrators Karen Mates and Bob Hamilton in order to plan p2p programs and also to voice your questions and concerns about how well the district is serving student needs. #### Please Tell Me Again ... What Does the Tam High Foundation Do?

Welcome back! The new school year is an exciting time for students, parents and staff. Our campus continues to be a work-in-progress, but as we see Keyser Hall rising and the landscape changing we can all start to visualize the incredible campus that will be home for the Tam community for the next 100 years.

Many new and returning families at Tam ask questions about the role of the Tam High Foundation. Simply stated, the parent volunteer run Tam High Foundation exists to provide additional funding for public education at Tam High School. Through generous donations from community members and local businesses, the Foundation funds academic and student life programs that enhance teaching and learning for all Tam students. Look around campus and you will see the results of the Foundation's work in every corner. The language lab, extended library hours and aide support, laptops, laptops, guest artists for drama, documentary film lab equipment for AIM, the alignment rack lift in auto shop, literacy tutors and readers for 9th and 10th grade, the list goes on and on.

The Foundation has a very simple business model. Every year there is a Fall Campaign to raise money from the community followed by a Spring Campaign to raise money from local businesses. In the spring the Foundation solicits grant requests from teachers and administrators. The all-volunteer board of the Foundation reviews the projects and works with the administration to prioritize investments. Then the money is allocated. Last year the Foundation invested over \$300,000 in teaching and learning at Tam!

This year the investments include:

- ◆ 21st Century Literacy New laptop lab, literacy tutors/readers for 9th 11th grade, guest artists
- ◆ Teacher Innovation Grants program and equipment support across many disciplines
- ◆ Technology and Tools Journalism computers, AIM documentary film lab, library laptops
- ◆ Specialized Expertise Drama guest artists, library aide, website coordinator
- Building the Tam Community "Breaking Down Walls," LINK Crew, Grad Night, Tam Family newsletter

So it's that time of year again! You all received a donation envelope in your first-day packet and we hope that you sent in your donation. The College and Career Center can help you and your student research colleges and post-high school programs, financial aid, scholarships, college admissions tests, summer programs and volunteer opportunities. Students may check out college catalogs and test prep materials. There is also a job board listing part-time jobs. For the most current information about college and career events, check the Tam High website at www.tamhigh.org.

#### **Keep Current with Email**

The College and Career Center sends occasional grade-specific emails to remind students and parents of special events, college visits, scholarship opportunities and last minute scheduling changes. We do not share email addresses with anyone outside of Tam. All families, particularly junior and senior parents, are encouraged to sign up.

The Career Center uses PrepHQ, the district's student organizer, to send emails. If your student has already registered with PrepHQ, make sure he or she has included your current email address. Emails are sent directly to your account. If your student has not registered, here are instructions to get started: Log on to prephq.com and enter "Tamalpais" in the box on the upper right. Once on the homepage, go to "click here to register" and follow the instructions. Students will need their student number to register, and each student in a family needs to register separately. Information about Career Center events will still appear in the Tam Family and Daily Bulletin, which may be accessed through tamhigh.org.

#### September 10: '08 Grads Advise Seniors on College Process

Five graduates of the Class of '08 will tell seniors what they learned about the college application process at a grad panel during tutorial on Wednesday, September 10, in the Student Center. The grads will tell the class of '09 what they wish they had known at this time last year, how they selected the colleges they applied to, how they got their applications done, how they made their selection and how they handled the stress of getting it all done. Seniors are encouraged to attend, ask questions and benefit from the experience of recent Tam grads.

#### September 18: College Seminar for Seniors and Parents

Tam will sponsor a seminar for college-bound seniors and their parents on Thursday, September 18, at 6:30 pm in Tam's Student Center. Tam counselors will provide such need-to-know information as how to obtain letters of recommendation and the fall schedule of events. Joy Biscornet, assistant director of admissions at Boston College, will be the guest speaker. She will discuss how colleges read applications and view the admissions process. College-bound seniors and their families are encouraged to attend.

#### PSAT

**Juniors and Sophomores:** The PSAT (Preliminary SAT) will be given Saturday, October 18, 8 am to noon, in a location to be announced.

Taking the PSAT gives students an opportunity to become familiar with the SAT and may help to improve future scores. Juniors who took the test last year are strongly encouraged to take it again this fall.

Students may sign up September 8 through October 10 in the Counseling Office during breaks, lunch and after school. The \$30 fee is non-refundable. Checks should be made payable to Tamalpais High School. Additional information will be mailed home this month.

Students may sign up online for the ACT at act.org and SAT at collegeboard.com. Register early for a convenient test site. Tam is not a test site.

Students applying to the University of California must complete all testing by the December test date. Certain impacted California State University campuses, including San Diego and Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, require students to complete testing by November. For more information on the admissions requirements of the California State University and the University of California, go to: csumentor.edu and universityofcalifornia.edu/admissions.

Fee waivers are available for eligible juniors and seniors who cannot afford SAT or ACT fees. Students who receive SAT or ACT fee waivers may also be able to waive some college application fees. Talk with your counselor if you think you may be eligible.

Learning disabled students should contact their creative learning teacher for details on SAT and ACT procedures for students with learning disabilities.

### College Representatives at Tam and in the Bay Area

Many college admissions representatives visit Tam in the fall to meet with students. Seniors and juniors are urged to take advantage of these opportunities. The visit list, available in the Career Center, on tamhigh. org and on PrepHQ, is updated regularly. Announcements of visits also appear in the Daily Bulletin. Students need a pass from the Career Center and permission from their teacher to attend a college meeting during class time.

Among the first schools to schedule visits to Tam this year are: Bowdoin, Colby, Colgate, Drew, Evergreen State, George Washington, Haverford, Ithaca, Middlebury, Mills, Mt. Holyoke, Northeastern, Ohio Wesleyan, Oregon State, Pitzer, Reed, Scripps, Seattle U., Skidmore, St. John's, Stoney Brook, Suffolk, U of the Arts, U. of British Columbia, UC Davis, U. of Puget Sound, U. of San Francisco, USC, Vanderbilt and Western New England College.

#### Like Cars?

Learn about cars and earn high school credit at the Regional Occupational Program's evening Auto Technology class at San Rafael High School. Students receive credit for the number of hours they attend. The class is offered Monday and Tuesday evenings, 6-8:30, in the auto shop. The class is free to high school students. This is a year-long class but students can enter at nearly any time. Students register by going to the class. More is information available at the ROP office, 499-5860.

#### **Work Permits**

Work permits expire in September. Students under 18 need to get a new work permit from Jane Shapiro in the counseling office whether they are starting a new job or continuing a summer one. All jobs except babysitting and yard work require work permits.

#### Tam Drama 2008-09 Season: from "Grimm" to Avant-Garde

A new school year brings with it much anticipation and excitement as former students return and new students begin their time at Tam High School. Conservatory Theatre Ensemble (CTE), Tam's student theater company, usually begins with a flurry of activity as students sign up for shows, crews, production teams and intern positions. Third-year students prepare to take on new roles as student company leaders, while seniors decide on their priorities for their last year of running CTE. The new season is announced to the community as our prospective audiences see what we have to offer for the upcoming year.

This year we anticipate a season of plays that will offer our audience a spectrum of entertainment that we hope will entertain as well as provoke thought and discussion in the Tam community. With the first two plays already cast last spring, we are off to a quick start.

The fall season opens with a new adaptation of the Grimm's fairytales called "Grimm Tales" (think more "Sweeny Todd" than "Little Mermaid"). This version was first developed for the Young Vic Theatre in London and was part of its touring shows. Our version, directed by guest artist Joe Lucas, will utilize his extensive background in theatrical training (including study at Julliard) to interpret the stories with great physicality and vocal energy. Rounding out the performance will be live sound/music that will help bring out the macabre stories. Student designers are working on the visual presentations such as set, props, costumes and lighting that add to the theatricality and underlying moods and themes.

Other mainstage shows continue to challenge both audiences and performers with a variety of styles and themes. In October, "Living Out" explores the collision of cultures as immigrants face the challenges of living in contemporary Los Angeles. Julia Mueller will direct the play ("Dead Man Walking" in 2007-2008). Next is the Pulitzer Prize-winning comedy "You Can't Take It With You" directed by drama instructor Ben Cleaveland in November. February will welcome the return of Bay Area improv artist Regina Saisi ("True Fiction Magazine") who will direct students in a "long-form" improv show. The classic tragedy "The House of Bernarda Alba" will play in March, directed by Julianna Rees-Cleaveland with an all-woman cast.

New plays are a big part of CTE. We have pioneered many original adaptations and new works in our 30-plus year history. Premiering new works by current students, alumni and commissioned playwrights has been a cornerstone of the season every year. This year, we have an original play scheduled for the Mother Lode Drama Festival that began its development with last year's seniors in writing workshops led by guest artist Robert Ernst. This year, he will direct the play with a group of advanced students to bring it to full production.

A new season addition will be a play to be performed at the Lenaea Festival in Sacramento in early February. This play is "to be announced" as we explore whether to take an original work or possibly a student-directed play to this large high school drama festival with about 80 schools participating. We will also be able to bring scenes and monologues to compete for awards.

Besides the mainstage plays, we will present two one-act festivals that first and second year drama students will act in while being directed by students enrolled in Honors Theatre Directing. The Winter One-Act Festival features classic or contemporary plays by leading playwrights; the Spring One-Act Festival will follow last year's formula of presenting entirely student-written plays. Last year the festival produced about 20 new plays that were very well-received by our audiences. That support for young writers was an added boost for all involved.

from the Mill Valley Public Library

As the school year begins, we at the Mill Valley Public Library would like to remind students and parents of some excellent tools available for homework help. Many resources are available through our website, millvalleylibrary.org. Of particular interest, however, are two services: AskNow and Live Homework Help.

• **AskNow**, is a free 24-hour, seven-day-a-week reference service where questions are answered in virtual real-time by reference librarians. This service is great anytime, day or night, when you have specific questions or need web resources.




# Exhibits Showcase Student and Faculty Art
